Updates Notes (2025-2026)

In an effort to keep folks updated as they join the program, this is a compilation of updates or notes we have sent out:

<u>September 22, 2025</u>

We received additional information from Explorica this afternoon and want to share it with to help alleviate any confusion around the amalgamated program. Here is my best attempt to answer the Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ):

Why is the itinerary changing?

- Our participant numbers remain below the threshold to offer the customized trip we had originally planned. Continuing with the custom trip with lower numbers would result in significant cost increases per participant and we don't think it's fair to ask families to pay even more.
- After working closely with Explorica, the best solution we have found is to join another group departing June 29 on a 9-day trip. This keeps costs reasonable while still offering our participants an incredible and immersive experience in Japan.

How does the new trip compare to the original plan?

- Length: New trip is 9 days, the original was 11 days (only a 2-day difference).
- **Focus:** Our custom trip had more free/exchange time; the new one has more structured experiential learning (e.g., visiting Hiroshima, participating in tea ceremony).
- **Transportation:** The new itinerary includes two additional bullet train trips (Tokyo–Kanazawa and Kyoto–Hiroshima).
- **Highlights retained:** Most of the favourite stops from 2023 are still included (e.g. Tokyo, Kyoto, cultural visits, shrines, temples, markets).
- New additions: Kanazawa (rich in samurai history, less touristy), Hiroshima (Peace Park, Museum, Atomic Dome), and The National Museum of Emerging Science and Innovation in Tokyo.

What is the new itinerary?

Will there be added evening activities?

• Part of what makes this program great is being able to do some activities on our own. We have an experienced team with the ability to add enriching free-time and evening activities on our own. We plan to add optional evening "side-quests" to maximize our experience in Japan. These may include orientation walks, group karaoke, mall/shrine visits, visiting Book Off (a used bookstore chain that we found super popular with the students in 2023). The nice thing is that with a smaller group, it is actually easier to manage and get around on our own using public transit.

What about costs?

- Current participants will see a <u>slight drop in price</u>. Keeping our student to chaperone ratio at 10:1, we were quoted \$7262 for this new itinerary. When we switch to the amalgamated trip, current participants will see a reduction to their remaining balance. Anyone that has already paid in full will receive a refund for the difference. If you also paid for travel protection, you will also receive a reduction for the shortened travel protection plan.
- The \$200 Early Enrolment Incentive will carry over to the new itinerary and will still be in place to the end of the month. Our tour consultant is actually looking if we can extend it a bit longer for families who are still considering joining.
- We submitted Financial Assistance Plan applications in July. We haven't heard anything back yet, but they will not be affected by the change to the new itinerary.

What is the Land-Only Option?

The Land-Only Option allows participants to join the Discover Japan Language & Culture Program tour <u>without airfare included</u>. This option gives families the flexibility to stay behind in Japan after the tour to continue traveling on their own. Because of the complexities of international travel, this is only an option if an adult is traveling with the student before and after the tour. Our program leaders cannot facilitate or supervise participants flying on different itineraries.

• **Cost:** \$4,583 (covers all program activities in Japan). Participants choosing this option are responsible for all costs outside the scheduled itinerary (airfare, transportation, meals, lodging before/after the tour, etc.).

- Flights: Participants must book their own flights to and from Japan.
- **Arrival:** You must arrive before the official start of the tour to meet the group at the hotel in Japan.

What if my family prefers to cancel?

Families who wish to cancel may do so under Explorica's standard policies:

 Cancellation fees may apply however, if you purchased insurance with the CFAR (Cancel For Any Reason) waiver, you will also be eligible for a 75% refund of cancellation fee.

How are chaperones affected?

Our chaperone coverage is based on student numbers. We will send a minimum of two
chaperones with the students and if needed cover the additional chaperone cost with
operational reserves and or out of our own pocket.

Where will flights depart from?

Flights will not be booked until closer to departure. Because we're joining another group, we cannot request a specific departure airport for the full group at this time.

As previously mentioned, we will be hosting a participant/parent meeting on Oct. 4 at 12:30pm in our classroom (ED 318) if you would like to join us to discuss the changes. Thank you for your patience as we navigate this adjustment and continue to build an amazing experience!

September 20, 2025

Thank you for your interest and support in the Discover Japan Language and Culture Program (DJLCP). We're excited to see more families joining since last week, but I want to provide an important update on our travel plans and share some upcoming activities for our class.

🛪 Travel Program Update

While we are seeing more interest in the program, our participant numbers remain below the threshold needed to offer the customized trip we had originally planned. Continuing with a

customized trip at current numbers would result in a significant cost increase for each participant. Travel costs have already risen since our 2023 program, and we don't think it's fair to ask families to pay more.

In 2023, we had 46 participants and even had to turn families away because the bus was full. That success made us hopeful for the same this year. While numbers are lower than expected, we've been working diligently with Explorica to find the best solution to still provide an amazing immersive experience.

