

Dear Michigan Legislators,

We urge you to vote **NO** on House Bills [4257](#) and [4265](#) (“Bills”), which would significantly weaken Michigan’s environmental protections by stripping away essential oversight of harmful waste streams processed through anaerobic digesters. These Bills are written so broadly that they would apply to any facility with a digester, regardless of location or feedstock type. That includes those handling manure from Concentrated Animal Feeding Operations (CAFOs), slaughterhouse waste, and industrial waste.

We are deeply concerned about the following:

- **If passed, these bills would turn Michigan’s farmland and rural communities into dumping grounds for underregulated industrial waste.** Anaerobic digestion is not a waste management solution, despite how it is marketed by corporate entities profiting from the commercial production of methane gas, also known as biogas. The real driver behind the push for digesters and deregulation isn’t public good; it’s profit. These bills clear the path.
- **Digestate, the material left after digestion, is not a benign fertilizer.** It can contain microplastics, PFAS, heavy metals, pharmaceuticals, and other harmful substances, none of which are neutralized by the digestion process. The technology does not eliminate odors or pathogens, nor does it reduce overall waste volume or nutrient load. In fact, the nitrogen and phosphorus in digestate become more water-soluble, increasing the risk of leaching into groundwater and running off into nearby lakes and rivers. This poses a greater threat to private drinking water wells and will worsen nutrient pollution in Michigan’s already impaired surface waters.
- **Any facility that adds a digester would be exempt from the siting, licensing, and operational requirements that normally apply to disposal areas under Part 115.**
- **EGLE would no longer have meaningful oversight of these dangerous waste streams, and the Bills’ one-time registration requirement is no substitute for the more protective standards of NPDES permits.** Instead, operators would be granted legal immunity for discharges as long as they follow GAAMPs—unenforceable, voluntary guidelines that are weaker and never intended to govern industrial waste disposal.

For a more detailed assessment of the environmental risks, and a legal analysis of how these bills violate the Michigan Constitution’s natural resources protection mandate, the Michigan Environmental Protection Act (MEPA), Part 31 of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act (NREPA), the federal Clean Water Act, and other environmental protections, we urge you to review the enclosed [memorandum](#) prepared by the Environmental Law & Policy Center.

Please stand up for Michigan’s waters, farmland, and rural and downstream communities. Vote NO on HB 4257 and 4265.
