EVALUATION CRITERIA AND METHODS

- 1. Academic grades will be based on the quality and quantity of work submitted on time according to directions and expectations above.
- 2. Half of your grade will be from tests and presentations and the other half will be from your packets.

3. In keeping with SDUSD procedure #5121 the following grades will be used:

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"A" = Superior achievement.
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"B" = Above average achievement.

Academic credit for each month is based on submission of materials by due dates. Taking a test at a time other than the class period may incur a 5% grade penalty unless prior authorization was given. While attendance credit for each month and is based on submission of monthly work by due dates, academic grades are based on the quality of work submitted on time, according to directions, and demonstrating proficiency. Assignments turned in late, but within one work month are subject to a 20%-point reduction from what is otherwise earned. Work that is more than one work month late is not accepted at all (e.g., work from Month 3 may be turned in during Month 4 for a 20%-point reduction and work from Month 3 is no longer accepted once Month 5 begins).

Content warning - Our classroom provides an open space for the critical and civil exchange of ideas. Some readings and other content in this course will include topics that some students may find offensive and/or traumatizing. I'll aim to fore warn students about potentially disturbing content and I ask all students to help to create an atmosphere of mutual respect and sensitivity. If you believe that you will find the discussion to be traumatizing, you may choose to not participate in the discussion or to leave the classroom. If you ever feel the need to step outside during one of these discussions, either for a short time or for the rest of the class session, you may always do so without academic penalty. (You will, however, be responsible for any material you miss. If you do leave the room for a significant time, please make arrangements to get notes from another student or see me individually.) If you ever wish to discuss your personal reactions to this material, either with the class or with me afterwards, I welcome such discussion as an appropriate part of our coursework.
