"Kindness and Gentleness" Choral Artists of Carmel online concert February 14, 2021 at 3 pm

The Choral Artists of Carmel will premiere their online concert "Kindness and Gentleness" which will benefit the Monterey County Food Bank. Our concert includes choral pieces "Sacred Heart" by Ola Gjeilo, "America the Beautiful" by Shawn Kirchner and "Herr, unser Herrscher from JS Bach's St. John's Passion. Soloists Kiril Havezoz, baritone, Leberta Loral, soprano and Arthur Wu, tenor, will sing solo arias. Jorge Avila, one of New York City's leading violinists, will play an unaccompanied Bach sonata. Julie Fotheringham, dancer from New York City will also dance. Richard Thompson, composer of "Dawn" from "The Shadow of Dawn," sung by Leberta Loral, will share his vision of composing in an interview.

"Sacred Heart" by Ola Gjeilo is a choral piece reflecting the theme of "Kindness and Gentleness." Composer Ola Gjeilo repeats only a few lovely phrases in Latin reminding us that wherever there is charity there is love. It is a great honor to repeat these lovely and encouraging words as we face a worldwide pandemic and struggles to find unity in our national healing. David Dally's Monterey Strings accompanies the Choral Artists of Carmel.

"America the Beautiful" written by Shawn Kirchner is an exquisitely beautiful choral piece reflecting the bounteous grace we all share in our country. Mr. Kirchner combines the text of Katherine Lee Bates with his own reflection of American history with our flaws and many gifts. The combined texts describe a readiness to admit our national failures and a hope of healing as we try to see our many shared blessings of our country. There is a sense of healing and moving forward together with our common gifts.

Kiril Havezov, baritone a leading opera singer in Bulgaria's leading opera houses, will sing a haunting art song by G. Sviridov "Bogomater v gorode" (Mother of God in the City.)

Leberta Loral, soprano and winner of the prestigious Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions will sing "Dawn" from "The Shadow of Dawn" accompanied and composed by the composer Richard Thompson from the University of Edinburgh, The text, accompaniment and Leberta's voice are gorgeous. Poet, Paul Lawrence Dunbar was the first black American poet to receive international acclaim. Multitalented tenor Arthur Wu of Carmel will accompany himself while he sings ever so expressly Schuman's "Ich grolle nicht" from "Dichterliebe."

"Herr, unser Herrscher" by JS Bach from St. John Passion is dramatic in every note, word and chord. The text is a pleading to God reminding us that just when life's circumstances are ever so difficult and discouraging that we can rise and move forward in strength and love. There is a wonderful orchestra accompanying soloists, Aimee Puentes soprano from San Francisco Opera, mezzo-soprano Anna Yelizarova, international opera singer, Tony Burdette from Cincinnati Opera, and Patrick Lord-Remmert from New York City.

I present this concert in the hope of a kinder and more generous life for all who listen. The beauty of music can reach a heart and mind as we struggle to survive the COVID 19 pandemic and look for national unity. Beauty in music has a great power to inspire and heal.

O beautiful that ancient feet
Beneath the countless stars,
Ten thousand years in Beauty walked,
Through wilderness unmarred.

And fateful then, that sailing fleets
A new world sought, and found,
And whose bright promise wrought a doom
Whose echoes yet resound.

America! America!

May God forgive thy vying strains.

Thy pride yet tame with rightful shame,

That others' loss bought selfish gain.

Bates' original verse three praises the "heroes proved in liberating strife" — Revolutionary War heroes. But I felt it was more important to focus on the third founding "strand" of Americans: African-Americans — present well before the founding of the country in 1776. Their story is followed from enslavement through the "liberating strife" of the Civil Rights movement — in which Bates' original words ring more true, actually, since nonviolence was the chief technique utilized in that movement:

O sorrowful for captive feet
In chains against their will,
Who toiled through centuries of wrong
To triumph still:

Whose heroes proved so beautiful
In claims of lawful rights,
Who more than self their country loved,
And mercy more than life.

America! America!

May God yet mend thine every flaw,

Redeem thy soul and be made whole,

Thy liberty in law.

For the final verse, I wanted to return to Bates' original words, inspired by the ideal America of the future (she had attended the World's Fair before traveling to Colorado and up to Pikes Peak). I added a few lines to her closing section, to more fully name the breadth of origination that our country of immigrants truly has:

"America! America! from farthest shores thy people stream."

O beautiful for patriot dream
That sees beyond the years
Thine alabaster cities gleam
Undimmed human tears.

America! America!
From farthest shores thy people stream,
The multitude that seek thy good,
And share a common dream.

America! America!

God shed His bounteous grace on thee,

Thy beauty crown with unity,

From sea to shining sea!
