**Course Description**

In this course we will focus on the most significant authors in Spanish in the last and in the present century. A historical, social and literary approach will focus on the most outstanding movements and authors, based on the reading, analysis and commentary of the texts to be studied.

**Course Content**

**THEORETICAL CONTENT:**

- Topic 0. General Introduction to Spanish Literature
- Topic 1. First modern female voices in the 19th century
- Topic 2. Modernism and the crisis at the end of the century.
- Topic 3. The avant-garde and the Generation of '27: the "sinsombrero" (women without a hat).
- Topic 4. Post-war women's voices
- Topic 5. We, too, make the revolution: the 1960s and 1970s
- Topic 6. Relevant women authors of the period of the transition: the 1980s and 1990s.
- Topic 7. Women writers of the 21st century

**Methodology**

All CLM classes follow the system of skills integration, student participation in tasks, group dynamics and pragmatic and socio-cultural value of the topics. Homework is oriented on the integration of students in immersion situations in addition to personal work. The class structure begins with theoretical and historical information on the authors and moves to a review of the textual works. These reviews include: Reading, vocabulary, group and

individual analysis, class commentary and discussion.

## Assessment

The assessment is continuous and will take into account the following:

- 20% - Group project (class presentation)
- 40% - Active participation in class, forums, text commentaries, complementary tasks and other proposed activities throughout the course.
- 40% - Mid-term exam and final exam (questions based on the theory of, as well as a commentary on, a text studied in class).
