

Summary of the Santa Monica-Malibu Unified School District Board of Education Special meeting of December 18, 2025

Core Points

- **Property Acquisition for Franklin Elementary Expansion**
 - The board approved the purchase of the property at 814 2th Street adjacent to Franklin Elementary School for \$2.88 million.
 - The acquisition aims to address the campus size, which is currently half the recommended size for its enrollment and projected growth per California Department of Education guidelines.
 - Funding comes from one-time capital outlay project funds, not from general obligation bonds or general funds.
 - The current occupants may continue using the property until November 2027.
 - The district will propose future use plans for the site to the board, ensuring all entitlement requirements are met before any changes.
- **McKinley Elementary School's Progress and Initiatives**
 - McKinley Elementary has experienced significant progress during the school year, highlighted by strong collaboration among staff and meaningful instructional improvements.
 - Key initiatives include hiring a full-time instructional coach funded by Title One funds to support teachers and instructional assistants with coaching and professional development.
 - Designated English Language Development (ELD) has been strategically aligned across classrooms to serve multilingual learners effectively while providing targeted support to all students using a "what I need" block.
 - The phonics program, UFLY Foundations, has been fully implemented in grades K-2 with professional development and coaching to ensure fidelity and early positive results.
 - Professional Learning Communities (PLCs) have been strengthened with weekly cycles focused on collaborative conversations and instructional adjustments informed by data.
 - Tier 2 reading interventions are provided before and after school by volunteer teachers, benefiting about 10% of students, reinforcing literacy support.
 - McKinley was named to the 2025 California Honor Roll, reflecting high achievement and successful instructional work.
- **Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Whole Child Education at McKinley**

- SEL is a longstanding priority at McKinley, enhanced by collaboration among classroom teachers, counselors, district partners, and community organizations.
- The school has implemented the Second Step program for eight years and continues refining it with tailored professional learning and classroom practices such as Responsive Classroom strategies.
- Tier 1 SEL practices include weekly explicit instruction on growth mindset, empathy, emotion management, and kindness.
- Tier 2 and Tier 3 supports are provided through a full-time counselor, counseling interns, and partnerships with mental health organizations to support individual needs.
- The school has three wellness spaces dedicated to therapeutic counseling and small group interventions.
- Project-Based Learning (PBL) and Environmental Education
 - McKinley is in its second year of refining PBL, emphasizing essential elements like sustained inquiry, authenticity, student voice, and public presentation of work.
 - Examples include a fifth-grade capstone puppet-making and storytelling project and watershed discovery projects linked to the Safe Clean Water LA grant.
 - Students engage in real-world environmental problem-solving, incorporating grade-level appropriate investigations related to native plants, ocean ecosystems, and community impact.
- Focus on Collaborative Conversations and Guaranteed Curriculum Access
 - The school's current implementation plan emphasizes structured, collaborative conversations to improve students' listening, speaking, and reasoning skills.
 - These conversations foster empathy, belonging, and community, addressing concerns about screen time and promoting face-to-face dialogue.
 - Families are involved in extending this work at home through modeling and guidance on meaningful dialogue.
 - Students are observed actively collaborating and talking in classrooms to access rigorous content.
- McKinley Campus Construction Update
 - A new elementary education and administration building will be ready for occupancy by March 30, featuring flexible indoor-outdoor spaces to support instructional practices like small group ELD and PBL.
 - Staff will have flexible moving options aligning with testing schedules.
 - The old office space will be converted into a staff lounge to promote wellness and collaboration.
 - The design includes a revamped life skills room tailored for vulnerable and medically fragile students, equipped with adaptive skills facilities like a kitchen and laundry.

