Tracking the Trump Administration's Executive Orders and Actions

Please continue to monitor this resource as we will update it regularly. Last update: September 3, 2025.

Since taking office, the second Trump administration has attacked nearly all of our freedoms, public services and protections, and the programs on which our communities rely for health care, housing, education, safety, and more.

At NETWORK, we are committed to keeping our communities informed and to telling the truth about how this Administration is harming us all. As part of that effort, we have compiled this resource to track the Trump administration's executive orders and actions, which threaten all aspects of NETWORK's "An Economy for All" Agenda:

- Jobs with paid leave and wages that cover our bills, retirement, and more
- Affordable housing, food, and health care for all
- Safe and welcoming neighborhoods

- Clean air and water
- A tax code that ensures the weal share
- A just and humane immigration
- A politics responsive to the peop

Below are tables that list many (not all) of the Administration's executive actions, their impacts, and the ongoing litigation (legal action) challenging them. The tables are organized according to how the executive actions undermine our "An Economy for All" agenda areas. **Please use the navigator menu at the left to jump to the section you would like to read about.**

You will quickly notice that this document is very long! Its sheer volume reflects the dangerous reality that the Trump administration has flooded our nation with attacks on our freedoms, our rights, and our communities. With this deluge, the Trump administration *intends* to make us feel too overwhelmed to challenge their actions. But their strategy is not working. Across the country, people are working to protect us from this Administration's harms–and **you can join in taking action!**

We will continue to update this resource as many Republican policymakers take further steps to enrich themselves and their ultra-wealthy backers at the expense of our communities. Please use this resource in any way that helps you deepen your understanding of what we are facing and how we can take care of one another—so that everyone thrives, no exceptions.

A note on legal terminology: For some of these executive orders and actions, you will see that a judge has issued a temporary restraining order, or "TRO." This means that the Trump administration must hold off on taking their action for a brief amount of time (e.g. 7-10 days). After that point, the judge may issue a



preliminary injunction that prevents the Administration from taking the action until the case is fully litigated, which can take months. If the judge does not issue a preliminary injunction, the TRO expires and the Administration can go ahead and take action, even while the case continues through litigation. Please be aware that rulings may be appealed or altered by a court of appeals or even the Supreme Court. We will see these processes happen often with these executive orders and actions.

Weekly update summary: September 3, 2025

Recently, the Trump administration...

- Imposed political appointee control over every federal grant award decision. This will subject the approval of public health, medical, scientific, and other grant funding to the political whims of the White House.
- Has increased investigations and prosecutions of President Trump's former political opponents and investigators of his past conduct, transforming the DOJ into an agency that serves the president's personal retribution campaign.



- Took extreme executive actions to take over the D.C. police department, mobilize the National Guard, and deploy federal law enforcement to D.C., to date largely targeting immigrants and individuals experiencing homelessness.
- **Took away collective bargaining rights** and other worker protections from employees in a range of federal agencies.
- Announced a "pocket recission" to cancel nearly \$5 billion in already-appropriated funds for life-saving international assistance and diplomatic efforts, directly challenging Congress's constitutional spending authority.
- Attempted to fire a Federal Reserve board member based on unproven allegations, in an effort to take control of the Federal Reserve, in conflict with the Federal Reserve's statutory independence.
- Barred state and local governments and nonprofits that receive federal funding from assisting undocumented immigrants with emergency health, food, and shelter during natural disasters and other emergencies.

Recently in the courts...

- A group of voters in New Hampshire sued to challenge a new law that imposes strict identity verification requirements on mail voting, which risks the disenfranchisement of seniors and voters with disabilities.
- The 5th Circuit upheld a ruling that Louisiana's legislative maps violated the Voting Rights Act, forcing the state to create districts that ensure Black voters have an equal opportunity to elect candidates of their choice.
- The D.C. Attorney General sued the Trump administration for its "brazenly unlawful" attempt to federalize and control the Metropolitan Police Department.
- A Trump-appointed federal judge in Maryland ruled that President Trump's anti-DEI order was unlawful, unconstitutional and void, blocking them nationwide. The order had threatened to withhold funding from public schools unless they removed or altered lessons on race and ended student support programs benefiting certain populations.
- The 9th Circuit sided with the Trump administration and halted, for now, a lower court's order that had kept in place temporary protections for 60,000 migrants from Honduras, Nicaragua, and Nepal.

Aug. 2025: A new executive order removes collective bargaining rights, protections against unfair labor practices, and other important worker protections guaranteed by the Federal Service Labor-Management Relations Act, from employees in a range of federal agencies.

Ending diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) programs: Terminates federal programs, executive orders, private sector, and educational programs that support diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility in the federal government and in external programs that receive federal support. Mandates measures to deter future related programs.

The Department of Education terminated \$600 million in K-12 grants, alleging that the grants involved diversity, equity, and inclusion efforts.

DOE has also shut down the office that investigates race- and sex-based discrimination.

This action will terminate funding for programs nationwide that help realize individuals' potential and foster respect and belonging in workplaces.

Many businesses and corporations have scaled back or abandoned their previous commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion, citing fear of legal pressure or political backlash.

This action will severely limit opportunities for education and workforce development, especially for people with disabilities, Black, Brown, and Indigenous people, and other individuals who have historically had fewer opportunities to be considered for jobs, and if chosen, to be supported in their workplaces.

Mobilizing the military against civilians:

President Trump ordered the Marines and 2,000 National Guard officers to Los Angeles, over the objections of the mayor and governor and without the authorization of Congress, to quell peaceful demonstrations that were responding to ICE raids.

NETWORK's support for other litigation:

- On Meta's discriminatory practices: NETWORK has reached out to the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law expressing support for their lawsuit against tech company Meta for discrimination in advertising higher education opportunities. The lawsuit alleges that Meta disproportionately steers advertisements regarding predatory for-profit schools to Black people while steering ads for public nonprofit schools to white people on social media platforms Facebook and Instagram. The lawsuit alleges this is a violation of the D.C. Human Rights Act and Consumer Protection Procedures Act.
- On the Affordable Care Act's no-cost preventive services mandate: On Feb. 18, 2025, NETWORK signed onto an Amicus Brief in *Braidwood v. Becerra*, a case before the Supreme Court challenging the validity of the no-cost preventive services mandate under the Affordable Care Act. NETWORK joined the United States of Care in recognizing the importance of maintaining no-cost preventive care for diseases including diabetes, cancer, heart disease, depression, and tobacco use. On Apr. 14, 2025, SCOTUS heard oral arguments on this case.
