We're continuing our consent-giving decision-making process. As we continue to encourage contributions of all community members, it is also important that new contributors seek and receive "consent" of their proposed action and – at the same time – provide a process for the team to be notified of the proposed action, to discuss proposed actions and to reach agreement on proposed community actions in order to avoid any conflict with team members who are engaged in existing operations on ProgCode Actions. This type of mindful contribution ensures cohesion in that team members working on functions within the community are made aware of functions projects happening in all other parts of the house. We want to encourage member initiative and ensure community buy-in for each proposed action. In so doing we make sure each proposed action is mission-aligned, in the best interest of the community and will not disrupt any actions which have previously received consent through community vote. Any potential for conflicting actions or disruption of ongoing functions can then be worked out amicably through communication and co-organization of efforts in the spirit of collaboration.

Any member is empowered to place their idea or initiative into the [ProgCode GitHub Functions Board](#) at any time, without seeking the team's consent. In this way we uphold and encourage ProgCode values of individual initiative and autonomous action. Once a new ProgCode GitHub Function is created, it becomes part of the following Monday's ProgCode Operations Meeting Agenda. Once the member who proposed the new agenda item has pitched their proposed action and it has been discussed by the community, it will be put to a live vote at that Ops Meeting. No live vote becomes final until the expiration of a 72 hour waiting period, described below.

If any member is unable to attend the regularly scheduled Monday Operations Meeting, Meeting Notes and Conference Video will be posted in #team-announcements and in #operations as soon as they are finalized and rendered. In this way, community members who were unable to attend the meeting still have 72 hours (or until Thursday of that week) to ask questions, contribute thoughts and ideas, to consent to any live vote or to provide feedback as to why they choose to withhold consent for any live vote which was taken at that Monday's Operations Meeting. Members may give consent (+1), withhold consent (-1) or abstain (~) from voting in the comments next to the Agenda item where consent was requested.

- **Standard Change - Create A Pilot Discretionary Budget for Operations and Community Projects #278**
 - This proposal would allot the sum of up to \$10,000.00 to each of the following:
 - CarpoolAction - tech development, including, without limitation, the restructuring and implementation of tech revisions necessary to meet the vision of Developer Sasjka Otto.

- EnviroTrack - tech development, including, without limitation, the creation of 10 - 25 detection units for proof-of-concept testing and reimbursement to Robert Diamond of funds advanced to-date.
- ProgCode Operations - basic tasks necessary for the operation of ProgCode, including, without limitation, monitoring and logging donations, assisting ProgCode's CPA with accounting records, website design and development, promotion through regularly-scheduled social media posts, and implementation and maintenance of Progbot.
- Overview
 - At least three members of a team (CarpoolAction, EnviroTrack, and Operations Staff) are required to propose tasks necessary to complete an essential function of the project, along with a fixed price to be paid. Criteria for the tech project work would be outlined by the team on a task or phase-of-completion basis, with a proposed fixed sum.
 - Members of the ProgCode community would be notified of the opportunities to undertake a task by a mass e-mail notice and by Slack notices. Contracts would be granted by the vote of three members of the project or operations team. Those team members are responsible to manage and oversee the performance of the work and to determine whether and when the task or project phase has been completed satisfactorily. Any discrepancies will be addressed by the Operations Staff.
 - This proposal is submitted for a vote for consent to implement.
 - If approved, the Operations Staff will create a process to implement recordkeeping and other data-tracking for all expenditures.
 - The proposal will be kept open for modification, based on experiences and need.

- [Issue 277 - Standard Change - EnviroTrack Development Budget Proposal](#) (Stephen Scapelliti)
 - This proposal seeks a limited budget and authorization for the directors to spend up to \$1,364.65 on development costs for the community project EnviroTrack, including partial reimbursement of a team lead who has advanced most of the project development costs to-date.
 - EnviroTrack is a community project and a centerpiece of the pitch in the community's efforts to procure grant funding, which resulted in conditional approval of a forthcoming grant.
 - The project consists of the development of both hardware and software. Some individual members of the development team have expended personal funds to

procure materials and components needed for development, testing, and prototypes. Additional funding will be required.

- Robert Diamond expended at least \$545.86 for components, He and Arique Aguilar - who is recruiting students from Turing School for the project - estimate that the project will require 2.5 times that amount.
- The proposal seeks approval for \$1,364.65, of which \$545.86 will reimburse Robert, and the remaining balance will be used to procure components and other development tools.

- **EnviroTrack Backend (Robert Diamond)** - Discuss creation of a new droplet on DigitalOcean for the EnviroTrack backend
 - Heroku is cancelling the existing

- We need a few more features to make it useful, considering a rewrite using Flask (Python language web framework) and Postgres + PostGIS
 - Community vote for the cost of the droplet (will need help from Noah to get exact numbers) on 16 May.
 - I won't be able to attend the 16 May meeting.
- **Website Revamp (Noah Williams, Joe Breslin)** - Discuss the immediate and critical need to replace the ProgCode website and hosting platform.
 - Reasons:
 - The website tech is deprecated, and updating of text, images, and other features no longer is feasible.
 - The community previously authorized the updating of the site to include the purchase of a Mini Extensions Gallery for display of ProgCode projects and other information. None of this can be accomplished due to the obsolescence of the existing tech.

 - The Toolkit, which is essential to new member onboardings and to providing member guidance to ProgCode culture and norms has been taken offline, in connection with the website revamp.
 - ProgCode has initiated outreach to more than 40 prospective funding organizations. Our website is our billboard to the internet. Unfortunately, the website text reference to “501(c)(4)” cannot be updated to reflect the new 501(c)(3) status without risking the disturbance of other text and information on the site.
 - Due to the importance of the website (as outlined above), the Directors are authorizing interim spending of less than \$20.00 per month to establish a Dreamhost account for hosting the new ProgCode website.
 - An amendment to Proposal #269 for community authorization of this action and additional spending will be added this week for discussion and vote to implement on May 16, 2022.

- **Issue #262 - Standard Change - Grant Research Budget Proposal (Stephen Scapelliti)**

- This is an amendment to Proposal #262 to authorize the expenditure of an additional \$1,000.00 for grant research and writing services on behalf of Progressive Coders Network II. This amendment seeks consent implement.
 - On [July 26, 2021](#), the community approved the initial budget of \$1,000.00 to retain the contracted services of Justin Spees to perform grant research and funding outreach to potential grant donors.
 - Justin has issued detailed invoices for his services which have been paid as follows:
 - \$100.00 on 2021.08.13
 - \$150.00 on 2022.02.28
 - \$255.00 on 2022.03.31
 - \$315.00 on 2022.04.30
 - \$820 total
 - At this time, a balance of \$180.00 remains available for his services. Justin has done outreach to more than 40 prospective funding organizations on behalf of ProgCode. He also has contacted finders who seek out mission-aligned projects on behalf of funding organizations. Justin's insights and counsel have benefitted ProgCode in its funding activities., and at least two meetings with prospective donors are pending.
 - Issue #262 has been amended to request authorization for an additional \$1000.00 under the same terms and conditions which applied to the initial authorization.

- **Proposal to purchase and implement a ProgCode accounting software system:** *Discussion continued from August 12, 2019.* This is a proposal to select and purchase an annual subscription for accounting software for ProgCode operations.
 - [Standard Change - Purchase and implement a ProgCode accounting software system #256](#)
 - ProgCode has used an informal system of tracking expenses and revenue
 - Itemization is not required by the IRS for total annual receipts under \$50K; however, if we exceed that amount, as we hope from new fundraising efforts, an accounting system will enable ProgCode to itemize.
 - Also allows for annual notification to donors of their contributions for tax purposes.
 - Time for ProgCode to adopt standard business practices for operations, such as expenditures, projections, and prospective payroll needs.
 - Continued discussion about choice of software.
 - ProgCode qualifies for a 90% discount on an annual subscription for Quickbooks, as outlined in the proposal. The CPA retained by ProgCode uses Quickbooks and can easily transfer data to and from that platform for other account needs, such as the preparation of reports and tax documents.
 - Other accounting platforms are available.
 - Seeking vote on consent to implement Proposal #256

 - Thoughts about referring to ourselves as “ProgCode”, as opposed to “Progressive Coders Network”? The thought behind it is inclusiveness for all; ProgCode always was intended to be welcoming to all, regardless of coding experience.
 - Another question is how to measure progress. The “Inertia of technical consolidation” is due in part to companies buying up competition. How do we protect against that with open source tools?
 - Do we expand beyond politics to addressing societal issues?
 - What positive influences can money have? Consider what could be done with the \$1000 you pay for a new iPhone, or the dollars tied up in the GameStop issue.
 - What is our directly-visible impact?
 - Is our focus still grassroots? Are non-profits engaged in genuine good? We want to drive actual, positive good.
 - Communication is central to what we do. Communication drives evolution . . . or de-evolution. Communication can be used for much greater good, but we need to build the tools to obtain that.
 - Technical infrastructure -
 - Amir: I proposed that we consider a new way of voting, where the popular vote of each district is counted, rather than counting the popular vote of the state. Colorado has something like that. Is this something that ProgCode could do as a project?

- Joe: Reviewing the “Values” section.
 - Trust and transparency are key factors in the ProgCode culture.
 - Providing resources, which could be educational, financial, and anything that those without privilege should have. Opportunities are a core part of this.
 - My wife is a psychologist, so I’ve learned some things from her. Validation is an important thing for all of us. It’s important to acknowledge others’ experiences and support them. Praise is important. Often when negative actions are positively reinforced, it increases the likelihood that they’ll be repeated. We want to encourage government when it’s doing something good. Of course, we can’t ignore the bad. We should provide consequences for the bad actions. We also should be mindful of the consequences of our actions and mindful of our surroundings and environment. It’s good to assume that one’s actions are well-intentioned, and then seek enlightenment of what inspired the actions. We should strive to create a society based on positive contribution, not on debt.

