2. General course description and objectives

This course is an introduction to the nature of human language from the perspective of modern linguistics. It focuses on sounds, words, and sentences through analysis of data from various languages. Additional topics may include: social and geographic variation, language change through time, first- and second-language acquisition, and language and culture.

By the end of the course students will be able to:

3 Grades

Grades will be calculated using a weighted system such that online quizzes based on the readings will account for 15% of the overall score, the final exam will account for 20%, other quizzes for 30%, discussion for 25%, and linguistics study participation will account for the last 10%. This will be according to what follows:

- a) 15%: reading checks (3 for 50 pts each = 150 pts possible)
- b) 20%: final exam (200 pts possible)
- c) 30% quizzes (6 for 50 pts each = 300 pts possible)
- d) 25%: discussions (5 for 50 pts each = 250 pts possible)
- e) 10%: linguistics study participation (100 pts possible)

Total:100% (1000 pts possible)

Late Work Policy: For any work that is turned in late, there will be a 10% deduction per day except the discussions that are stricter. 4 Explanation of Coursework

Online Quizzes for Reading Checks (150 pts possible)

There are three quizzes that will be available throughout the semester. They will focus on the readings. You will be given one chance at them.

Exam 1 (200 pts possible)

The exam will cover content from each module of the course. It may include data set analysis, multiple choice questions, short answers, essay questions, or whatever would best assess your knowledge of the course content and provide evidence that you really know the material. Exam 1 will be released on 7/30/20 at 12:01 am, and will be due on 7/31/20 by 11:59pm). The exam must be completed individually.

NB: For extended response questions there will be a rubric provided, so it is really clear what is expected.

Quizzes (300 pts possible)

These assignments are meant to help you really grasp the basics of what is language and fundamental aspects of phonology, morphology, syntax, and semantics combined with pragmatics. Each of these quizzes can be taken multiple times, up to the deadline. That is, you can keep retaking these quizzes until you have the score you want, unless the deadline passes. Note that the questions are not likely to be the same from one trial to the next.

Discussion (250 pts possible)

These assignments will require you to provide one academic comment for credit. An academic comment will be most importantly defined for this class by what it is not, which is that it is not repeating what someone else has said and it is not praising them for their response (although praise is really appreciated for just having a great online community). Late responses to the discussions are penalized twice as much as other assignments with a 20% deduction per day late.

NB: A rubric will be provided for each of these to delineate exactly what you need to do (as it is exactly what I will use to grade your submission).

Linguistics Study Participation (100 pts possible)

In this course students must earn 1 required credit for participation in linguistics studies this semester for this course and write about the experience. For more information about the studies and to sign up for linguistics studies, please visit http://speechlab.utah.edu/participate.php
