Learning Goal: to engage in wordplay and new ways of expressing ideas verbally

Did you know that April is National Poetry month? Think about all the times that you have read a poem. Think about what makes a text selection a poem. For example, when you read is it: Short or long? Does it rhyme? Is there a rhythm when you say the words out loud? Some acrostic poems share a feeling or experience while others tell a story Think about how poets come up with their ideas and use their voice in their writing. Think about different kinds of poems you have seen. Write a list of possible topics that you are interested in writing about. Example: favourite sport, food, your name Once you have chosen a possible topic, brainstorm lists of words related to your topic. Choose your topic word and write it vertically down the page. Then add your accompanying descriptions using each letter to start a line of the poem. At the end of the week, choose your favourite piece of writing and take through the writing process. Math At Home

Learning Goal: add money amounts, using a variety of tools (e.g., currency manipulatives, drawings)

Here are 6 different coins we have in Canada. penny nickel dime quarter loonie toonie 1c 5c 10c 25c one dollar two dollars Here are the 5 different bills. You will need a handful of different coins. If you don't have real coins to count, try using Money or use this picture. Estimate how much money you have, then count the money.	You can skip count to show how some coins and bills are related. To show how many quarters make one dollar, count on by 25s. 4 quarters equal one dollar. Use the money tool to investigate the following: How many dimes make \$1.00? How many nickels make \$1.00? If we know that 4 quarters make \$1.00, how many would we need to make \$2.00? How many toonies make \$20.00? How many loonies make \$10.00?	We can add money using place value (add the ones, the tens, then the hundreds). We can also draw pictures of coins, sort them, and count them up. Pretend you are putting on a play for your family. These are the props you can buy. Choose 2 props to buy and add them up to find the total cost. What strategy did you use to add the two amounts together?	Look through this grocery store flyer. Find 3-4 items that you estimate would cost less than \$10.00 altogether. Check your estimate by finding the total cost. Try it once more. ALWAYS BASICS 197 188 188 188 188
