

PARTICIPATION AND EXPECTATIONS

Participating in co-curricular activities at PRHS can be a very meaningful experience. Through participation, you can build relationships, explore interests, and contribute to your school and local communities.

The PRHS Co-Curricular Advisers encourage all students to engage in co-curricular activities. However, we caution students to be thoughtful about these choices. Please consider the following before joining a club:

- Meaningful Attendance: some clubs require attendance and some allow you to 'drop in' when you can. For those that require attendance, plan to be on time and stay until the end. Be mindful of how many commitments you have and ask yourself if you will be able to engage in the meetings in a meaningful way. Just 'showing up' isn't enough make your participation meaningful and valuable, and avoid spreading yourself too thin.
- Plan Ahead: Consult the co-curricular calendar included in this packet to see when activities meet so you can make an educated decision regarding your ability to commit your time and energies. Avoid conflicts between different co-curricular meeting times and other commitments (like work, private lessons, family commitments etc).
- Less Is More: It is more valuable to participate in a few activities in a meaningful way than to compile a long list of co-curricular activities where it's hard to participate because you are too busy.
- **Leadership**: Clubs can be an excellent way to develop leadership skills. It is our strong recommendation that students do not hold officer positions in more than one or two organizations at a time so that you can concentrate your energies well.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Community service is something we do from our hearts in order to be of service to others. Students who are in an Honor Society are considered leaders in our school community and embody a spirit of altruism. We believe that serving others is an honor. We take pride in these service hours as a way to encourage civic involvement, raise social awareness, strengthen the community and bring people together.