 - The color scheme for the site was the result of recommendations by designers in the community to accommodate as broad scope of visual ability.
 - Sam: Some features on the page suggest that the process might have been rushed, such as stretched images and the white background for some of the project logos. Consider using transparent images.
 - Has the community considered offering merchandise, such as mugs, shirts, etc.?

- Jonathan: It would be helpful to engage designers from the community, before we discuss whether and how to code the site. We should develop a process to follow. Consider:
 - Begin with user stories.
 - From there, develop wireframes.
 - Develop code based on the wireframes.
- Sema: I just worked with a designer for my own project. It took hours. The ProgCode site should be easy to navigate.
 - A landing page would be helpful. It could encourage visitors to consider donating to ProgCode.
- Sam: How much time should someone who knows nothing about ProgCode have to spend when they first visit the site? How much time should someone who just joined ProgCode have to spend?
- Jonathan: Probably about 15 minutes. That's why we need a landing page. It's too easy to get lost with a one-page site. I never saw the site before joining ProgCode. I was referred by Walker Bragman and just joined.
- Sam: We need to provide more information to the public about ProgCode projects. I'm unsure how up-to-date our project info is.
- Jonathan: Maybe the landing page should state what we do, how to sign up, and how to donate. That page can link to a more detailed site.
- Stephen: The first step to updating the project information is for us to have a team of staffers who will contact the project owners and ask them about the status of their projects. Some projects are in our Slack, while others are being built elsewhere. Still other are dormant, for any number of reasons. If we know the project owners' needs and intent, we can target volunteers in the community to assist, and we can make that information accessible in the project lists for the public to find through the site. We've tried it before, but the volunteers haven't had enough free time to do it.
- Jonathan: Our best place to start is the landing page. Let's move that discussion to the #website-revamp channel and get input from the community.
 - Should we have meetings for the revamp that are not dependent on the Community Operations meetings? It seems like a good idea, but we have a lot of regular meetings.
- Stephen: It's a good idea. We could play it by ear, based on the discussions in the channel. When it's time to meet, we'll make sure that everyone in the channel

 - A New Democracy:
 - Danny: One updated slide since last week (Shown on the video). The idea is not to focus on a particular issue, but to reshape the discussion we're having. A friend recently observed that social media allows us to delete persons whom we don't like or with whom we disagree. A New Democracy would encourage a discussion through Zoom (for example), rather than disagreeing and leaving. When discussing how the project is defined, I decided to have an open discussion to allow others to voice what it is about this project that speaks to them and how it should take form.
 - Jessica: Reminds me of an organization called [Braver Angels](#). They host conversations across the country about how people discuss policies. Their goal is to avoid confrontations and encourage discussion.
 - Joe: This is a great project because there are so many influences meant to divide us. This could have a big impact on that.
 - Engage:
 - Lori: I built out the clothing tabs and included a children's apparel section. The goal is to make it easier for people to let go of things that others could use to benefit. I'm running for precinct captain and have other obligations, so I've put things aside.
 - Joe: I've had similar experiences. I wonder whether some of the sounds outside are gunshots or construction. It's easy to be distracted. One idea of ProgCode is that your idea can be driven by the community. It's good to continue to promote

the hard work you've done. Others here can help you by working on this when you're busy with other obligations.

- Lori: We have tech that could benefit the protesters. I would like to find a way to get that help to them.
- Be The Cure
 - Joe: Haven't had time to pull together my thoughts about what is happening right now. So what's next? War with China? I hope not, but the year has been rough so far. There is a lot that can be done. This project and others can be applicable, but we have to think about how that works. What's on everyone's mind?
 - Lori: I'm grateful that the right people are working on our projects with the right intentions. I believe that we'll still have elections.
 - Eamonn: I watch the US issues a lot and I worry about you guys. My project may or may not help, but I'm glad to help out with other projects that will help you guys.
 - Shalabh: I don't have much to add, but I am concerned that this could affect elections.
- Demos - Better Democracy
 - Eamonn: The great thing about it is that you can vote on a variety of issues and share that information with others. The goal is that issues can be worked on and refined. It gives you the opportunity to vote with thousands of other people and then affect the delivery and content of news. It can include things that neither of the major parties want to address. With Demos, it can broaden the scope of debate. I would like to enable climate scientists to address and vote on issues that governments or media don't allow them to provide an opinion. You could look at how they vote on a given law or proposal. You also could have a nationwide vote on an issue. For the US, for example, you might vote on minimum wage. (Screen share) This is what I envision the app providing. Voting is similar to the way in which Wikipedia is formed. It is intended to be democratic: one person, one vote. Should probably use a unique identifier for each person to ensure that the vote is attributable to a person. In 2008, Obama used Google Moderator for answering questions from the public.

 - Amir: No update. Not sure how to proceed. Thought about starting a channel, post all of my ideas and thoughts, and then see where it goes from there.
 - Networked.Community
 - Berin: I've been prototyping the new template, straight-up HTML. I'm not a graphic designer or a UI/UX designer. Would like to find a UI/UX dev to help with design and make it more useful. Noticed that 211 texting is different from state-to-state. In my area, you contact 211 to find out when you can ask for help. Using Themantic UI (CSS) framework. Used to using Bootstrap, but this is a bit more verbose. They are not trying to make money off of it, which is part of the reason I chose it. My idea for the "Offer Help" page is to keep it simple. Show the non-profits which can help. Have a place to sign up and then do a vetting process. I have some help from people in our network, but others are welcome. Will have a resource guide. Beyond that, I want to build a community directory, as well as a local business directory of small businesses in the area, plus those large businesses which are headquartered in the area. It's just a wireframe.
 - Sema: We've onboarded a few people who do UI/UX. Can try to find volunteers.
 - Berin: That would be great. I would like to create an app or a CMS out of this. Need a logo, style sheet, and other design elements.

 - Joe: Let's create an even-more perfect union. What are we not preparing for? We should own our personal information. Provide for basic human needs. We should consider new ways of voting. The economy could be based on people's contributions, rather than debt. See the [Application Concept](#). The work we're doing is proactive response, rather than rapid response.
 - EnviroTrack
 - Robert: This project began in a discussion in Progbot, which is nearly ready for Alpha-testing. We had the ITP fires in South Houston. They were self-reporting that the airborne toxins were at safe levels, when they were not. Sema was concerned about the safety of her children. I began to design and develop a

sensor board based on the ESP32 for detecting and measuring airborne contaminants. I was building it from individual components and then determined that building it from pre-constructed circuits is more cost-effective. I need people who know Arduino programming and some iOS programming. We have a backend, most of the firmware, most of the iOS app, and most of the Android app. It's especially urgent because it was determined that the coronavirus extends the harm that the airborne contaminants can cause. Want to get a prototype out as soon as possible.

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COVID-19 Related Projects

- Overview: This set of projects go beyond the current pandemic, because this can and will happen again. These projects are adaptable to other similar crises. We'll try to do regular updates at the Community Operations meetings for the foreseeable future. The goal is to avoid reinventing the wheel each time a crisis arises.
- Be The Cure
 - Discussion
 - Joe: With the rise of robotics and AI are benefits, on which people rely, but it also presents problems, because people need income. Like other ProgCode projects, this one invites collaboration. I had an idea about creating Society 2.0, looking at current markets and asking which concrete things need to be done to achieve that. We're told to wear masks, but there is a shortage. So people are creating their own. How do we make masks? How do we distribute them, create best practices for use, and so on? Carpool Action could be a great tool for this, if adapted. I should stay in because that makes everyone else safer. I keep my circles small, to avoid risk. If anyone becomes infected, that information should be shared to enable others to take precautions. We also need to track and reward the work that's been done. I've written a couple of articles which I've added to Medium (linked in the agenda). The most important things we can do is to help the other developers who are presenting tonight. We need to adapt some of our ProgCode practices to the projects presented tonight.

 - Discussion
 - Berin: We're creating a solution to minimize societal risks. This started with a simple website to look up community resources to look up and to offer help. It's a simple CMS, with information on how to seek help. This is based in Battle Creek, MI, but it will be adapted for all other communities. I tested this out about 3 weeks ago. It took too long to get someone on the phone, or to text. It wasn't successful because the TTY number was buried. I wanted this to be a highly accessible template. Edit content is easy. It's easily adaptable for other communities. You can

add translations and change other content. It includes forms. We're slowly switching things. It can't be adapted to Linux, so we're looking at other content management systems (CMS). We're slowly converted the old alpha to a new template. What you're seeing in this demo is not open source, and I really want to make this open source. Want it to be a multi-tenant system. Will have a formal onboarding and vetting process, probably borrowing the ProgCode system. Also deciding on an application framework. Still figuring out the architecture. Our team is growing.

 - Alex: Progbot & EnviroTrack don't need it. We should seek out community projects.
 - Robert: German is running EnviroTrack. We can run it on DO when we're ready. Let's do a call for projects.
 - Alex: Setting up workshops would be a good use. Some may have a great idea for a project but don't have a server. We could set up workshops and have developers advise for projects.
 - Robert: When the project becomes self-funded, it could come off the DO and go to its own server. A two session class on Docker and Cubernetes, I could show others.

- Alex: So most of the usage will be in the computing. We can run a proof of concept on our own accounts. Rolling it into production will be taxing. We'll know how taxing it will be when people start using it. So, rather than vote to increase our DO budget, we should be planning a budget for when it goes live. One consideration is to offer a free tier which allows for one report an hour, and another paid tier that allows say 10 reports per hour. We need to survey the community and see what their needs would be.
- Robert: We can ask paid access to the data.
- Alex: We want to attract people to it. Would we offer public feeds?
- Robert: Sponsorships would be best.
- Stephen: Consider paying tax on the income received from the paid tier. Other options are to ask the IRS for a private letter ruling on the income issue and/or for the 501(c)(3) to create a for-profit entity in which it owns all the equity, and then pay tax on the income.
- Alex: Can work on this in our separate workspaces for the time being. We don't need to use the Digital Ocean account, but DO probably will be a better resource for running the final project.
- Stephen: What is the best way to set this up to be inclusive of others in ProgCode who want to be involved?
- Alex: Let's follow the Progbot model, since that's worked well.
- Stephen: Then we'll have our discussions in the #enviro-tech channel, and people who want to volunteer will be added to the developers' workspaces?
- Alex/Robert: Yes.

