<u>iCivics</u> is a free online platform featuring lessons covering the three branches of government and interactive games that cover citizenship and participation, the Constitution and Bill of Rights, separation of powers, budgeting, and the executive, judicial, and legislative branches.

<u>The Bill of Rights Institute</u> is a robust platform with lessons, videos, primary sources and essays covering civics topics.

<u>US Citizenship Test for K-12</u> is an exam that allows users to test their knowledge of civics and American history in a fun and engaging way while reflecting on why these questions are key to becoming informed citizens.

<u>Teaching American History</u> includes a historical documents library, Exhibits on America's Founding, web-based lesson plans, and podcasts. Its American History Toolkits are topically focused collections made up of resources from the site and organized to provide easy access to a variety of materials for teachers. Its <u>50 Core Documents That tell America's Story</u> lists the essential documents that are a starting point for students and teachers to "think more deeply about what it means to be an American."

<u>The ABOTA Foundation</u> provides free civics and law-related education resources and programs to teachers and students. Lesson plan topics include media literacy; civic participation in the justice system; the Constitution; federal and state courts; judicial independence; Magna Carta; trial by jury; and separation of powers.
