APPR SUSPENDED 2022 APPR BILL

On May 13, the Governor signed Chapter 201 of the laws of 2022. This bill, which passed unanimously in both the senate and assembly, eliminates the requirement for school districts and BOCES to complete an annual professional performance review (APPR) for any classroom teacher or building principal for the 2021-22 school year. The bill also assures that state funding will not be withheld from any school district for not completing the APPR in these school years. This bill acts as an extension of Chapter 112 of the laws of 2021.

This is a direct result of our VOTE/Cope contributions. Please join the hundreds of LEA members who have already contributed to VOTE/COPE. We need the support to address the NYSUT agenda and provide protection for members across the state and here locally.

VOTE/COPE is Needed More Than Ever, Here are the Priorities:

- \$100 million for community schools
- \$14.26 million in additional funding for teacher centers
- Repeal the draconian receivership law
- Improve access to school nurses and mental health professionals
- Fix Tier 6 It took 24 years to fix Tiers 3 and 4. Tier 6 has been in place for 10 years and $\frac{1}{3}$ of our membership is now in Tier 6 (close to half of ERS as well). We need tier equity to help make this an attractive profession. It's time to start working to fix Tier 6 so that members aren't contributing 3-6% until they are 63 years old.