 - At a Saturday Strategy & Planning Zoom call, Matt, Andy & Corey discussed Corey's [strategy for moving GIS processing to a client-side server](#) to save money on monthly hosting. (Video in #phone-your-rep for review.)
 - After the call Matt looked at the current build configuration and made some modifications which allow it to be hosted on Heroku for \$16/mo using a Hobby dyno and Hobby Postgres database.
 - Potential problem in that this solution is not scalable
 - Andy G. simultaneously looked into the cost of hosting PYR on Digital Ocean vs Heroku.
 - Heroku's monthly bill for PYR prior to discontinuing configurations in 2017 was \$75/mo.
 - \$25 to keep the dyno running
 - \$50 for storage
 - With Digital Ocean, you don't have to pay extra to keep a dyno running, and you can get 25-80GB of storage for between \$5-20/mo. So Matt might be able to transfer the app over to DO as-is at the price point that was discussed in Saturday's meeting.
 - Matt DM'd Stephen & Pamela to discuss how hosting will be paid moving forward. Matt is comfortable paying current configuration hosting fees on Heroku for \$16/mo. We also discussed that the community may be willing to take over that fee after a vote at some time in the future.
 - Matt is going to look into deploying the newly configured app on Digital Ocean for a more robust and scalable solution.
 - If the app is hosted on DO, the community can discuss and vote on whether or not to cover those monthly hosting fees on Digital Ocean
 - In the event the app is ultimately moved to DO and ProgCode takes over the hosting fees, we should talk with Matt about the steps necessary for enacting Project Lifeboat in the future if that is what Matt chooses to do moving forward
 - REMINDER: We will find out whether there's a discount for paying annually on Heroku and/or DO, whatever is ultimately decided
 - Discussion:

- Pamela: The community hosted a strategy session on Saturday to move PYR GIS to save the cost we used to pay for PYR. In the process of the meeting, they discussed alternatives to using Heroku. Matt made modifications to the tech using the hobby dyno. Problem is that it's not scalable. If we get a lot of web traffic, this set up could be a problem. Andy looked at doing the build on Digital Ocean at a lower cost (\$5 to \$7) under the old build. Difficult to say what it will cost under the new build. Will wait to see what Matt decides. We gave Matt Admin privileges on the ProgCode Heroku account, and Matt paid for it on his card. Once Matt decides what he wants to do, we can bring the matter back to the community for a vote, under the Project Lifeboat program.

Probably shouldn't count on doing it exactly as last year. Worksheet we used last year is also above. I'll create new worksheet. Assuming it's the same as last time, they limit the number of characters. Hard to tell the prog code story in the amount of letters. Will duplicate and find character limits.
 - Sema: Do you know if perhaps linking in a video of what prog code is?
 - Stephen: Not sure but good question.
 - Sema: Access to tyt interview
 - Stephen: Jake got in contact, it was an oversight, will put it up and once up we'll add it.
 - Sema: Would be good to post on website, but because this particular grant is called "New Media Ventures", and maybe link to podcast as well.
 - Stephen: We got some new things to add that were not in place last year.
 - Sema: What is the process for becoming a 501c3 from beginning to end. How long
 - Stephen: In Michigan it takes a little longer to create the entity. 2 steps, 1) create the organization. We're doing it in Michigan so that I can act as an attorney without incurring legal fees. Usually takes about a week. 2) form 1023 takes about 90 days. C4 took 3.5 months.

Outside of that, a lot of new things under column C.
 - Sema: I did it, what part?
 - Stephen: what did you in
 - Sema: These c4 assets can be transferred, also use website to educate public. Could also be transferable. All social media accounts and youtube. Thought it would be important to create a social media team to post and publish when people aren't available. Host digital conferences, like Democratizing Democracy, Financial and fundraising swag store to generate fundraising and visibility. Have table set up to give information. Does anyone have any more thoughts on that.
 - Pamela: All looks good.
 - Stephen: All of those things we've looked at so a good time to talk about it. None of those suggestions should be a problem. In B I just added IRS determination as asset but non-transferable.
 - Sema: Wanted to add another thing. I know in action network there's an option to build and email list. Could we generate and email list to get people signed up for updates. Hire someone to generate financial stability in Prog code.

- Pamela: Thing with outreach right now is with social media and such can't maintain slack constantly. Adding people brings and issue. Up until now we pointedly have not done a lot of emailing. Generates a lot of work, and helps us to fly under the radar in terms of, we've been working on building our operations and accessibility processes. There was a time when we were adding lots of new people every week, but then nobody was being onboarded and created a lot of stress and situations where people were at eachothers throats and drama. We're under the microscope from both left and right partners, we need to change that get our structure fleshed out. At this point, comfortable with level of outreach because don't have staff at the moment.
- Sema: flying under the radar doesn't help, defeats the purpose about what progcode is about. Hoping there aren't many bad actors in Prog code. Finally generating some good feedback. Need more participation.
- Pamela: Participation means encouraging 1600 to activate and engage. No one's saying not to amplify what is being done. Now have more joining than projects to engage them with. Who they need to help. Literally been weeks since had a project onboarding. Member one on one, no projects to sync them to. Problem we face more than a year and a half ago. If we can't work with what we have, adding more may not help. If we could figure that out. Podcast work is excellent. Mentorship program, internship program. Jobs board. Job hunters and employers. Those kinds of things would engage our membership.
- Sema: Progbot could help. From my understanding, carpoolvote still needs more volunteers. Ourvoice needs work.
- Stephen: A lot of dormant projects, gone through list. Had one person volunteer to do outreach to team leaders. See with some of the dormant ones, if they're interested in us doing more for volunteers. Might have gone nowhere. Need to find out, so we can get current base of members engaged. Great to do outreach to community, when they come in, to find out if they want to donate. Application for grant. More active projects than we have. Great idea to have a plan, for outreach. Try to find people who can serve in role of assistant to team leaders. Need to first have volunteers at staff level.

- Sema: Suggestion would be, possibly do survey with what needs to be done. Do newsletter. Sends something in channel, newsletter, medium article. Figure out what demand is to figure out what supply is.
- Stephen: Why not do a letter to team leaders. Can download them as csv, sort on different columns. Identify different letters. Send out general email. What can we do.
- Sema: If they don't see a demand for certain tech, what type of tech is needed. Might be things that are dormant. Still think we should do public outreach to generate funding. What we're doing in activism. Can work both ways.
- Stephen: Other wrinkle, Gotta be able to match skill sets. May know one or two programming languages that don't match active projects.
- Sema: Sat in progbot and other meetings. Tried to get a sense of what it's all about. New to this, haven't been, want to be as helpful as possible, and as resourceful. Sends other programmers to progcode. Can't code but can express language. Not flying under the radar.
- Pamela: Right now we have 1600 people in slack and nothing going on. Except for podcast and progbot. In prog code and nothing is going on. Nothing is going on in channel. If we continue to invite. If we do a concerted new member push. Words of mouth becomes negative if we don't engage. No play for them. Not for lack of trying. Looking for ways to engage. Share links. 94 projects. 2/3rds are old. At what point does word of mouth begin to reflect negatively.
- Stephen: Now passed electoral events, drained us last year. What can we do with current activity. Can be attracting other projects. What we've currently got. Some projects were left with us. What in that particular projects. No idea of what status is. Doing outreach first to team leaders.
- Sema: 1600 members, 230 active a month. Can do outreach simultaneously. Through other social mediums. What is needed within activist communities. Another thing we discussed, Corey was on in that meeting. Coming in as a team leader and tech creator. Once a project is gone, what does progcode do.
- Pamela: The big hole regarding projects, we don't have a tech person engaging for recruiting. Problem since september 2017. Only so much noncoding members can understand. Can sit and have team leads. Need tech lead who can understand needs. Know who is knowing what things.

- Sema: See if community members might be willing to engage. One person doesn't need to do everything. Supplement that role.
- Pamela: Very easy to get help.
- Sema: Can try.
- Stephen: We've had some members, two or three have been helpful. Bouncing from channel to channel. Have limited time. Big drawback. Need money to get someone to commit time. Then process of generating revenue requires people to put in time. Requires to have projects.
- Sema: Getting someone is a project
- Stephen: Not for want of trying. Had some who volunteered time. This is kind of the way it is, plus a lot of people are burned from 2018 electoral season.
- Sema: Do we do outreach and newsletter. Or Just community.
- Stephen: Given our resources, what should we concentrate on.
- Sema: committing time.
- Pamela: I don't think anyone is opposed to it. Adiron, newsletter issue. No format. Emails that we can make. Have you ever looked at github issue?
- Sema: I have
- Pamela: Jobs boards, revenue streams.
- Sema: Progcode fundraising ideas for newsletter. Getting artists. Get some artists for bumper sticker. Putting their material for.
- Stephen: great idea for swag shop. Area for IRS. Selling things. Can be taxable. First need to get our books and records set up. Bifurcated our efforts.
- Pamela: One of the reasons we didn't go forward with swag shop is didn't have tech person. Guess we need to decide what is wisest use of money. Something about a job board. What would it cost to spin up for progcode. No structure or process for how it would work.
- Sema: Need to create more revenue. Wanted to ask, if swag store was issue, how was fundraising handled for netroots.
- Pamela: Some friends who are artists. As a gift they funded.
- Sema: Understanding that it was for netroots
- Pamela: Started as a meme. Attached it to gofundme. Was really popular, wish it was a t-shirt. Put it on their swagshop and went on t-shirt. No money was made from it.

