This summer, I am asking that you do the following:


- 1. Read at least one other book of your choice (see the General Summer Reading assignment for recommendations) and complete the form on our Classroom page.
- 2. Choose **ONE** of the following memoirs to read while completing the assignment posted on the Summer Reading Classroom.








GENRE STUDY: MEMOIR Summer Reading/Response Assignment

The genre of **memoir** may be one that is new to you - that's great! It's always good to explore new things and see what you can learn from them. So let's talk quickly about **memoir: it's the story of a <u>part</u> of someone's life**. We will start next year with a genre study of memoir and narrative writing - this means reading, examining, and analyzing great examples of the genre to learn about its common elements.

Read your memoir with this goal in mind - to learn not only about the person highlighted in the memoir, but also to learn about the *genre* itself.

General Directions: Read ALL of the questions before you begin reading your chosen memoir so you know what you're looking for. I would even recommend taking notes (annotating) as you read (on paper, on a Google Doc, a Word Doc, on Post-Its, whatever works for you). Note-taking is only a suggestion and is not a required part of this assignment. However, if you know what you're looking for as you read, it may be easier to pay attention to the story and the way it is told. These questions are designed to encompass the entire piece, so I'll be looking for evidence that you read the entire book, not just particular chapters to answer these questions.

In September, we will discuss your books as part of our first unit of study on memoir and narrative writing. You will be expected to have a working knowledge of your chosen story and its writing style. All assignments are found on google classroom and submissions will be expected on the first day of school.
