H4: 1. Food and Beverage Industry

Standard: 48" x 40" x 5.5" GMA

If you conduct international business, you'll encounter these standards:

H3: Regulatory Compliance: ISPM 15

If you ship internationally, you must be aware of [ISPM 15 \(International Standards for Phytosanitary Measures\)](#). This regulation applies to hardwood pallets and requires:

- [Heat treatment of all hardwood pallet materials to specific temperatures](#)
- Approved marking on treated pallets (HT mark)
- Documentation of treatment certificates
- Compliance for shipments entering most countries outside the U.S.

IMPORTANT:

Untreated or improperly marked hardwood pallets can be rejected at international borders, causing costly delays. When specifying pallet dimensions for export, always confirm ISPM 15 compliance.

H3: Weight Capacity and Load Consideration for Pallet Dimensions

A pallet's weight capacity depends on several factors beyond just its dimensions:

H4: Factors Affecting Weight Capacity

- **Wood quality and grade:** Hardwood (oak, maple) vs. softwood (pine, spruce)
- **Construction type:** Stringer vs. block pallets; single-deck vs. double-deck

KEY DISTINCTION:

Static capacity is the weight a pallet can support while stationary; dynamic capacity is the weight it can support while being moved. Always use dynamic capacity figures for moving loads.

H2: How to Measure Your Pallets: Step-By-Step Guide

Need to verify the dimensions of a pallet you're working with? Here's how to measure accurately.

BEFORE YOU START: TOOLS YOU'LL NEED

- Steel measuring tape (at least 50 feet)
- Pen and paper or digital note app
- Level (optional, to check if pallet is warped)

H3: Step 1. Measure the Length

- Lay the measuring tape along the longest dimension of the pallet
- Measure from the outermost edge on one end to the outermost edge on the opposite end
- Record the measurement to the nearest 1/4 inch

H3: Step 2. Measure the Width

- Measure perpendicular to the length along the shortest dimension
- Again, measure from outer edge to outer edge
- Record the measurement

H3: Step 3. Measure the Height

- Stand the pallet upright on a flat surface
- Measure from the bottom of the pallet to the top of the deck boards
- For height, measure at multiple points (all four corners and center) to account for warping
- Record the average measurement

H3: Step 4. Document Any Additional Information

- Note the pallet condition (new, used, repaired)
- Identify the stringer type (top, bottom, flush, or offset)
- Count the number of deck boards
- Check for any visible damage or repairs
- Note wood type if visible

PRO TIP:

If you're ordering large quantities of pallets, take measurements from 5–10 samples to get an accurate average and identify any variations in sizing.

What is the most common pallet size?

The 48" x 40" x 5.5" GMA pallet is the most common standard in North America, used in retail, food, beverage, and most general industries.

Are pallet dimensions standardized worldwide?

If shipping hardwood pallets internationally, ISPM 15 heat treatment is required for most countries. Softwood pallets and composite pallets may have different requirements depending on destination.

What's better: stringer or block pallets?

Neither is universally "better." Stringer pallets are more cost-effective and easier to repair; block pallets offer better weight distribution and durability. Choose based on your load weight and budget.