- Sema: That was created as a gift, but went to represent progcode. Can something be created and sold at swag shop.
- Stephen: Could do something like that, setting up a swagshop is ongoing thing. Just a t-shirt with progcode. On regular basis could be seen as a for profit thing if selling regular. If a particular shirt was being sold for Fundraising. If did artwork that promoted certain concepts. If have the volunteers to do it, takes concentrated effort. Then requires swag.
- Sema: Someone in prog code, specifically sold at a conference we're attending is feasible. Must be mission aligned.
- Stephen: When get back to issue of fundraising. All great ideas, need to flesh out from a focus of fundraising.
- Sema: and creating assets for progcode.
- Stephen: If we're going to develop something, at this point, do we want to create a c3. My answer is yes for this reason. Making use of grant we have. Important to engage in activities at this point for raising funds. Include looking for grants, podcasts. Can only do so much with grant that we have. Best for that to be considered into a c3, more easily supplemented with grant or two. May need to pay someone to do some grant writing. More viable in a c3 than in a c4. Putting together paperwork for c3, I can do. Can lead community. \$400 filing fee. Gets back to issue of shifting assets. Recommendation to create c3. Lean in on fundraising as well as bringing in more.
- Pamela: One of the easiest things was through the podcast. Hope that we could get 5 or six episodes in the can. Drive people to patron. Not a dependable revenue stream. Would be more continual revenue. That would really cost us no money. A matter of time and editing. That's definitely doable.
- Stephen: Re: podcast, it's been hard finding people but now we're past election season. Probs best bet. Right now pulling \$100/month. If we multiply by 10 still only 12000 at end of year. There are grants that would be helpful. Holdup has always been that we're a c4. Work as long as we don't do certain things. Been told if only you were a c3. Podcast seems to be most consistent staff related process. Should keep that ball rolling.

Partner Advocacy

- GitHub Issue #251, **Phone Your Rep**: In the process of helping Andy with the scrapers, Pamela discovered that ProgCode still hosts PYR on the community's Heroku account.
 - The community may be able to fix the bugs by recruiting volunteer contributors to diagnose and repair the issues to get PYR back up and running.
 - A look at the PYR Heroku repo shows some fatal errors related to the database.
 - When the app was functional, two 1X paid-tier dynos were disconnected, rendering the app non-functional. The monthly cost of the dynos was ~\$75/mo.
 - Could ProgCode launch a fundraising drive to raise an additional \$75/mo to cover the cost of re-configuring the dynos to make PYR functional again?

- In the process of creating this Issue 251, PYR's tech lead, Matt, responded that he would like to jump back into PYR as a developer rather than tech lead. (Yay!)
- **Github Issue 225: QUESTION TO BE CONSIDERED AT A LATER TIME:**

Use Case:

A popular OS tech application has been built by members of the ProgCode community. The project's tech lead who has access permissions to all of the project's digital assets must step back from project leadership because of a change in life situation.

The remaining volunteer contributors would like to continue maintaining the app's OS repository and functionality.

QUESTION: *Does recruiting volunteers to maintain issues and fix bugs with the OS app infringe on ProgCode's core value and promise of project autonomy?*

- Lifeboat Process

- Discussion:
 - Pamela: PYR is an app that was built in ProgCode in late 2016/early 2017. Rachel brought the concept of a Reps list in your mobile phone in #pitch-zone. Rachel is a non-coder. Matt Simon Borg agreed to be the tech leader. From ideation to launch took 45 days, which is the shortest time in ProgCode. It loads local numbers for Reps, as well as DC numbers. This is valuable for members in remote areas. After about a year, Matt had a change in life situation and stepped back from the project. Happened so suddenly that we didn't have time to have him transfer permissions on the repo to a successor. The PYR channel has about 100 members, which reflects how popular it was. After that, we received a 403 error that there was a problem with the app. ProgCode hosts the PYR app on its Heroku account. It requires a dyno, which cost about \$75/month. We started Project Lifeboat earlier this year as a process to help open-source project leads when their ability to contribute is affected. It helps them transfer responsibility to ProgCode to keep the project running. Our first Lifeboat case was Carpool Vote. We decided we could use it for PYR. What are the implications of continuing on a project?
 - Stephen: Rapi was paying this for PYR until he left his staff position in ProgCode. The dyno remains dormant on our Heroku.

- Pamela: It's possible that we can configure the app in a way to avoid using the dyno or using it more efficiently. This matter is important to ProgCode because we offer member autonomy and project autonomy. No member should be concerned that ProgCode will hijack a project. So the first question is whether ProgCode's recruiting volunteers to maintain the app infringe on project autonomy. It's a hypothetical at this point, because Matt responded to this issue and is going to work with the community to revive PYR.
- Corey: As a developer, one of the primary drivers is the license. PYR has the MIT license. I'm wondering whether he intended to use that. If it's MIT, you put it out in the world for others to do as they may. The ethical question disappears when using the MIT license.
- Pamela: Never heard the perspective of looking to the license. We could ask developers what they would want ProgCode to do if life requires them to step back from their project. It would have all the info we'd need to do that.
- Stephen: Corey brought up two key issues:
 - License is the first thing to look at re: accessing the code. MIT is a good one, some are more restrictive and offer the app owner some restrictions/protections for sharing the application with others.
 - My own thought about the ProgCode autonomy pledge to members is that we should remain hands off from a team lead's repo. Modifications should not be made without the permission of the owner. Because these are OS projects, unless there's a limitation in the license there should be nothing (legally) which prevents a ProgCode member from forking it.
 - Ethical question as to whether we are subverting the authority of one of the members by doing that. We have a responsibility that if members have a project, we make every effort we can beyond legal allowances to contact the project owner. Beyond what the law requires team leads should have the comfort level that ProgCode would not take the project in a direction other than the team lead intended.
 - In the case of PYR, when Pamela tagged Matt and got his attention that was a fortunate thing.
 - Corey: I'm hearing this headed in the direction of the break glass in case of emergency form data, either you prefer it be left alone if I disappear as part of the onboarding. If after six months if I return then ProgCode can pick up maintenance of the repo.

- Stephen I think it's wise to offer the "in case of ER break glass" form and let the project leader limit the permissions however they want.
- Lisa: I assume we have project scope in each project.
- Pamela: Yes or no. Depends on the project leader. The variance between those use cases is infinite.
- Lisa: Two-fold: First the ethical question of giving the project lead the decision on calling all the shots regarding the project. I'm wondering whether there is a basic structure to put around projects should someone leave, but to accommodate a deadline, if one exists. Consider putting the website together for an event, and then the persons responsible disappeared unexpectedly. Would want to allow others to take their place, so that the deadline is met.
- Pamela: That's a great observation. We sometimes get projects that are 90% complete with a team, and we could scare them away by asking for permission to access their account. They might have other services attached to the project, and it can become complicated, so it's helpful to ask them what they'd like to do, as an option.
- Lisa: That way they can decline. It might be a personal account.
- Joyce: I run a voting org of volunteers for voting registration. We do a number of projects, such as getting the purged files from states. We have accounts where the projects reside. No one person owns the project. I'm curious about why someone would have ownership over an open-source project.
- Corey: The way things come about is messy.
- Joyce: Is it that you can't restrict access?
- Stephen: Re the public domain aspect of your question, a good parallel may be that words are the equivalent of OS code. When you put those words in a particular order you get a creative work.
- Joyce: I understand that but isn't it part of your process that you determine who the lead is and where they keep access to digital assets.
- Stephen: OS code is kept in a repository where much of the code resides. Who has access to that is dependent upon who the tech lead is. (In this case Matt Simon) Matt can make the repository public or private but for someone to be able to go in and change the information may or may not be allowed. He really has control over that. Even if he made it open and available to everyone because of our policies as a community about

autonomy (unless we've given our members reason to believe we'd encourage others to go in and copy the code, etc.) that would be contrary to the assurances we have given to the members of the community.

- Joyce: How do you weigh the trust issue against the effectiveness issue in terms of getting the project out and keeping it running.
- Stephen: It's not ProgCode's mission to get the project launched in any particular time.

Tools and Documentation

- Slack Alternative
 - Rob: Wondering where we are on the ongoing discussions of #slack-solutions and when a decision might be made on that
 - Stephen: The search for a Slack alternative has been an ongoing theme since 2017 when we passed our 10k Slack archive limit. Joe McLaughlin brought it back to life, created some new documents that won't be archived. We encourage everybody to check out the
 - Mattermost demo
 - Zulip demo
 - Will the new platform take care of everything we need it to?
 - Features
 - Meaningful testing as a community
 - Transferring 1.6k people to a new platform
 - Strong likelihood that only the people who tried it out will leave Slack and join the new platform
 - Right now not aware of a new timeline.
 - Rob: There was also a Rocketchat demo that I put up but there was a 14 day trial on that and it's probably expired by now.
 - Stephen: We've got a number of Staff emails we could use to set one up. Only have 4-5 users in Mattermost and fewer in Zulip.
 - Maybe if we can get more people involved we can set up another instance of Rocketchat.
 - Rob: I first became interested in the question and started researching alternative for another organization, Seattle People's Party. I was sold on Rocketchat until entering this

conversation here. I think I'm now leaning toward Mattermost because it threads like Slack.

