club via zoom led by the SSP team. In place to allow children to access extra-curricular sport during the lockdown and restricted period. Throughout January, February and March – the SSP delivered a 'live' PE afternoon with KS1 and KS2 sessions available through zoom for students at home and in school to access. Throughout February and March (during lockdown period) the SSP Get Up and Active daily early morning club was free to access for all students to re-engage students with physical activity and get them ready for the school day. A large bank of pre-recorded video resources created by the SSP team to support at home/in school PE delivery and physical activity participation.

- The creation and delivery of regular physical activity challenges , festivals and competitions delivered virtually to increase participation.
- The SSP provided fortnightly 'home learning' activity cards and packs which were set as daily tasks for PE at home and used by staff in schools.
