

Weekly DAO & Governance Call

Summary

Jamilya Kamalova led a session focused on improving delegate experience through AI tools, addressing governance contribution processing, and discussing the July voting and co-creation cycles. Participants like Tino SEED Gov and Matt Haynes shared concerns about AI's limitations, while Kenechukwu Eze highlighted the benefits of customized open-source models and proposed an AI backup delegate. The discussion centered on integrating AI tools for summarizing information, improving communication preferences, and the need for tools to assist delegates without replacing human judgment.

Details

- Meeting Agenda and Al Poll Recap Jamilya Kamalova initiated the meeting, stating that the primary goal was a collaborative Miro board session to gather insights on improving delegate experience and potential Al tools. She noted that a recent Al poll, despite low participation, provided valuable insights, and the Miro board session aimed to delve deeper into the topic (00:00:00).
- Governance Contribution Distribution and KYC/KYB Jamilya Kamalova announced that governance contribution recognition distribution was being processed and urged anyone experiencing delays or issues to get in touch (00:01:07). Eugene Leventhal added that there were some issues with the provider for KYB, causing delays for some individuals, and that the team was working to resolve this by the end of the week (00:03:32).

- July Voting Cycle and CCC Co-creation Cycle Jamilya Kamalova informed participants that no proposals reached the endorsement threshold for the July voting cycle, meaning no proposals would go live this cycle. She also mentioned that calls for the CCC co-creation cycle, focusing on DAO design and councils, have been added to the governance calendar (00:02:17). Eugene Leventhal clarified that the co-creation cycle workshops on July 21st and 28th would be shortened with an asynchronous component in collaboration with Harmonica (00:04:41).
- Negation Game and Forum Discourse Jamilya Kamalova highlighted the Negation Game, suggesting it as a valuable experience for those unfamiliar with it, and noted that Conor's proposal bonanza would feature it (00:02:17). Eugene Leventhal emphasized the continued work with the Negation Game as part of exploring alternatives to forum-based discourse (00:04:41).
- Initial Impressions of AI Tooling Jamilya Kamalova guided the participants
 through a warm-up exercise on the Miro board, asking them to share their first
 associations, feelings, hopes, and fears regarding AI tooling (00:07:13). Tino
 SEED Gov expressed concerns about standardized thinking and the lack of
 context in AI responses (00:14:17). Matt Haynes also shared concerns about
 who governs and tunes AI, privacy, data ownership, and over-reliance on
 centralized AI (00:18:30).
- Decentralized AI and AI as a Backup Delegate Matt Haynes asserted that
 decentralized AI is crucial, advocating for mindful use of AI tools. Kenechukwu
 Eze, while acknowledging concerns about centralized AI, highlighted the benefits
 of customizing open-source models for productivity, particularly for sorting large
 datasets (00:19:43). They also proposed the idea of an AI backup delegate that
 could vote on behalf of inactive delegates, using their voting history as context
 (00:20:45).
- Current Delegate Experience and Tooling Jamilya Kamalova then directed the
 discussion to what works and doesn't work in the current delegate experience,
 encouraging participants to think beyond AI tooling (00:21:53). Samater
 Mohamed mentioned using tools like ChatGPT to summarize long proposals and
 comments, which helps in quickly understanding key points and could increase
 participation (00:29:52). Miss Kiarie emphasized the benefit of information depth
 provided by AI, which helps in exploring various options and improving reasoning
 for governance issues (00:30:54).