- Corey: I used Mattermost for a year and really liked it.
- Pamela: John Evans has a team for Wobbly that uses Discord for the main chat. It does not thread. There is an add-on which is similar to Zulip called Discourse. They use Discord for quick discussions. They use the forum for longer discussions. They also use a Wiki to keep records, such as community votes. We'll get an introduction to that. I don't know whether we can invite others to it, but we have a Discord forum for our ProgCode members. John said we can set up a Discourse forum in about an hour.
- Rob: There is a concern that Slack is a corporate entity which can access our conversations. Discord is similar. Also a concern that the Alt-Right uses Discord, but that shouldn't reflect on Discord. Discord did take down the Alt-Right orgs. Discord is not open-source. Rocketchat, Mattermost, and Zulip are open-source.
- Pamela: I read that Slack might go public. What if the others do?
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Operations

- ProgCode accounting
 - Creation of books
 - Accounting functions and tax return
- Stephen: ProgCode became an entity in March 2017 & got non-profit status in October (?) 2017. We've been discussing fundraising methods and future funding through a possible (C)(3) entity. One thing we haven't discussed yet is Tax and Revenue reporting. We're overdue for having books of account set up. Lisa, do you want to talk about this issue?
- Lisa: Stephen & I did talk a little bit. I did not necessarily understand how many transactions ProgCode was entering into. After talking to Stephen briefly I understand we're not talking about a large volume of transactions. So I would love to make a suggestion which may not be the most palatable but I have a potential solution. Based on the idea that ProgCode doesn't have an office that people can go to, putting books together and making them available, it's better to have a few ppl who have access to put in entries remotely. We're talking about an accountant doing that but someone who knows dual entry accounting. I don't have anybody in mind but would be happy to help set that up. I would be willing to donate the monthly expense to have it done. You can use a cloud-base (Quickbooks) that would let you set up a non-profit chart of accounts and if you have an accountant in ProgCode willing to enter in your AR (invoices you get ea. Month,) and any checks you're writing monthly now or in the future. I am an accountant

and would be happy to help get the 2018 tax return together (we should do 2017 if there were transactions then). Because you don't have a lot of transactions, once we get the books together we can put that tax return together. If you use cloud-based tax returns you could have multiple logins to access the books. You wouldn't have to have someone available to look at them with the accountant but you could do that remotely without a lot of hassle. I don't know how we do it on a CD on a hard drive on someone's computer. Those are my quick high level thoughts.

- Stephen: One of the things I anticipated is we would have it resident on a drive somewhere (we will put this up for a votes). My personal opinion is I'm always wary of having your financial information available on somebody else's servers. My understanding is some like QB have the ability to use a server and cloud based access. First step is to do what we have to do to satisfy the IRS.
- Lisa: Once you get the books together you create a cutoff, you accrue and then you have a ledger balance and total operating expenses so you can categorize it. The system will produce that with a push of a button.
- Joe: Finance is my worst subject. Can you go through what specifically is required for keeping books for all intents/purposes. I know you mentioned receipts (date, time, amounts, etc.) which we have so far put into spreadsheets. You mentioned the automated transactions. Even the first cloud-based (\$50/mo for one user \$80/mo for two users) is pretty expensive for ProgCode. What's the urgency of this situation for us?
- Lisa: I never really thought about doing it in spreadsheets and importing to QB, I've just never done it. I believe in this year any vendor you pay more than \$600 to you have to give a 1099 per IRS requirements. After talking with Stephen there's probably nobody in that category. As far as urgency is concerned, you did have revenue this year thus you want to file but you may have a 3 year grace period. Not positive exactly how that works but from the standpoint from who you received that money from they may be looking for the filing.
- Stephen: I can answer that. The rules is if you have 3 successive years of not filing a return you lose your non-exempt status. That doesn't excuse you from filing a return if you have income. If you have under \$10k (?) you can use a post-card form which is a 990N which says "we received less than \$10k and we have nothing to report." However ProgCode takes very seriously the problems with dark money reporting. Though we are not required to disclose donors as a (c)(4) we have discussed we do intend to report transparently so that no one should be concerned there is outside influence corrupting our mission. A form 990N would not be appropriate for ProgCode. We did have some donors in the very last weeks of 2017. We would have to evaluate that and disclose it.
- Lisa: Wrinkled question: Do we have to inform donors that we will disclose them?

- Stephen: No.
 - Lisa: I've done 990s before, they're not simple. They take a good bit of time, they ask for a lot of background. The sooner we get on it the better.
 - Stephen: That would be using Turbo Tax or something similar to file but we use something else for tracking books.
 - Lisa: It's not just a "Schedule C, Schedule D, what was your interest" it's not that simple.
 - Stephen: The directors went through a lot of those questions and that will probably be the source of a lot of those answers. We would have that info available.
 - Lisa: I'm hearing that we want to put a disk onto a hard drive with the program on it. So the question becomes who and where. And then if we have to share screens to walk through it (I would be willing to help out for sure) I would want to slog through what that would look like and how that would look. Not tonight but so there's a level of comfort.

 - Pamela: Co-op discussion isn't new. We've talked about a co-op option. Traditionally a c3 and c4 are the route to go and probably the fastest thing to do. Want to make sure we don't miss out on an opportunity for everyone in ProgCode to do work in a way that is sustainable. We owe it to ourselves to look into it before pulling the trigger on a c3. Ernest mentioned that a c3 still looks for big donations. Would be good to pursue something that would enable us to do this without relying on big dollar donations. Ernest's question started out the co-op discussion. It's always been a dream scenario. Would love to hear from others.
 - Joe: What relationship can we have between a c3 and a co-op? Can we have a separate entity like a c3 and be part of a co-op.

- Adiron: Done a fair amount of research on co-ops. Don't know whether IRS has a co-op designation. Comes down to bylaws. Some can be incorporated as for-profit. If a worker co-op, usually not-for-profit. Credit union is an example. ACE Hardware might be a co-op. Can have different entities functioning together under a co-op. Mondragon is a for-profit with a non-profit under an umbrella of the for-profit corporation. It's all a matter of how.
- Joe: Good to have a co-op expert. Within the co-op, can you have individuals, groups, or orgs each with a different legal structure.
- Adiron: Answer probably is "yes", depending on what is the most effective structure. How do we want ProgCode to function. Might want different entities, but not sure how you mean it.
- Joe: One of the biggest issues of 2016 election is sustainability. A lot of individuals came together and did amazing thing. Worked for a year and a half unpaid, but the way these tools were used changed the way elections work. That's our main goal. Lack of organization was part of the problem for sustainability. One thing we discussed was providing operational services. We might see a significant influx of people who want to institute those services. We've been working on it as our main focus. Upcoming voting season is a challenge for us to be as successful as possible. How can we help people be effective in that regard. Goal is to enable people to do this and become sustainable. Perhaps a coop structure could enable us to set up services. That has been ProgCode's key mission. The idea of exploring a cooperative model is worth exploring.
- Lisa: I prefer to read everything and learn what the rules are. Should decide what we want to do and then fit it into the model. Can do a lot of things.

- Discussion:
 - Stephen: Re issues Joe Breslin raised in #legal;
 - Email to community members needs to go out. It's linked/pinned in the #legal channel. Two different versions of the notice. One is short, was basically the same notice we put in the #legal channel to begin with. One was more detailed and to my mind a little better laid out. One or the other should be emailed to members and get them involved in the discussion. We have a draft pilot initiative and Google text document people can contribute to. These things should have been done when we setup the C4 but we have better processes for contribution and transparency than we do now. To my mind the email is pretty important at this point. It's been on the agenda since 10/29. A lot of our members are cognizant of the discussion.
 - What electoral activities are permissible in a C3?
 - Discussion/concern about what can and can't be done with a C3
 - Fiscal Sponsorship
 - Joe Breslin: Re the email, could go into more detail than a blog post. There's been some back and forth about public v private. My general thought w/any email is to keep it extremely brief and then send them over somewhere else to learn more. If we go that route I'd keep it rather short and then tell them how to learn more about the purpose of the move.
 - Pamela: Medium won't allow for a private post. If the concern is privacy, we could use Patreon, which allows for a blog post. Doesn't hurt to drive them there. Big question is, if we're okay with the long version being the blog post, does Joe B want to draft the short version?
 - Joe B: I will.
 - Joe M: Anything we write is findable. Might not want to obsess on that too much. If we file with the IRS, that would be public. Stephen and I have shared guides. Want to be careful about what we put in blog posts, because they could make their way into an audit later on. C3 can do non-partisan voter registration and

advocate on public issues. Cannot work with campaigns, partisan or non-partisan. C4 can do it to a limited extent. ProgCode's core mission for me has been to help orgs find tech to do good stuff. Don't know for a c4 entity that campaign training is something it wants to do. Real value of a c3 entity is to increase the funding possibilities. Also the possibility of shared services with a c4, which can benefit the c4. A lot of what ProgCode has been doing is what a c3 entity can do. A separate c3 entity frees up the c4 to do limited electoral work that it wants to do. Would have a separate board, with possible overlap. Want to be careful what we're writing about what a c4 can and will do. Plenty of guidance available on that. Can look for volunteer legal help, or just another pair of eyes. Folks at another org that will help to do that for free or cheap.

- Stephen: Main reason for creating a C3 is pretty much what Joe L. just touched on. We're acting as a C3 now. The reason we did that was originally we were told there were a number of offers to fund a C4. None of those offers came through. We ended up with a small staff doing the work day after day. C4 hasn't raised the money it should have to be able to fund what we're doing. I've looked at gov't and different foundation grants. None of them would have been given to a C4 who has the ability to do unlimited lobbying. All of the waivers we might show them that the community is not going to engage in lobbying doesn't mean much to funders. (i.e., Y-combinator which used to be open to C4s but now is only open to C3s.) From my limited viewpoint this is really supposed to only be a mechanism for the people who are doing this work to do some fundraising to qualify for grants and then hire some techs that we can't do right now on the less than \$100 per month that we are taking in on Patreon. Joe L.'s right about the C3 not being able to engage in political activity. There is no C3 structure that can work with candidates. Only way to do that is to become a PAC or for-profit entity. Only other alternative is what Coders for Sanders was--an unincorporated/unassociated group of volunteers doing the work. Any member in ProgCode can do that separate from ProgCode. We had a great opportunity this year with Spoke to talk to MoveOn's attorneys to insure there would not be coordination going on. We have a number of people who were working on tech in the campaigns and we didn't have a problem with that. We could do the same in a C3. Everything we did in the C4 we could have done in a C3 format.
- Adiron: One thing I see as an advantage of a C3--sort of an idea that came to me, I've floated similar ideas over the past couple of years--with a C3 there might be a decent opportunity to have a focus on getting more grant money to develop

programmers in general and in alignment with our mission goals, developing programs for people who want to become programmers from an activist standpoint. Don't know if there is anybody out there now doing that right now.

