Course Description:

This course introduces students to the principles and practices of effective oral communication, exploring a range of rhetorical styles, including slam poetry, spoken word, debate, and business communication. Emphasis will be placed on developing critical listening, speaking, and presentation skills. Through hands-on activities, students will learn to articulate their thoughts, construct persuasive arguments, and engage various audiences with clarity and confidence.

Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Understand and apply principles of effective oral communication across different contexts.
- 2. Identify and use various rhetorical styles, including slam poetry, spoken word, debate, and business presentations.
- 3. Develop and deliver speeches and presentations that demonstrate clarity, coherence, and persuasiveness.
- 4. Critically analyze and evaluate oral communication in public settings.
- 5. Demonstrate proficiency in business communication, including delivering reports, pitches, and professional presentations.

Week 1: Introduction to Oral Communication

Week 2: Principles of Effective Public Speaking

Topics:

- Audience analysis and engagement
- Structuring a speech (introduction, body, conclusion)
- Overcoming speech anxiety

- Speech structure exercise

Assignments:

- o Prepare a short introductory speech
- Read Chapter 2 and 3 of Exploring Public Speaking

Week 3: Slam Poetry and Spoken Word

• Topics:

- The role of personal voice and storytelling

Activities:

- Watch and analyze slam poetry performances
- Writing and performing a personal poem

• Assignments:

- Write and prepare to perform a short slam poem
- Read articles on slam poetry (provided on LMS)

Week 4: Debate and Argumentation

• Topics:

- Fundamentals of debate structure (proposition, opposition, rebuttal)
- Building and defending arguments
- Logical fallacies and counterarguments

Activities:

- o Group debate practice
- Analyzing debate recordings

• Assignments:

- o Prepare for a class debate on a current issue
- Read Chapter 6 of Exploring Public Speaking

Week 5: Storytelling and Narrative Techniques

• Topics:

- Importance of storytelling in communication
- Elements of an engaging narrative
- Techniques for effective storytelling

Activities:

- Storytelling exercises in pairs
- Analyzing TED Talks with strong narrative elements

Assignments:

- Write and present a personal narrative
- Watch a TED Talk and write a reflection

Week 6: Midterm Presentations

- o Deliver a prepared speech in front of the class
- o Peer feedback and self-reflection

- Prepare and practice for the midterm speech
- Submit a self-reflection on the midterm presentation

Week 7: Business Communication: Reports and Pitches

- Structuring a business report and elevator pitch
- Visual aids and presentation software (e.g., PowerPoint)

• Activities:

- Crafting and delivering an elevator pitch
- Business report presentation practice

• Assignments:

- Prepare a draft of a business report
- Read Chapter 10 of Exploring Public Speaking

Week 8: Persuasion and Influence

• Topics:

• Techniques for persuasive communication

- The psychology of persuasion
- Ethical considerations in persuasive speech

• Activities:

- Analyzing persuasive advertisements
- Practicing persuasive speech delivery

Assignments:

- o Develop a persuasive speech topic
- Read Chapter 14 of Exploring Public Speaking

Week 9: Panel Discussions and Group Presentations

• Topics:

- Dynamics of group communication
- Organizing and moderating panel discussions
- Collaborative presentations

• Activities:

- Group project work sessions
- Panel discussion practice

• Assignments:

- Prepare for a group panel discussion
- Read article on group communication (provided on LMS)

Week 10: Reviewing and Refining Skills

• Topics:

- Feedback techniques for oral presentations
- Refining delivery style and body language
- Preparing for the final presentation

Activities:

- Peer review sessions
- One-on-one coaching

Assignments:

- Finalize the speech for the final presentation
- o Practice with a peer outside of class

Week 11: Final Presentations
