Academic Needs

Contracted Tutoring occurs during the school day

The vulnerable populations to be served by the set-aside funds include our entire student population, as this is comprised of the following vulnerable student groups: Each major racial and ethnic group, economically disadvantaged students, children with disabilities, English learners, gender, and migrant status; students experiencing homelessness; and children and youth in foster care.

Career Success Schools is classified as an "alternative setting" educational institution, and our student population is composed of all of the above-mentioned student groups.

Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	School Social Workers (SSW) are teaching twice weekly during the advisory period (20 minutes long) and they are using the following evidence-based curriculum: Second Step (K-12). Students who work with social workers are self-referral, teacher referral, and principal referral, and parent referral. Social workers will not only teach twice per week, but will also be providing vulnerable students and their families with social assistance needs through resources for health care, housing, transportation, food, and other social needs, etc. School Social Workers provide ongoing services to our students, families, and external stakeholders on a consistent basis.
Other Needs (which may include student health and food services)	AFood Service. The School will minimize transmission risk in food service by taking steps such as: encouraging students to bring their own meals as feasible; serving pre-packaged meals (rather than buffet style); and using disposable food service items (e.g., utensils, dishes). If the School cafeteria space cannot be modified to account for social distancing for all students, some or all students may be required to eat in other locations or at staggered lunch times.
Staff Needs:	
Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	All staff have access to EAP support and resources located within the CSS healthcare benefits program. This program has been updated with new options for self-care and mental health supports.
Other Needs	Accord Healthcare Institute is also providing COVID-19 testing, and all staff have access to school social workers and other public assistance supports and resources, as needed.
