Lunch is provided for all students, or they may bring their own. If your child forgets to bring lunch, we will provide them with a school lunch.

Please note: *Glass containers and soda cans are not allowed for safety reasons.*

Attendance

Consistent, on-time attendance is essential for student success. Students must attend school daily and stay for the full school day to receive the maximum benefit from instruction. This aligns with the School District of Philadelphia policy and Pennsylvania state law.

What to Do If Your Child Is Absent

Please do not call the school to report an absence. Instead, send in the appropriate note with your child on the day they return. Families may also complete the [online Absence Excuse Form](#).

- **Deadline:** Notes must be submitted within three days of the absence. After that, the absence cannot be excused.
- **Responsibility:** While teachers may remind parents/guardians about missing notes, it is ultimately the parent/guardian's responsibility to account for all absences.
- **Medical Absences:** If a student has an excessive number of excused absences due to medical appointments, the Principal may require official documentation from a medical provider for any absences beyond the tenth one.
- **Extended Absences:** If your child has a serious medical issue or will be out for an extended period, please notify the school nurse so that arrangements for homebound services can be made.

Excused absences include:

- Illness or quarantine
- Recovery from an accident
- Required court appearance
- Religious holidays
- Death in the family
- Educational tours/trips (with prior approval)

All absences will be marked unexcused unless a valid excuse note is submitted. Proper documentation ensures accurate coding in the District's attendance system.

Make-Up Work

For absences longer than two days, please contact your child's teacher by e-mail or Class Dojo to request homework. If you must take your child out of school for unapproved reasons, it is your responsibility to see that all work is made up or alternative assignments, when provided by the teacher, are completed on time. Note that we cannot approve any absence

not listed above under “Attendance”.

Truancy

The School District of Philadelphia follows a very strict truancy policy.

- Three or more unexcused absences: written warning letter.
- After six unexcused absences, the parent will be invited to a meeting with the attendance team and receive information to help support coming to school.
- Ten or more unexcused absences: parents are referred to the truancy court.

Arrival

Arrival Time: 8:40 AM

Arrival Location: Cook-Wissahickon School Yard

To help students start their day smoothly, please ensure your child arrives on time.

- **Drop-off:** Parents/guardians who are driving may drop off students beginning at **8:30 AM**. Students will wait in the schoolyard until the doors open.
- **Safety Reminder:** The gate from the parking lot to the schoolyard stays locked throughout the day. **Do not walk through the parking lot in the morning while staff are arriving.** This creates a dangerous situation. Instead, please walk around the building and enter the schoolyard from the Righter Street side.
- **Inclement Weather:** On rainy or cold mornings, students will wait in the cafeteria, entering through the recess doors.

PARKING & TRAFFIC:

- Please be courteous to our neighbors—**do not park on sidewalks or in ways that block school buses or traffic.**
- **Parking is prohibited on Righter Street.**
- **The staff parking lot is for employees only.** There are not enough spaces to accommodate visitors.
- **To reduce congestion,** we strongly encourage families to walk to and from school whenever possible.

Thank you for helping us keep arrival and dismissal times safe and orderly for everyone!

Dismissal

- **Regular Dismissal Time:** 3:29 PM
- **Early Dismissal Time:** 12:29 PM

Dismissal: Students must be picked up promptly at **3:29 PM** unless staying for an after-school program. Parents may wait for their children in the schoolyard.

Walkers: Students are required to walk to school or receive private transportation if they live less than 1.5 miles from the school. A crossing guard is stationed at busy intersections to assist children with crossing streets safely. There is no supervision beyond these points. Crossing guards have the same authority as a bus driver while on duty and can, therefore, make disciplinary referrals to the Principal. It is expected that students from kindergarten through fourth grade will be escorted home by an adult or older sibling. No student in grades K-4 will be sent home unescorted without consent from the parent or guardian.

Bicycles: Students are permitted to ride bicycles to school with a parent's or guardian's written permission. Bicycles must be locked in the bicycle rack located at the front entrance of the school. Students must follow a safe route to school and wear a safety helmet at all times. The school reserves the right to deny or rescind permission for a student to ride a bicycle to school.

Note: The **playground is unsupervised after school**. The School District is **not responsible** for students remaining on school grounds after dismissal.

Late Arrival & Early Release

Late Arrival

- Students arriving **after 8:50 AM** are considered tardy.
- Between **8:51–9:50 AM**, tardy students must report to the **Late Desk** before going to class.
- Parents/guardians must sign students in upon arrival.
- Arrivals at **11:00 AM or later without a note = unexcused half-day absence.**

Early Release

- Early dismissal is permitted for **emergencies or unusual circumstances only.**
- If an early release is anticipated, a written note must be given to the classroom teacher, who will notify the office.
- For emergencies during the day, requests must be made at the **Main Office.**
- **Cutoff times:**
 - No early dismissals after **2:30 PM.**
 - On half-days, no early dismissals after **12:00 PM** (per District policy).

