



#### **LACROUTE Composer Readings & Chamber Music Mentorship Program:**

The <u>Lacroute Composer Readings and Chamber Music Mentorship Program</u> at Linfield University offers student composers on campus, as well as youth from the surrounding region, the opportunity to work closely with professional mentor musicians during a residency program.

Through this program, students will:

- Build both composition portfolios and relationships with professional musicians
- Develop essential skills in collaboration and communication
- Observe chamber music master classes

The visiting artists will workshop student pieces in progress, coach chamber music ensembles, offer an open seminar on a musical topic, and present a full recital of contemporary works.

### Pyxis Quartet Residency, April 11 and May 9, 2023

You have the opportunity to write original music for Pyxis (String) Quartet. These pieces will go through a series of revisions and edits in preparation for the live premiere performance on May 9, 2023.