- Stephen: That's really one of our biggest issues. A lot of the things we've done here could have qualified as education. We could do them as a C4--it's in our mission and our statement of purpose in the Articles of Incorporation, it's a C3--we just can't get grants for them. The big issue is to take the activities we're already engaged in and start making applications for grants and begin to fund activities and start paying some of our members who want to put in time either as an employee or contract basis.
- Pamela: A big divide in skill level in 2018 are members who are new to coding, right out of bootcamp and computer science college, and they're networking to get jobs. That would be a huge component for an educational organization. Grantwriting would be another skill we would want to acquire. Perhaps pay a grantwriter until we can learn to do it ourselves.
- Joe B.: Re potentially shifting the mission to allow people to participate in campaigns vs the C4, I wanted to see if anybody had any feedback or perspective on that one. Essentially for people who want to come in and support whatever the next Coders for Sanders is, or for a dozen different candidates. Shouldn't be limited to just one group but having a place where we don't need to be so strict on working w/campaigns. In my mind it makes sense to say we're changing the mission here and there could be a place for people to volunteer.
- Joe M: There was a good model in Spoke. Many folks in many campaigns who are in the Spoke channel. Anything that has the appearance of coordination with those campaigns, people who want to do that should be directed to someone outside of ProgCode. Those who helped the campaign get Spoke up and running discussed only how to set up Spoke. The issue of how you use it had to be taken offline. We've avoided coordination with campaigns, because it is legally problematic for ProgCode and the campaigns and parties involved. Can see another entity that is not a c3 or c4 where ProgCode members can be involved, but not this c4 or a c3 we might create. Might be a PAC. There are groups which do that. Can't do it in ProgCode. Technical functionality for Spoke or Carpool Vote can be discussed here. That's the real value of ProgCode.
- Pamela: Contributing to campaigns . . . working on Sanders 2016 got me into ProgCode. There is one candidate whose campaign I would do everything I can to help that candidate. I'd hate to miss out on that. I would hope we can contribute

outside of ProgCode. I think that worked in 2016 because there was one candidate. If we were to start a 527, there is a big scale of what people think is “progressive”. If we started a new entity and began creating tech for different candidates in the same election, there could be a great deal of division. If we did another volunteer org like Coders For Sanders, I would be onboard for that.

- Sema: Agree with what Joe and Pamela said about helping candidates. I joined after my campaign was over because I couldn't ask for apps to be done for my campaign. I joined because I wanted to learn about the apps. The community decided that there wouldn't be campaign coordination. I will be running for office again, and I will be involved less and less in ProgCode. Have to be careful about how we proceed. I agree with Pamela about wanting to help Sanders if he runs again. I would never pass that up.
- Stephen: With respect to a volunteer group, anybody can personally start a volunteer group. ProgCode cannot do it because it could be seen as indirect campaign coordination. Sema, point of clarification, it wasn't the community who voted not to coordinate with campaigns it's an IRS & FEC restriction. We can't work with any particular candidate. We are allowed to endorse candidates and promoting candidates but we can't work with the candidate. Conversely, candidates can join ProgCode. We have both candidates and their campaigns in ProgCode. The issue comes from whether the candidate or campaign is trying to benefit their campaign while in ProgCode. That's one of the reasons we stopped allowing private channels. Joe L. can attest we carefully watch Spoke. That channel is for others to learn about the tools and put them to use. We have members who are not active here who are involved in other activities who work with a PAC and directly coordinate campaigns. But the directors have kept an eye on activity to make sure we never cross the threshold that would constitute campaign coordination under IRS or FEC.
- Joe L.: The real value of ProgCode for me has been, there were organizations using Spoke supporting different candidates. I didn't ask who that was, we didn't figure that out, but there was no lack of help for supporting campaigns. I was on one side, other members were on another, the other folks won in a primary. There's great benefit to the education they got from using Spoke.
- Sema: My concern is about changing the mission. Is that up to the community or up to the directors to change the direction of ProgCode?
- Stephen: that would be up to the community. The community could change its mind at any time. Main reason we didn't do it, there was a concern if the

community moved to support a candidate, those members who did not agree might feel that ProgCode does not reflect their values. As Joe has pointed out in the Chat, making a decision about expanding what the C4 would do that would be a major change process and would be similar to this process we are going about creating a C3. So the community could decide to endorse candidate through the change process.

○ Fiscal Sponsorship Discussion:

- Joe B. was interested in discussing this because Andrea brought it up and it seemed like the fastest way to get going.
- Stephen: Fiscal sponsorships work really well for something like Carpool Vote. if you have an unincorporated project for which you want to take donations, you don't want to go through all of the organizational steps like we're doing with the C3, you can go through a fiscal sponsor and if they're willing to take your project on, you do all the work to do the fundraising, they make decision about your expenditures. From ProgCode's standpoint, community could lose the ability to make decisions about how to spend that money, if the fiscal sponsor required that it control the funds. Some require it because the fiscal sponsor takes on the liability and responsibility for the actions of the project. Also, fiscal sponsors usually want you to have some money in place already because they want to get paid for their services. Tides Foundation requires that you have a minimum of \$100k to be under a FS with them. Those are things to look at and consider. Re ability to fundraise, it will be the same for the C3 as it is for the C4. Once we file articles of incorporation for the C3, we can start fundraising right away. Best to wait until you have the application for non profit status in but you can still do it. When IRS approves the application for tax exempt status it's a retroactive approval. If we incorporate in February 14 2019 and the IRS approves your nonprofit application 6 months later, every donation we received since 02-14-19 is tax-exempt.
- Pamela: When Andrea said she would do a fiscal sponsorship, she said she could raise a couple hundred thousand in no time. You said if we form a c3, we could do the fundraising, but not have the decision making responsibility.
- Stephen: Andrea proposed that for Carpool Vote because it is a for-profit Delaware LLC which cannot fundraise and won't qualify for grants or donations. So, she offered to take it under her c3 as a project and seek donations for it.
- Sema: What Andrea was suggesting was that she could be the fiscal sponsorship while ProgCode was doing the work. They would do the fundraising.

- Stephen: You're right, Sema, That was the missing link I failed to touch on. ProgCode would not have qualified for some of the fundraising activities that might have been available from a voter protection standpoint. There would probably be a lot of voting rights foundations would have put up money and I think that's what Andrea was referring to. They wouldn't do that for ProgCode's C4 but they could do that if we started a C3.
 - Joe M: Hopefully, the IRS will approve a c3 entity. Might not, or could take longer than we think. Fiscal sponsorships are as varied as there are orgs. Some are controlling, and some are not. Did work with an org that filed to be a c4 but has a foundation acting as a fiscal sponsor. Different ways to do it, but if ProgCode wants to do it, then create the c3 and then look at next steps. Another possibility is be a fiscal sponsor for another entity such as a c4. If it takes 3 to 6 months to be a c3, that could be a consideration.
 - Pamela: One org that is super aligned with ProgCode is CommonCause, Robert Reich's org. Their mission is almost identical to ours. We could consider whether to use them as a fiscal sponsor.
 - Stephen: Jumping back to the issue of the email notifying members. I think Patreon that Pamela suggested is a good idea. Tanya Schlusser went to the site and donated after that discussion. That may help. Some people may be willing to add a few pennies to the coffer. I would also in the email drive people back to the ProgCode #legal channel so the same message is there. Anyone who doesn't go to Patreon for whatever reason we would love to have them back in the Slack to engage in the conversation.
 - Pamela: What is the plan for the e-mail? Is everyone okay with using the long version for Patreon and the #legal channel?
 - Joe B.: Shared his screen, everybody on the call contributed ideas to the short version of the email which is at the bottom of the Google Doc referenced above and agreed it's good to send out.

- Discussion:
 - Joe M: Started a poll in #general-chit-chat for alternatives to Slack. Over the weekend, Barry Tribble and I looked into Zulip. Barry created a demo Zulip site instance for ProgCode. He sent invites to staff and to me. Looks like a good possibility. Open-source, with a paid version. We should qualify for the non-profit discount. Mattermost has a demo site (see above) which anyone can join. I haven't made time to set up a Mattermost instance for ProgCode. I haven't checked out Discord or Rocketchat, but we're on our way to evaluate alternatives. I understand Joe B's concern in the #legal channel about having two different platforms for two different entities. If we need two separate places for the c3 and c4, then we should use the same platform.
 - Joe B: My concern is legal separation. We could turn the c4 into a c3 mission where people interested in supporting campaigns such as Sanders campaign have a place to do it. The c4 could be in the existing space. People in the c3 might want to try the new platform for those activities.
 - Joe M: All great points. I would encourage everyone to dive in to the Zulip instance and check out the Mattermost instance. The hurdles of which to adopt are not insurmountable. They're all similar, with minor differences. The biggest reason to change is that we have 2 years of stuff on Slack we cannot access behind the paywall. We might want to access it affordably and easily.
 - Pamela: It all makes sense. Imagine some ways we could keep from losing members, as a result of changing the platform. We can send reminders in Slackbot that we're in another place. Only hesitation would be sending a joint link that could be shared and prevent us from vetting new members. Have to have a wall of between those vetted and unvetted, which is not conducive to ProgCode's methodology. If all the platforms are similar in accessibility. I'm curious about the new functions. We asked Slack about new functions they had coming down the line, and they said "none". So it makes sense to look at alternatives.
 - Joe M: All valid points. Functionality for user identification is similar across the platforms. To keep folks involved, running two platforms is not as helpful.
 - Sema: My suggestion would be set up the pros/cons each platform offers to better evaluate. As to Joe Breslin's question about using a different C3 for the new platform then integrating C3 & C4 on a different platform--if we can have someone figure that out and then present it however long that takes because we want to do

this right. It will take a lot of work to ask members if they want to transfer over to the new platform. How will we notify channel leads about the transfer? What's a seamless way to do it to make transition as easy as possible to whichever platform is voted on.

