plus 1 week remote pre- and post- trip



The Center for Peace and Global Citizenship (CPGC) will be offering fellowships for two to four students during summer 2024 with the Ticha Project based in Oaxaca, Mexico. This funded opportunity is part of a larger CPGC fellowship that offers a preparatory and post-internship program which includes individual guidance and peer support. Supervised by Professor Brook Lillehaugen, the Ticha Project is a community engaged digital scholarship project centered on a corpus of Zapotec language texts from the Mexican Colonial period. The Ticha website allows users to access and explore many interlinked layers of texts from a corpus of Colonial Valley Zapotec manuscripts and printed books, including images of the original documents, transcriptions, translations, and linguistic analysis, including morphological interlinearization. Ticha seeks to make this corpus of Colonial Zapotec texts accessible to scholars in diverse fields, Zapotec community members, and the general public. Importantly, this work is done in close collaboration with Zapotec community members, including the Ticha Zapotec advisory board. Our team works collaboratively, and centers Zapotec authority and practices. Interns will have an opportunity to learn directly from Zapotec team members and will be expected to bring their talents and time to the project with enthusiasm and dedication and to communicate clearly with the team throughout the internship.

During Summer 2024 the Ticha Project will be hosting 8-week long internships (6 weeks in person, preceded and followed by 1 week remote). The in-person part of the internship will begin on **Monday, July 1 in Oaxaca, Mexico.** Interns will be based in Tlacolula de Matamoros, Oaxaca for the in person component (**through appx August 11**). Interns will be expected to work through 40 hours of preparatory readings, reflections, and online discussions (mostly asynchronous) before the start of the internship. The last week of the internship (**Aug 12-17**) will be done remotely, mostly asynchronously.

Fellowship Description

Summer interns will be involved in a range of possible projects connected with the Ticha Project including the Ticha website, the associated Zapotec Talking Dictionaries, and other related pedagogical material for Zapotec language. Possible areas of contribution include the following, though the list is not exhaustive:

- helping plan and run educational workshops
- drafting, researching, and editing educational materials (in English and Spanish)
- note taking and report writing for the Ticha team
- encoding (XML)
- translation (English $\leftarrow \rightarrow$ Spanish)
- networking and communicating with teachers / instructors in the U.S. and Mexico, including via social media
- collaborative language documentation (audio / video recording & database work)