- The construction team has actively engaged with the community through support activities and holiday sponsorships.
- English Learner Progress and Attendance Improvements at McKinley
 - McKinley has the second-highest percentage of English learners in the district and has shown significant progress in ELD proficiency and reclassification rates since 2019.
 - Collaboration between general education, special education, and intervention staff has aligned language instruction and data analysis.
 - Attendance rates have improved over three years, with a 12% reduction in chronic truancy, supported by proactive strategies like attendance conferences, awareness campaigns, and a dedicated attendance team.
 - Student engagement through programs like maker space workshops and TK-5 dance supports attendance.
- Community Engagement and Support at McKinley
 - The school community is highly active, hosting over 50 events annually such as picnics, literacy nights, festivals, and talent shows.
 - PTA membership has grown significantly, with robust participation in site council, special education groups, and family engagement events.
 - Collaborative literacy initiatives include a family literacy night, a Spanish reading book club for adults, and weekly literacy tips shared via newsletters.
 - The community has demonstrated strong mutual support by organizing emergency preparedness training, care kits for unhoused neighbors, and holiday gift sponsorships.
- Board Leadership Transitions and Recognitions
 - The board elected Alicia Minano as president and Lori Lieberman as vice president for 2026.
 - Recognition was given to outgoing President Jennifer Smith for her leadership, commitment to equity, and consensus-building.
 - New transportation supervisor Crystal Gonzalez was introduced, bringing extensive school transportation experience and a family perspective.
- Updates on District Policy and Curriculum
 - Multiple board policies and administrative regulations were updated or newly introduced, including:
 - Response to Instruction and Intervention (RTI²) emphasizing academic and behavioral supports.
 - Curriculum development process and world language instruction, including dual immersion pathways and state seal of biliteracy achievements.
 - Advanced Placement course offerings and fee reductions for low-income students.

- Civic education policy promoting balanced instruction and student voter registration activities.
 - Visual and performing arts expansion including media arts integration.
 - Controversial issues policy clarifying teacher conduct and student rights in classroom discussions.
 - Service learning and community service class descriptions.
- Additional accountability and local control policies were updated to comply with state law changes and reporting requirements.
- District-Wide AI Integration and Training Initiatives
 - The district has established a generative AI task force and piloted AI tools (Gemini and Brisk) with over 75 teachers.
 - Updated technology use policies include ethical guidelines and guardrails.
 - AI literacy training is underway for staff and parent groups, with planned expansion to secondary schools and student pilots in 2026.
 - Ongoing collaboration with unions and PTAs is prioritized to ensure comprehensive understanding and responsible use of AI.
- Community Schools and Student Support Highlights
 - Santa Monica High School hosted a successful UCLA Health blood drive and maintains a Vikings Hub providing essential resources.
 - ASB clubs showcase events and holiday fundraisers promote student engagement and school spirit.
 - Olympic High School is transitioning to a permanent new facility, with recognition for its continuation school model and student resilience.
 - Classified workers represented by SEIU Local 99 voiced concerns over wages, job security, benefits, and working conditions, seeking collaborative solutions with the district.

Key Conclusions

- **Strategic Property Acquisition Will Support Long-Term Campus Growth**
The board's decision to acquire adjacent property for Franklin Elementary addresses critical space constraints, positioning the district to better accommodate current and future enrollment while maintaining prudent fiscal management by using non-bond funds.
- **McKinley Elementary Exemplifies Effective Instructional Leadership and Innovation**
Through intentional investment in instructional coaching, aligned ELD programming, and robust phonics and reading interventions, McKinley demonstrates a replicable model for improving literacy outcomes and supporting diverse learners in an inclusive environment.
- **Comprehensive SEL Integration Enhances Student Well-being and Academic Success**
McKinley's multi-tiered SEL approach, embedded in classroom culture and supported by counseling and community partnerships, creates a holistic educational experience that addresses students' emotional and social needs alongside academics.

The school's PBL initiatives foster critical thinking, creativity, and civic engagement by grounding learning in authentic problems and community collaboration, preparing students to be active, informed citizens.

Structured opportunities for dialogue support not only academic growth but also social skills and empathy, reinforcing the district's commitment to inclusive, student-centered education.
- **Infrastructure Investments Align with Modern Educational Practices and Accessibility**
New construction at McKinley and other sites reflects a thoughtful balance of historic preservation, flexible learning environments, and special accommodations for vulnerable student populations, enhancing both instructional quality and community pride.

Data-driven, coordinated efforts across staff roles contribute to measurable gains in language proficiency and sustained student engagement, demonstrating the value of integrated intervention strategies.

Active family involvement, PTA leadership, and community collaborations enrich educational programs, promote equity, and provide essential supports that extend beyond the classroom.

- **Board Vote on Property Acquisition**

- Approved 5 to 1, with one board member absent.
 - The property use remains undecided pending further recommendations.
- Instructional Coaching at McKinley
 - Funded by Title One funds.
 - Coach works side-by-side with teachers and assistants providing professional development and data analysis support.
- Designated ELD Scheduling Innovation
 - Aligns ELD blocks across grade-level classrooms enabling flexible grouping.
 - Supports multilingual learners alongside small group interventions for others.
- Phonics Program Implementation