Procedures (Both Late Arrival & Early Release):

- A parent/guardian must sign the student in or out at the **Main Office.**
- Students will be dismissed from the office, not the classroom.
- Students may not leave the building alone during the school day.
- Adults signing students out must be listed as a guardian or emergency contact **and present photo ID.**

Attendance Note:

- Lateness and early dismissals are recorded and may disrupt learning.
 - Leaving at **1:39 PM or earlier without a note = unexcused half-day absence.**
 - **Two half-day absences = one full-day unexcused absence.**

SCHOOL OPERATIONS

Visitor Procedures & Building Access

We are committed to providing a safe and secure learning environment for all students. For this reason, all exterior doors remain locked during the school day, including the front entrance.

Visitor Procedures:

- All visitors and volunteers must **report to the Main Office** to sign in and obtain a visitor pass.
- Passes must be worn at all times while in the building.
- Visitors must **sign out and return their badge** before leaving.

Parent & Guardian Visits:

- Parents and guardians are always welcome; however, visits must be arranged in advance with the **Principal and/or the teacher** to prevent conflicts with classroom activities.
- Visitors should not expect to meet with teachers during instructional time.
- Conferences must be scheduled at a mutually convenient time for both teachers and families.

These procedures help us ensure a **safe, respectful, and productive environment** for every student and staff member.

Field Trips

Field trips are scheduled throughout the school year to enrich students' learning experiences. When a trip is planned, a permission slip with full details will be sent home. All signed slips and any required payment must be submitted by the deadline provided. Verbal permission is not accepted, except in emergencies.

- Trips are for students only; siblings are not allowed to join.
- Parents/guardians are encouraged to chaperone and must follow the School District of Philadelphia's Volunteer Policy. Chaperones must return to the school with the class.

Recess

Recess is held outdoors daily, weather permitting, and supervised by our Culture Team. Students should come dressed for the weather.

Recess will take place outside if the temperature is above **32°F** with **no precipitation**. On bad weather days, recess may be held indoors in the cafeteria or classrooms.

STUDENT BELONGINGS & TECHNOLOGY

Chromebooks

All students will receive a Chromebook device & charger for their educational use throughout the year. It is expected that all students will bring their device to school each day and maintain safe care of it. If there should occur a problem with the device, please contact your child's teacher. We will ensure that the device is repaired.

Cell Phone & Personal Electronics

In compliance with the Board of Education Policy, students are not permitted to use electronic devices or wearables during school hours. Students will be asked to stow the device in their pocket, handbag, or book bag. Failure to comply will result in the student being asked to surrender the device to the staff member. The device may be returned at the end of the day for the first occurrence after contacting the parent or guardian. Subsequent offenses will require a parent or guardian to pick up the device from the school. Students who frequently disrupt the educational environment by using electronic devices will be required to lock their devices daily in a secure location. Students requesting permission to use an electronic device must have permission from the building principal. Parents should educate their children about the safe and appropriate use of all electronic devices and review and reinforce the school policy on electronic devices. The school and school personnel are not responsible for the loss, theft, or damage of personal property at any time.

Personal Belongings

Electronics, toys, playthings, playground equipment (balls), and collectibles are to be left at home unless authorized for school purposes. Students should always safeguard their belongings. The school and the staff are not responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged personal items.

Lost and Found

Articles left behind at school or turned in to the office are placed in the lost and found area in the Cafeteria. Please label all of your child's belongings so they may be returned quickly. All items left at the end of the school year will be donated.

EQUITY & STUDENT RIGHTS

LGBTQIA+ Policies & Resources

Policy 252 – Transgender & Gender Non-Conforming Students

We are committed to creating a safe, inclusive, and supportive environment for all students. In alignment with the School District of Philadelphia's Policy 252, we affirm the rights of transgender and gender non-conforming students and will follow these key practices:

Names & Pronouns

Students will be addressed by the name and pronouns that align with their gender identity. No legal or medical documentation is required. Intentional or repeated misuse of a student's name or pronouns is a violation of this policy.

Privacy & Confidentiality

A student's transgender identity will not be shared without their permission, even with parents or staff. Students have the right to decide when, how, and with whom they share this information.

School Activities & Spaces

- Students will be included in all school activities, groups, and spaces that match their gender identity.
- We aim to minimize separating students by gender whenever possible.
- Gender-neutral language (like "they" instead of "he/she") will be used in written communication when appropriate.

Restroom Access

Students may use the restroom that aligns with their gender identity. A private, single-stall restroom will be available to any student seeking more privacy, but use of that space is optional, not required.

PE & Intramural Sports

Transgender and gender non-conforming students may participate in physical education classes and intramural sports in a way that aligns with their gender identity.

HEALTH & SAFETY

Healthy Eating Policy

Cook-Wissahickon follows the District's Healthy Eating Policy to support student wellness.

- Every student is **offered a balanced breakfast and lunch each day**.
- Students also receive **nutrition lessons** through our partner, *Eat Right Now!*
- Families can support this effort by **sending only healthy drinks and snacks** to school.
- Teachers may ask students to put away foods that do not align with this policy.
- If your child has special dietary needs, please schedule a meeting with the school nurse.