- Stephen: that's something I was going to touch on. For ppl who have not seen the discussion in #slack-solution or it might have been the #legal channel. Our policy of autonomy gives each person who opens a channel total control of that channel. In the past the staff has refrained from closing down channels without permission because it was seen as disrespectful of the autonomy of the member who opened up the channel. It's not much of a stretch to say that moving a channel from one platform to another could be also seen as violating autonomy.
 - How to notify people & get permission to move to new platform
- Stephen: Assuming we do a C3, one consideration would be to make all members of the C4 automatically members of the C3 giving people the opportunity to opt out. Argument for that since ProgCode's C4 is currently operating as a C3 (not lobbying, endorsing, campaigning). That could then give us some options as to how to treat the channels and remain in contact with all of the members. We could automatically have the C4 turn over the existing Slack to the C3 entity meaning nobody has to move and all the channels remain the same. Other thing would be to give everyone invites to the new Slack, leave the current Slack as it is and let people migrate over to the C3 as they want. Lots of things we can consider as we move forward to the C3 discussion. In all of it we have to be mindful that our members have a say as to what gets moved and how.
- Sema: With what Joe said about moving the C3 onto a different platform, in order to keep the C3/C4 separate (not sure how the structure for the C3 is going to be) but would be good to have a new board or keep the same one and what kind of diversity is going to be on the new board.
- Stephen: All of that will have to be considered. Easiest thing is to go to C3 because
- Pamela: Still need to discuss board of the c3. Do we want to create a list of task for the Slack alternative?
- Joe B: Should come back to this after the c3 c4 discussion.
- Joe M: Started a spreadsheet in the #slack-solution channel. Will put a link to the Zulip demo. In this, we can add a worksheet for next-steps.
- Joe B: Don't know whether anyone heard from Jason Lee (@jylee), but he was passionate about this topic. He would appreciate a notice about it.

- Pamela: I agree that in terms of decision-making, we should decide the purpose of the new entity and the business to go on there, and then decide whether there will be a split in members. Makes sense to have the plan in place, and then get the tools to enable it.

- Begin discussion about creating a ProgCode 501(c)(3) affiliate - The organizing of ProgCode in late-2016/early-2017 included discussions about eventually creating a 501(c)(3) entity through which much of the tech development, education, and public outreach can operate. This could improve the ability of operations to qualify for grants and other sources of funding.
 - 501(c)(3) orgs may engage in these activities:
 - Engage in limited lobbying, including ballot-measure advocacy;
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 - Sponsor candidate debates (with certain restrictions);
 - Advocate in connection with party platform issues;
 - Rent mailing lists and facilities at fair market value to other organizations, legislators, and candidates (with certain restrictions); and

- Conduct nonpartisan get-out-the-vote activities, voter registration, and education drives.
- By contrast, a 501(c)(4) may engage in these activities:
 - Engage in all of the lobbying and advocacy activities permitted for a 501(c)(3), without limit;
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 - Publicly-distribute voter guides and other communications that may support or oppose candidates (with certain restrictions);
 - Permit candidates to address its members;
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 - Establish and pay for the administrative and fundraising costs of a connected political organization.
- Founding community members considered relationships between the ProgCode community and our network partners.
- Process:
 - Pass a resolution authorizing certain individuals to establish a 501(c)(3)
 - Incorporate a non-profit organization which will operate in accordance with the Internal Revenue Code 501(c)(3) (see above list of permissible activities)
 - Draft bylaws and select a board of directors.
 - Board may be the same persons as with the 501(c)(4), if the c4 does not engage in political activity. However, the board meetings for each entity must be held separately, and books and records (including accounting) must be separate.
 - Submit an application for tax-exempt status.

- Discussion:
 - Stephen: Joe brought this up a couple of months ago, we brought it up again a couple of weeks ago. As a community we make the decision to become a 501(c)(4). Most activities fit into a 501(c)(3) but because the work we were doing could be used by electoral campaigns, there was a concern that ProgCode could have a bit of a target on its back and could be challenged because some of the work could be considered to be of a political nature. The community made the decision that ProgCode would start out as a C4 and then possibly create a C3 after doing fundraising to make the C4 sustainable. Possibly a PAC and possibly even a for-profit organization. Recently as we found inability to qualify for grants the idea of going back to a C3 formation has come up. Joe brought it up a number of months ago and a couple of others have brought it up. Basically the limitations qualifying for grants for a C4 is the organization has the ability to lobby and most orgs have their own prohibitions on lobbying. ProgCode does not lobby, original membership decided ProgCode would not lobby, endorse or work on electoral campaigns. Last year we could have applied for a grant with Y-Combinator (\$250k). This year Y-Combinator said no more C4s. Pamela mentioned our New Media Ventures grant application, that NMV had some hesitation about our C4 entity.
 - Stephen: I made a suggestion to move all of the activities we do as a C4 into a C3 and allow all members to become members or opt out if they want to. So the agenda item lays out the process for that. I'm happy to go through it if anybody wants but now that I've given a little history I'd rather open up the floor to anyone who wants to make comments, questions, suggestions and we can get into how to do it a bit more.
 - Esha: I think there's no downside to creating a C3 except for annoying paperwork. There's no downside because we're (Stephen & Esha) are both lawyers.
 - Joe: We're having the same discussion at CiviCRM. I've been advocating for C3 for both orgs for the same reasons. Both orgs are missing out on some funding and support from orgs that are out there. ProgCode and CiviCRM clearly engage in educational activities for free for public benefit. Indefinitely we have a C4 entity as Esha said, it's very common to have a C4 & C3 entity. I've worked for a bunch of

them over the last 30-40 years. It's my experience those entities have a related entity that might be for profit. It's legal for a C3 to receive support for shared services between a C3/C4 that are provided for a for-profit entity (bookkeeping, HR, etc.). I was a ___ for a service entity that was a C3 and C4 as well. The advantages are tremendous. The disadvantages are there (going through the steps, doing the work up front with multiple entities & multiple boards which can be overlapping in part) You'd want to have a CPA for doing your filings and daily accounting, making sure things are on the up and up. Can be a little more tricky. More work but the potential benefit for fundraising is far outweighed by the additional dollar cost and time cost, whether paid or volunteer.

- Sema: What's the deadline (to file the 501(c)(3) entity) so that ProgCode can apply for grants
- Stephen: There are some windows we're facing now from some of the orgs that we've targeted in the past. Both NMV and Y-combinator... if I remember correctly I believe NMV has an annual application and then a special one. The window for the Y-Combinator grant is closing in March. The one concern we should have is this: if we incorporate... first let me explain. The process is you create the entity under state law. We create a C3 then make application to IRS for tax exempt status. If IRS grants it, it's retroactive to the date that it was originally filed. If we incorporate in 2018 it's possible we would be passed over for some grants because we would be seen as too fresh an entity. It may not look favorable to the evaluators. It would be helpful if we could at least create the entity in 2018 but it's not fatal. If you're asking about deadlines it's really just a strategic thing. If we are going to be conclusive and get notice out to everybody and engage in discussion in the legal channel to get all voices heard if possible.
- Sema: you want to ideally get this done before the year is over so that it seems you have been engaged in business for more than a year.
- Stephen: The one year thing can help but it's not necessarily fatal.
- Sema: What would make the process easy to answer everybody's questions going forward. I don't know. From what I see the C4 took months to figure out. We are not that far away from January 1st.
- Pamela: Good questions. We have guidelines. They should be included in the document. It's on the ProgCode Github Functions board. This would be considered a "Major Change" as described in the document. Look at "Major Changes" which includes a 10-step process for proposing a major change. We have to notify the community. There is a typo in the middle of Item 3. Not clear

what the wording was supposed to be. Joe Breslin created it, so we can ask him whether he can fix it. Once the e-mail to the community, we can seek consent to proceed. (See the Wiki for details Pamela explained in the discussion). Notice is important now that we have over 1500 members across so many time zones. Major changes are designed to take some time. Don't think it's possible to do this in 30 days.

- Sema: I know that process. Has a Github issue been created.
- Stephen: As the change process suggests, everything starts w/a proposal. When this was first put on the agenda 10/29 we set up a meeting at 7pm ET because Joe Breslin was not going to be able to make the 8pm ET Ops meeting. Joe wanted to give some input and understand what would be discussed. Joe, Pamela & I set up the 7pm meeting. We are the co-directors of ProgCode and we thought it was important to put Joe's views on the record. The meeting was not recorded. Andrea Miller signed on to talk about Carpool Vote at 8pm and that discussion took the remainder of time for the community ops meeting. Because most of what Andrea talked about was strategic information related to Carpool Vote. One of the things we discussed was that we would need an GitHub issue. I drafted one. The Change Proposal requires that it goes to the community and it may not end up how it looks in the beginning but that's the process. We did that for Project Lifeboat, sent out notice to members and included a link to the GitHub issue. I prepared a GitHub issue and due to the nature of the concern raised, I copied everything from that and put it in a separate document. If you go to the GitHub issue 250 there's a bunch of stuff in there. We can put it in there through my proposing it as we did in project lifeboat or we can have everybody work on it in the channel. I'm fine either way but we have to start with a pilot initiative to get the process going.
- Sema: So this obviously started before the election and Stephen put it together, right? So it's only fitting that you continue putting it together unless anyone objects to it. It's a good thing to have the community involved but you already put the plan in why not go forward with it.
- Stephen: My intention was I would put it up and we could make changes with it. I have no issue with having community input. Either way is fine. Whatever anybody wants to do I am happy to accomodate.
- Sema: I'm in to proceed to help this move forward I have limited experience with creating my own C3.

