A. The owl's hoot and whistling wind

1. Cup hands as directed

a. Create closed cavern

b. Make cavern as full as possible

2. Create the aperture for the whistle with your thumbs

3. Keep cavern closed

4. Blow gently into the aperture to create a breathy, low whistle

B. The alert whistle

1. Cup hands and create cavern and thumb aperture as directed above.

2. Open cavern as widely as possible to create a high-pitched whistle

3. Blow hard on thumb aperture

C. Play a song

1. Cup hands and create cavern and thumb aperture as directed above.

2. Use right hand, like a trombone slide, to open and close the cavern.

3. Change pitches as desired to create the song.

D. Modifications

1. The referee's whistle

2. The quiet raspy whistle

3. The wolf whistle
