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Personal Note

To preface this whole guide, it's important to remember that a good pair of bachi won't necessarily make or break your performance. The player themselves is ultimately the driving force and a good pair can only help you improve yourself. So no matter what you're able to get, you will be able to improve and become a better player. Debatably only once you reach roughly Choujin 超人, will bachi become a hindrance.

If you are interested in bachi themselves, I would highly recommend experimenting and making your own bachi, it can be a fun experience and only then, do I think that you'll be able to find your own "endgame" pair.

I'd also like to thank the members of the Australian and American Taiko communities who have helped me put together and clean up this guide A. It would not have been without the effort of the community that this could have been put together.

General Properties of Sticks

This section covers the general properties of sticks and the main features which will discern any two pairs. Alongside this information there is a good guide for preferencing and figuring out what may be best for your use here: minamitori.jp/features.

Material \checkmark



Material is the most significant quality of a pair of bachi since most other things can be tuned down later. For beginners, most any wood can be used however generally Japanese Cypress or American Cypress is recommended because of its light weight quality.

Weight 1

Weights mostly follow the bachi material and its density. Often any two pairs of bachi will not be the same weight and will have some amount of difference. Bachi producers typically aim to build pairs of sticks which already have similar weights so there isn't too much to worry about, this includes ± weight differences.

For beginners, the particularity of weight should not be a large concern as learning or training with heavier sticks can help improve forearm strength and endurance. If it is a concern, look for Aomori Hiba and Cypress sticks.

Weight can also be tuned with grip tape to aid in the position of the center of gravity of a stick.

Length 📏



Length primarily contributes to the handling of a pair of bachi. For the most part, it comes down to feeling and preference, however it is important to note that most bachi are made to be within the 39 cm range.

Tuning Bachi

Grip Tape Purchasing Mini-Guide

Grip tape is typically used to tune bachi by providing either cushioning for comfort or by helping balance out weight. Typically, "Badminton Overgrip" is used as it provides an easy to control and manipulate material. Generally speaking, any kind of overgrip tape will work to wrap bachi but how you use the tape matters significantly more than the tape itself. Having said that, there are qualities which definitely benefit tape.

It is important to differentiate between **overgrip** and **replacement grip** as replacement grip is significantly thicker however, typically lasts longer. It is not often used due to its thickness and typically increases tackiness however is not impossible to use.

With tape, the **texture** is the key feature for long term usage. In applications such as racquet sports, having a tacky grip is incredibly important as it generally aids the power grip. Therefore looking for slightly smoother grips can reduce friction between your hands and the tape. The 3 more popular types of grip tape which can be seen are "**Wet**", "**Dry**" and "**Perforated**" tapes.

Ultimately with grip tape, the most important thing is that you find the tape which feels best for you and the tape you like the look of. There are many varieties of tape in different colours and designs so finding the tape which best suits your eyes is key because, ultimately you will see your bachi the most, so best to find something you like.

Not much actively maintained documentation is done on the difference between grips. However from personal experience, I prefer a wet grip tape due to the smoother feel against perforated. I am yet to properly try a dry grip due to availability.

Grip Tape Usage

Applying grip tape is fundamentally the same as any other application. The primary techniques and motions to actually apply it are well documented on YouTube (<u>Personal video suggestion</u>). Most typical applications include two layers of badminton overgrip for increased cushioning and a thicker grip.

For beginners wrapping over existing wrap especially with cheaper unbranded pairs is a good way to start wrapping as it lets you get a bit more comfort out without the risk of no longer having warp on your sticks.

It is important to remember when wrapping, to have a strong and taut wrap around, while not also stretching out the tape too much. With time, the feeling and proficiency to wrap will come. Wrapping by personal feel is again the most important thing, as you will generally find positions where comfort is achieved.

There are a few gripping styles which have been seen which provide either performance or aesthetics. Below are some of these including their qualities.


Brands

This section covers the more popular brands of bachi which have been seen within different communities. This is not an exhaustive list but are some of the standout brands which you may find yourself while looking. For some guidance on international shipping, please see here.

In any community, there will always also be local makers and smaller producers who want to share their own pieces with others. If you are beginning, this may be a good opportunity to get a pair for a reasonable price and to support a local business.

Brandless Maibachi

- Typically an inconsistent build with a heavy, low quality timber
- Will make-do for beginners as fundamentally they are a weight improvement over house bachi
- Notes
 - Can be found on almost every marketplace
 - Often a dropship / resell from a much cheaper marketplace such as AliExpress
 - Reasonable to purchase if you are only exploring Taiko and seeing if you enjoy it



Official Maibachi

- "Maybe" purchasable from your local arcade
- Consistent build quality
- Are the only allowed bachi for the Taiko World Championship
 - Additional grip tape can be applied
- Notes:
 - Yellow maibachi are prone to breaking more frequently than other sticks
 - Blue and Yellow maibachi are considerably thinner than other sticks

- Notes
 - I think the official likes are meant to be for younger children given that it wouldn't be usable in official WCS events
 - Premium has just a nicer feel but the price tag should be kept in mind





International Proxy Shipping

For purchasers in regions where brands / marketplaces cannot ship directly too, a proxy service or direct contact to a shipping company may need to be made.