Foods & Drinks to Avoid:

- Cookies, candy, and other sweets.
- Soda, sugary drinks, coffee, or hot beverages.
- Potato chips, Cheese Curls, and other junk foods.

Outside Food

Safety Guidelines

- Clear Labeling: Every item must have a full ingredient label attached. We cannot serve food that is unlabeled or homemade without a verifiable list of ingredients.
- Advance Notice: Parents must notify the classroom teacher at least 24 hours in advance before dropping off any food. This window is essential for teachers to review student allergy profiles and plan accordingly.

We want every student to feel included in the festivities. If a brought-in snack poses a risk to a student with specific allergies:

- The Backup Pantry: Cook-Wissahickon maintains a variety of safe, alternative snacks in the Main Office.
- Teachers may request these at any time to ensure no student is left out of a celebration.
- Parents may also provide 'backup' treats to be kept at school for their child to enjoy during classroom celebrations.

Please make sure any food allergies, no matter how severe, are shared with our school nurse.

School Nurse

Our school nurse helps ensure students are healthy and ready to learn. The nurse's responsibilities include:

- Treating ill or injured students.
- Assessing vision, hearing, growth, and other conditions that may affect learning.
- Developing and implementing health plans.
- Supporting students in building self-care skills.
- Assisting families in obtaining health insurance and healthcare services for their children.

Non-Emergency Visits:

- The nurse sees students for non-emergencies between **10:30 AM – 2:45 PM** (lunch break: **1:15 – 1:45 PM**).
- The school nurse is **not a substitute** for your family medical provider. Please do not send ill or injured children to school. Students may return once cleared by a medical practitioner with a **written note**.
- If your child is seen by the nurse, you will receive a **phone call and a letter**.
- If the nurse determines your child is too ill or injured to remain at school, you will be notified to pick them up.

Physical Examinations & Screenings

- Physical examinations are required for all new students.
- The nurse conducts periodic health screenings.

Student Illness

If a student feels ill during the day, they should go directly to the nurse, not call home on their own. Parents/guardians will be contacted if the student needs to go home.

Staying Home When Sick

Anyone who is sick—students, staff, or visitors—should stay home. If someone becomes ill while at school, they must leave the building promptly.

Student Medication

The school will only administer medication with written permission from both the parent/guardian and a physician. A completed [Medication Administration Form](#) is required and must be updated if the prescription changes.

Key rules:

- Medications must be in the original container, labeled with the student's name and prescription details
- All medications must be turned in to the nurse's office
- Students may not keep medication in desks, lockers, or backpacks
- Unused medication must be picked up by the end of the school year or it will be disposed of

A new authorization form is required each school year.

Immunization Requirements & Health Services

Pennsylvania law requires all students to be fully immunized or officially exempt before attending school. This is mandated by the PA Department of Health, Philadelphia County Board of Health, and the School District of Philadelphia.

- Our approach prioritizes **restorative practices**, giving students the opportunity to:
 - Reflect on their actions.
 - Explain their behavior.
 - Write apologies when necessary.
 - Identify strategies to avoid future problems.
- In cases of serious misconduct, the **School District's Code of Conduct** will be fully enforced by school administration.

Code of Conduct

Students are expected to follow school rules at all times—both during school hours and at school-sponsored events. Violations may result in disciplinary action as outlined in the District Student Code of Conduct.

Dress Code/Uniform Policy

The School District of Philadelphia, under board policy 221, requires that all students wear school uniforms every day that school is in session. If school administrators determine clothing is inappropriate or does not conform to these expectations, parents/guardians will be notified, and the student may lose dress-down day (NUT Day) privileges.

If a student violates the dress code:

- A parent/guardian may be contacted

Homework

The goal of homework is to encourage shared responsibility of parents, students, and teachers; to reinforce skills through appropriate assignments; to create a positive home-school connection; and to extend literacy to the home.

Parent/Guardian Responsibilities: Establish a consistent homework routine that includes a quiet work environment with appropriate supplies to promote a positive attitude toward homework and reinforce its value. Clarify directions to foster pride in the completed task. Communicate with teachers regarding questions and difficulties related to homework.

Student Responsibilities: Receive, record, and take home assignments. Ask your teacher for clarification and/or help if the assignment needs to be understood before you leave school. Show effort and do your best work. Complete and return assignments on time. Inform your teacher of any difficulty regarding the assignment.

Teacher Responsibilities: Communicate homework expectations to parents and students. Ensure that assignments are connected to the curriculum and appropriate for the students. Create an environment where students can ask for clarification of assignments. Provide feedback on homework in a timely manner. Respond to parent concerns and keep parents apprised of homework issues.

Parent Complaint Resolution Policy: Teachers are expected to maintain regular contact with parents when problems arise. If, after you have made several attempts to resolve a problem directly with your child's teacher, you feel it has not been resolved, you may contact the Principal by e-mail or by leaving a message with the office staff.
