Wellington College and Victoria University: HIST113 The World Remade

Through a unique partnership, Wellington College 13HIU students will enrol in HIST113 The World Remade, a first-year Victoria University history paper focused on the interwar period from 1919 to 1939. Students must have achieved University Entrance (Literacy) and Merit or Excellence in all Level 2 subjects, ideally including history. Students will gain access to university lectures, facilities, and academic staff. Successful completion earns 20 university points in history and provides a valuable head start on tertiary study.
