Main Idea: Main Idea: Joy in Trials Produces Wholeness in Christ

OUTLINE

1. James, God's servant, writes to encourage dispersed Christians facing persecution (1)

- 2. Christians WILL meet various (many-colored) trials (2)
 - 1. We must prepare for these trials.
 - 2. C.S. Lewis Quote: b. It seems to me that we often, almost sulkily, reject the good that God offers us because, at that moment, we expected some other good. -C.S. Lewis
 - 3. Call out to God Psalm 118:5-6
 - 4. Why is it joyous to face and endure trials with joy?
- 3. Tested faith, when trusting in the Lord, produces steadfastness (3)
 - 1. Prov. 3:5-6
 - 2. 1. 1 Peter 5:8-10
 - 3. Consider it joy, then resist the devil
 - 4. God's love for us
 - 1. 1. unwavering
 - 2. unconditional
 - 3. never ending, regardless of who you are or what you've done
 - 5. Remember the tapestry image (see the image and associated poem)
- 4. God's aim is to make is complete (4)
 - Perfect, not sinless perfection, but perfectly complete for His purposes in our lives.

- 2. Crucial for our formation as a community of believers (2 Corinthians 1:3-7)
- 3. Do not worry, God has provided all we need in Him (2 Peter 1:3-8)

- 1. What does it mean for James to call himself a servant of God? Why not "brother of Jesus"?
- 2. Consider what the first-century Christians endured, being dispersed from their homeland?
- 3. What kinds of trials are people facing in our Church right now? Your family?
- 4. Read C.S. Lewis' quote above. How did the quote from C.S. Lewis resonate with you?
 - a. What "good" from God have you struggled to accept?
 - b. How can expectations get in the way of trusting God during hard times?
 - c. How can setting our expectations properly help?
- 5. Read Psalm 118:5-6
 - a. What does this Psalm teach us about calling out to God in distress?
 - b. What would it look like to respond to a trial with confidence in God's nearness?
- 6. How is joy different from happiness?
- 7. What's something God has grown in you through a trial?
- 8. Can you name a moment where joy broke through in suffering?
- 9. Read verse 4 together.
- 10. What does "perfect" mean in this context?
 - a. How is being "perfect" different from being "sinless"?
 - b. What might God be completing in you through your current season?
- 11. How have you seen God use your pain to comfort others?
- 12. What does this passage say about shared suffering and shared comfort?
- 13. Read 2 Peter 1:3-8
 - a. According to this passage, what has God already given us?
 - b. How can we grow in these qualities as we go through trials?