- Al Tool Preferences Eugene Leventhal inquired if anyone was using Al tools other than ChatGPT, to which Tino SEED Gov and Antoine Vergne responded that they primarily use Claude, with Antoine also experimenting with V venise and Yapper (00:33:12). Eugene Leventhal also mentioned his interest in checking with the public Al network crew about piloting decentralized Al solutions (00:34:22).
- Low-Hanging Fruit for Al Tooling in Governance Jamilya Kamalova prompted the group to identify "low-hanging fruit" simple Al tools that could easily be implemented in the Scroll DAO governance to improve the delegate experience (00:36:46). Matt Haynes suggested an Al newsletter that summarizes key points and action items from calls and links to forum posts, delivered via email, to help with information consumption and reduce context switching (00:39:45).
- Communication Preferences for Governance Updates Jamilya Kamalova asked if weekly governance recaps, currently shared on the forum and delegate chat, would be more helpful if delivered via email subscription (00:41:08). Daniel Anomfueme supported email summaries, noting that current email notifications from the forum only highlight popular topics without providing actionable summaries, and that Telegram can be messy (00:46:55). Eugene Leventhal suggested a standalone Telegram notification bot as an alternative, considering some web3 users prefer to keep all related information within Telegram (00:44:17).
- Green Flags, Red Flags, and Maybes for Al Tooling Jamilya Kamalova introduced a segment for participants to indicate whether certain Al tooling statements were a "green flag," "red flag," or "maybe" for them (00:48:03). It was noted that the sentiment leaned towards Al assisting but not replacing human judgment (00:49:15) (00:56:47). Tino SEED Gov explained their "maybe" for Al drafting rationales, citing their experience with Claude generating generic or insufficient reasons, often over-relying on KPIs (00:52:32). Matt Haynes attributed this to Al's limitations in context and token limits, suggesting that local deployment and long-term context building could provide more valuable Al assistance (00:54:31).
- Communication Preferences Jamilya Kamalova observed that email is more
 convenient for notifications than Discord and delegate chats, noting their own
 hesitation to use "notify everyone" features due to concerns about creating too
 much noise. They invited feedback on the frequency of pinned messages,
 emphasizing that delegate job should not be made harder (00:59:29).

- Al Tool Integration Jamilya Kamalova discussed the results of a poll where most people preferred Al tools embedded in Discourse due to existing conversations, but also supported an experimental Al Telegram tool for notifications and summaries. They sought delegate input on the most useful placement for an Agora Telegram tool, aiming to avoid a separate dashboard (01:00:37).
- Problem Definition for Solutions Matt Haynes suggested identifying and clearly
 defining a "low-hanging problem" before seeking solutions, as attempting to find
 a solution without a defined problem can lead to nebulous outcomes. They
 believed that focusing on a clear problem would spark interesting debates about
 the nature of the DAO and its operations (01:02:12).
- Delegate Tool Needs Jamilya Kamalova interpreted the sentiment from delegates as a strong need for tools that summarize information, help process abundant materials, and reduce time spent manually reviewing proposals. They clarified that delegates want tools to speed up decision-making processes, not replace their work or proposal drafting (01:03:06).
- Meeting Conclusion Jamilya Kamalova thanked attendees for participating in the
 collaborative mural board session, noting its helpfulness. They explained that
 two identical sessions would be run to accommodate different time zones, and
 the input, combined with Al polling results, would clarify key issues and preferred
 tools (01:04:50).

We are processing it. Uh so um you probably if you require KYB we probably are already in contact. If not just ping us uh there is a KYC form and uh most of you have completed it already. Uh next thing uh so July voting cycle unfortunately this voting cycle we didn't have any of the proposals that would reach the threshold with uh endorsements.

So yeah, feel free to check. We had the proposal a couple weeks back. It was uh very cool because we get to walk through the whole negation game experience together with Connor.

Kenechukwu Eze: Yeah, while while I understand the concern of you know using the centralized we're already in the world where we have centralized and decentralized AI I think when you run your own models obviously using the open source models it could be it could be you know stuff you could get through lama it could be deepseync it could be anything the amount of customization you are able to put into this can actually unlock the productivity you know that you may be looking for I don't think you should use it to write your rational I think that's outsourcing your thinking but when you're doing some granular levels of research that requires sorting through large volumes of data sets that would take you weeks to go through and maybe you're quering with SQL you're

trying to draw inferences from a lot of things AI can speed up that process at least on the technical side in my experience.

Kenechukwu Eze: So while you know when you're using an open AI or maybe a cloud and they have to borrow context from somewhere else whether they have immediate context you could utilize all the data we have in our ecosystem which is mostly open source to feed your own your own custom model this information and then use it to improve your workflow. I don't think the right approach is you know completely um not working with it or outsourcing it. I think you can customize it to your own parameters obviously beyond using you know charg. So that's my own perspective on that and like regarding my comments on using it as a backup delegate the same thing in the sense that if for example you're not able to vote we already have a solution on stable website with this called oxcart but if you're not able to vote on a proposal you should be able to have an AI delegate that has a context on your voting history how you vote how you engage with proposals on the forum and I could vote on your behalf that way people don't miss proposals this is especially needed in that where obviously a lot more delegates are needed to pass quorum So I think having a backup AI delegate that has access to voting on your voting power could be helpful as well.