The best option is to join another group departing June 29 on a 9-day trip. Although we won't be able to offer everything in our previous itinerary, we're still visiting Tokyo and Kyoto, and this new trip offers some exciting opportunities, including:

- Visiting Kanazawa, a culturally rich area that's outside some of the major tourism destinations that are getting overwhelmed in Japan
- A special trip to Hiroshima, including the Peace Park and Museum—often requested but usually too costly due to bullet train travel. This will be a poignant and deeply meaningful experience.

We'll continue to work hard to add evening activities to maximize our time in Japan. Major details should be confirmed by October 4.

As part of our Saturday September 27 class, we will be going on a short field trip to Kyoto... Okay, not quite yet, but just one building over, the U of R's Fifth Parallel Art Gallery is hosting an exhibit titled "Let's Go to Kyoto, too!!." Professor Robert Truszkowski created ART290JP: The

Art of Kyoto where the students and their professor spent 2 weeks visiting Japan and exploring the arts and culture there.

This art show represents the students' final projects – their "response to Kyoto" assignment. Professor Truszkowski is the head of the Visual Arts department and has agreed to open the gallery for us to view his student's work. I had an opportunity to check it out on Wednesday and I think there's a little something for everyone in this exhibit – traditional, modern, video, nature, paint, textiles, photography, mixed medium, etc.

It looks like we may even get the chance to visit with one of the student artists who went and hear about what she experienced in Japan. Our students may not fully understand all the nuances yet, but it's their first taste of the



experience to come and we hope our time in Japan will be as enjoyable and deeply meaningful. Part of wanting to have our classes at the U of R included our desire to be able to make these connections, to show the students opportunities that exist in post-secondary, and that there are programs like this that could get you to Japan again if you look for them.

September 1, 2025

Program Update

We're very excited about the students who have already signed up, and we know from past experience that participation often grows as we start the class and move into the new school year. We typically see a spike in enrolments in September, and our hope is to continue with the program as planned.

In the meantime, we are keeping a close eye on numbers and will be doing another push to schools this month to share information and encourage more participants. Should enrollment not reach the threshold needed for our fully customized tour, we do have a loose contingency plan in place which would likely involve switching to a 9-day tour amalgamated with another group, with travel happening over the Easter break. That said, our strong preference—and what I remain hopeful for—is to move ahead with the customized DJLCP tour. The \$200 enrollment incentive is available until the end of September, so please help us spread the word amongst your inner circles of colleagues, family, and friends.

Early Enrolment, Financial Assistance Program & Tip Donation

Please check your Explorica accounts to ensure you received the \$200 early enrollment. Let us know if it hasn't been applied and we can help get that sorted out.

Applications for the FAP through Explorica were submitted in July for anyone who self-declared and was enrolled by June 30. We haven't heard anything back yet but are hopeful to access the maximum grant available.

We were honoured to be selected as the August recipients of Rising Sun Ramen's philanthropic tip donation program. Over lunch hours during the work week, Tipsy Samurai holds a pop-up ramen lunch and donates all tips collected to worthy causes in the city. Thanks to their staff and the generosity of their patrons, we received \$841.70 for the program!

Japanese Language and Culture Class

I'm happy to report that we're again joining forces with Queen City Japanese School and the Multilingual Association of Regina to host classes at the University of Regina. This partnership allows us greater opportunities to connect with the Japanese-Canadian community through youth & university classes as well as opportunity to easily connect with visiting Japanese students. I'm also hoping this will be an opportunity for our students to become familiar with the U of R campus and the opportunities available at university.

Classes are slated to begin Sept. 13, at 1:45 pm - 4:45 pm and will run most Saturdays through to the end of May and a preliminary schedule will be up on our google calendar as soon as possible. We don't have our classroom assignment yet so we will be communicating that out as soon as we have it (but there are often adjustments within the first days and weeks of classes as they find the best place for all of the different language classes).

We know that Saturdays may be an issue for some families but we really do feel that this location and ability to connect with Japanese families will provide the best opportunities for the students and I'm really hoping most of our students will be able to make it work. I also know that regular life often gets in the way of best laid plans and other learning opportunities such as travel, time with family, and sport or cultural events may sometimes need to take priority. While we are unable to offer a virtual or streaming option for the course, we will host the class on Google Classroom and endeavor to include supplemental material with course assignments so that even if a student has to occasionally miss a class, they should be able to complete and catch up on their work. Successful completion of the course will result in students receiving Japanese 10L as a credit towards their high school graduation requirements.

We are also planning to host 5-6 cultural events throughout the semester where all members of the program will be invited to attend even if they are not enrolled in the class. We encourage everyone to attend, experience some Japanese culture, and get to know the whole team who will be traveling to Japan with us.
