2. How is gentrification different to urban regeneration?
3. Why do geographers study gentrification? Why are we interested in it?
(Write this answer in your own words and using Professor Lee's explanation- do not copy the slide!)
4. How has the process of gentrification changed over time?
5. Who tends to be behind gentrification now? Pioneers or developments and governments?
6. What types of places does gentrification tend to impact?
7. How does gentrification impact a place?
8. What is super gentrification? And what is hyper-gentrification?
9. What is studentification?
10. What key group has long been associated with gentrification?
11. What are the key differences between gentrification in the global north and the global south?
(This question needs an extended answer!)
12. What has happened in China? What is the government trying to do here?
13. Why has resistance to gentrification increased? (This question needs an extended answer!)
14. To conclude, write 150 words of your own thoughts on gentrification. You can focus on any element that Professor Lees discussed.
