I. Course Description

AP® German is a full year college level class designed to provide students with the preparation to score successfully on the Advanced Placement test offered in May. (Note: Taking the AP test is not mandatory.) The course will aid students in achieving a higher level of proficiency in both comprehension (listening and reading) and production (speaking and writing) skills in the target language. The course content will reflect a wide variety of academic and cultural topics that address the National World Language Standards and will incorporate the use of authentic materials. A proficient score on the AP test usually results in college credit and a reduction in college course requirements.

III. Course Goals & Objectives

Students will:

- Engage in conversations to provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, exchange opinions, narrate stories
- Understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of topics (see topics below)
- Demonstrate an understanding of the culture of the German speaking countries (practices, perspectives, products, etc.) through comparisons with their own
- Present information and ideas to an audience of listeners
- Reinforce and further their knowledge of other disciplines (history, architecture, etc.) through the target language
- Refine, enhance, and improve their German language production (speaking and writing) and language comprehension (listening and reading) skills

IV. Course Topics (Summary Outline)

Topics of study based on the AP proposed thematic units with essential questions:

1. Families and communities: Families in different societies

- a) What constitutes a family in German-speaking societies?
- b) What are some important aspects of family values and family life in German speaking societies?
- c) What challenges do families face in today's world.

2. Personal and public identities: The influence of Language and Culture on Identity
