## **Numbers**

The source you are documenting may be part of a numbered sequence. Most numbers refer to volume and editions. It can also include episode numbers or any other numbering system your source uses to identify itself (MLA Handbook 39-40). End this element with a comma.

## **How to Cite a Number in a Works Cited Entry** (*MLA Handbook* 92-93)

- In a range of numbers use a dash in between the two numbers
- Precede the number with a description of what that number represents (vol. Or no.)
