Abbreviated title. Must contain up to 50 characters

Abstract

A brief description of the review article between 100 and 250 words. It should not contain bibliographic citations, acronyms, or abbreviations.

Keywords: (First letter capitalized, Times New Roman 12, justified, 4 or 5 words, separated by semicolons, alphabetically ordered).

Resumen

Same content as the English abstract, but written in Spanish.

Palabras clave: in Spanish, the same words and style as used in the "Keywords" section.

A review article compiles the most relevant information on a given topic, without a word limit, with at least 90 bibliographic references, organized into thematic subdivisions at the author's discretion. It may include tables and/or figures.

Write the text... Citations should follow these formats: for a single author, (Sánchez, 1999); two authors, (López and Araya, 2008); three or more authors: (Iglesias *et al.*, 2010). Multiple citations within the same paragraph should be ordered chronologically, starting with the oldest. If there are more than two works from the same author in the same year, they should be identified with sequential letters (Sánchez, 1998a,b). Any direct quote should be enclosed in quotation marks, citing the author. Use the International System of Units, based on the metric system.

Note: "*et al.*" must be in italics.

Acknowledgments (optional)

Acknowledge contributions to the research, including funding sources, specialists, official or private entities, field operators, lab technicians, reviewers, etc.

References

References must be ordered alphabetically.

TABLES

Create tables in Word, in black and white, with consecutive Arabic numbering (Table 1, etc.), without vertical borders. Refer to them in the text in numerical order. Include a self-explanatory caption indicating the references used in the tables without suggesting interpretation of the data. Incorporate the tables at the end of the References section. Accompany average values with a measure of data dispersion (e.g., standard deviation or errors).

FIGURES

Figures include graphs, photographs, maps, drawings, flow charts, etc. Each figure should be submitted in a separate file, no larger than 10 MB. They must be numbered with consecutive Arabic numbers (Figure 1, etc.) following the order in which they are cited in the text. Include a concise caption (a subtitle describing exactly what the figure represents) in the main text file, on a separate sheet after the References section. Indicate the reference for the initials used in the figure and the statistical test used, if applicable. Scientific names must be written in full.
