Chapter-by-Chapter Resources

1. "Under the Wire"

- Theme: Immigration and Displacement
- Exert: The family's journey across the border.
- Reflective Questions:
 - o How does the author describe the family's emotions during the crossing?
 - What does this journey symbolize for the family?
- Discussion Prompts:
