Description and Objectives

Description: In this course, we continue to build on the knowledge and skills students developed in IB HL English Literature I during their junior grade year. Students will focus on literary texts, adopting a variety of approaches to textual criticism. We will explore the nature of literature, the aesthetic function of literary language and textuality, and the relationship between literature and the world. Our core concepts are identity, culture, creativity, communication, perspective, transformation, and representation.

Objectives: It is the intention of this course that students are able to do the following

- 1. Know, understand, and interpret:
 - a range of texts, works, and/or performances, and their meanings and implications
 - contexts in which texts are written and/or received
 - elements of literary, stylistic, rhetorical, visual, and/or performance craft
 - features of particular text types and literary forms.
- 2. Analyze and evaluate:
 - ways in which the use of language creates meaning
 - uses and effects of literary, stylistic, rhetorical, visual, or theatrical techniques
 - relationships among different texts
 - ways in which texts may offer perspectives on human concerns.
- 3. Communicate:
 - ideas in clear, logical, and persuasive ways
 - in a range of styles, registers, and for a variety of purposes and situations

Major Assessments

Internal: Major INTERNAL assessments include the Individual Oral Exam. This is a recorded presentation and follow-up discussion performed in a meeting with your teacher outside of class time. You will receive more information on this assessment later in the fall semester.

External: Major EXTERNAL written assessments are the Paper 1 and Paper 2 Exams. This is scored externally by IB. You will receive more information on these assessments second semester.

Supplies and Materials

Daily Supplies: Please bring an English-only notebook and a writing utensil to class everyday. We have shared highlighters and sticky notes, but you are welcome to use your own. Chromebooks are located in our classroom and will be used when appropriate.