- Pamela: Haven't seen anyone object to creating a c3 entity. Objection is that it wasn't created as required in the Change Process. That should have been in the original team announcement. Has to be posted the Friday before the meeting. No mention of the vote. Not in compliance with the Change Process. Don't know what the entity would look like. Not just talking about the people in this meeting. Rushing the vote that quickly was a fatal error. Rules exist for a reason. We can't expedite it faster than the process.
- Joe: I understand the goal Stephen articulated, but it might not be realistic. What's the best form to use? Where should we do it? Other opportunities for fundraising, so it's best to reach consensus. Regardless of the time it takes, benefits are worth going through the process.
- Sema: The pre-meeting, it sounds like the process wasn't followed from the time the meeting began. We should remind each other of the rules. Let's be helpful toward each other to benefit ProgCode. It should have been recorded.
- Pamela: No one but Stephen knew he was going to post the notice. There was no discussion about what the Github looked like. I was alarmed because it looked like the entire community was left out of the process.
- Sema: It would have been helpful to record the meeting between the three directors.
- Pamela: We don't have to record the meeting to have the directors on the same page. You can create a Github proposal to change that. Because we're in different time zones, we can't always communicate. Joe was in his car while we were talking in that meeting. It was informal. No decisions are made by the Directors. All instructions come from the bottom up. Law requires us to have directors.
- Esha: The law requires a minimum board of directors. You can require in the bylaws that members vote before directors can meet.
- Stephen: The GitHub issue that I created was not published, was not intended to be published, it was a draft. I tagged the 5 staff members, and then I went to have dinner. Because GH doesn't allow you to save documents and because I put time into it, I saved it. It was not my intention to publish it to the community without first talking to the other directors. During the meeting I said I would be happy to prepare the GitHub issue. As I recall I had permission from both Stephen and Pamela to create it. I hadn't had a chance to look at the change process until I took off to dinner and while I was in dinner it had been shared.

- Pamela: Sharing the screen. 11-10-18 Stephen told the channel that he would create it and share it in the channel. He didn't share it. Didn't know that Stephen was at dinner. Hour lapsed and didn't see it, so I posted it.
 - Sema: Again, should be friendly with each other and communicate with each other to avoid confusion. Good idea to indicate that something is in draft mode. Also, having discussions without recording them is not being transparent. Understand that having meetings between the directors is necessary.
 - Joe: All valid. Stuff happens. How do we keep moving this forward?
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- Move from Slack to an open-source 'Slackalike' like mattermost.org (Joe McLaughlin)
 - See <https://github.com/ProgressiveCoders/functions/issues/203> and <https://github.com/ProgressiveCoders/functions/issues/238>
 - I'd add links to past discussion on Slack - but I can't because it's disappeared behind Slack's paywall ;)
 - Discussion:
 - Joe: Other groups also using Slack. A number of project I'm in use the free version of Slack and we hit the 10K message limit. On ProgCode, we've been active for a couple of years, and a lot of valuable conversations have been archived and are behind the paywall. It's frustrating, because recent discussions are not searchable. We should look at OSS alternatives to Slack, like Mattermost, Zulip, Rocketchat, and others. They give access to all of your messages. Mattermost & Zulip allow you to merge current messages into them. Arguments against it are valid. One is that some use Slack for a lot of projects. Also thousands of users we might lose if we change. The alternatives are similar to Slack's functionality. I suggest that we evaluate the alternatives and consider the pluses and minuses. We've discussed asking Slack for a discount.
 - Esha: We have to be careful about retaining our history. We could face litigation and be unable to have proof.
 - Joe: Slack still has access, so litigation could require them to provide the archive. Still discoverable.
 - Esha: I would rather a platform where I can erase messages.
 - Joe: ProgCode would have complete control over messages in Mattermost hosted and saved on Heroku. Even if we deleted the messages, Heroku might be able to obtain them.

- Pamela: Good points. We've discussed migrating up from free Slack, and no one brought up the data retention matter. It dovetails into what we're discussing about a 501(c)(3). We should keep it in mind. Don't know how it will affect the existing Slack.
- Sema: at this moment I wouldn't have any concerns. ProgCode has had all of these channels for a long time, how would we shift those over. What would the process be, would it be months of work and who would initiate that?
- Stephen: Joe do you have any idea what would be entailed in moving over to one of the other platforms?
 - I'm involved in CiviCRM and we were on Slack 2 years ago. We got off Slack after a few months because of the paywall. Sema, to your question about channels and past discussions, that can all be recreated. Export from slack and upload to mattermost or whatever else is used. Setup can be pretty quick (over a matter of days) to get a Mattermost instance running on Heroku for example. I don't have experience with Zulip or Rocketchat. There is a cost. If you host one of the platforms on Heroku, having a server is a monthly ongoing cost but much, much less than paid Slack at \$5/user/month. At the very most one could run one of these platforms on Heroku for ballpark \$100/mo. No per user cost because it's open source and you can have as many users as you want. You're just scaling up.
- Stephen: ProgCode is paying \$7/mo for absolute minimum use of Heroku. Don't know whether the traffic we have on ProgCode now would cause that to jump significantly. \$100/mo we might be able to fundraise for that. Is it something we can start now and give people a chance to play around with it and see if they like it? It might help with decisionmaking. Sometimes people just need to get into to see it's not that tough.
 - Joe: Yeah there is. The time and cost at setting that up is not that much. I started to do it for Working Families. The answer is yes. Chat.civicrm.org is running mattermost. Joe and Rapi and other folks have been over there in a channel discussing the possibility. If you go to Mattermost.org they have a running instance for discussion and people trying it out. You can have a demo or lab for people trying it out. Might be easier with Zulip and Rocketchat.
 - Stephen: I want to raise something w/respect to the discount. We raised it in one ops meeting but never made a big announcement about it. Pamela & I met w/some people from Slack management and managed to get a

proposal for discounted rate of \$4.5k per year minimum. If we went over 250 users it would be much more than that. There was another discussion that took place and a suggestion that we could start archiving the discussions yourself. Keep everything in Slack (status quo) and

- Pamela: Archiving is a tool that allows you to keep the past history, but not private conversations. Whoever gets the token to do the archiving can transfer his/her/their own messages. Civic-CRM might be better.
- Esha: What about Discord? Heroku is very expensive. Research Digital Ocean, which might be cheaper.
- Joe: I've used Discord. Certainly worth looking at. Heroku can be cheap. Working Families runs a staging Spoke in Heroku for testing things. There are free Heroku, too. Digital Ocean is a worthy platform. There are others, too. They all are cheaper than a paid Slack.
- Sema: Joe, can we create some of the conversations?
- Joe: Not recreating it. All of our Slack conversations are in a database at Slack. We'd request it and export it out to Mattermost/Zulip/Rocketchat/Discord and then add to it going forward. It would be helpful having a separate archive to search, but more useful to have it in the platform itself.
- Sema: Is there a cost to transfer everything over?
- Joe: Don't believe that Slack would charge. Mattermost is our own instance.
- Sema: Slack charges a fee per user per month to access your records. Don't know whether they would waive that.
- Joe: Recall that Civic-CRM weren't charged, but we should look at it. If Slack Admins request their archive, I believe that they will allow it.
- Pamela: The workarounds we've used is pinning URLs to the channel with short descriptions. You can still access the link searching in the channel details. We can pin documents to the channels. The community voted to create a Github project management board for the proposals so that we have a permanent record of history. It's been a challenge to get those unfamiliar with Slack to pin things to channels or discussions. GoogleDocs can be pinned, but they are not safe because links can be shared. Currently can't afford \$100/month for Heroku, but we could consider it in the future

- Joe: I just posted in the WF Slack to see if there's a charge. I'll ask Dillon who did an export back in May. I want to look at it. If there are a couple of other folks who want to be recruited to look at it. It would be helpful if there's a committee put together to look at options. Whatever help in recruiting folks to that would be helpful. On the demo site, it could be much less than \$100/mo. I just put it out there as a number. I'll put together a mattermost demo and will pay for it because it won't be that much. I'll attempt to get it set up simultaneously and when it's up and running at a demo people could take a look at it. If it's easy/quick to do turnkey Rocketchat or Zulip I'll look at that.
- Stephen: that would be really helpful. I think it's a good approach. It's a difficult decision process we've gone through a lot of discussion because there is a lot of frustration. Pamela mentioned putting it up for consent to proceed. You could do that if you want, you don't have to do that if you want to put it in testing mode now because some people may not know to proceed or not. However if the expense is going to be too great for you and you want to see if this is something we want to consider.
- Joe: Where these things increase cost potential is when you have a bunch of people using it. If you want to go from a free dyno to a hobby dyno. And I'll ask around. I'll go back and ping the person on CiviCRM to run its own mattermost.
- Stephen: Esha, Sema, I'm sorry I think I jumped in front of you.
- Sema: I think it's Esha's turn
- Esha: Two suggestions: 1) have a committee get together to evaluate 2) we should probably talk about fundraising. It seems kind of low for the amount of potential there is.
- Stephen: please join the fundraising channel. I jumped in front of Sema again but she can probably say the same thing.
- Sema: I was going to say the same thing. We need more fundraising to make the great work of progcode sustainable. I was going to ask about transferring over to Mattermost, how many people would be needed?
- Joe: I'll need some help from Civic-CRM. If we want to do it, there is enough tech savvy among our members, that we won't have to pay anyone to help set this up. We have to figure out the fixed monthly costs, but probably won't have to pay anyone.

- Sema: I know it's difficult to get people to help on the operations side. Sounds like you'll need a few hours a week from people
 - Joe: Agreed. Some in the Spoke channel have the ability. We could recruit from there.
 - Pamela: #wg-fundraising and #slack-solution are good channels to join. Sema and Esha, you should join them.

- Issue #249 - Vote for consent to implement the standard change to purchase a renewable Airtable Plus account for access by ProgCode staff for the benefit of and use by the ProgCode community.
 - Considerations:
 - ProgCode uses a free Airtable account for a Project List, Channel List, and other record-keeping. It can be integrated into Slack, and ProgCode has made use of this feature.
 - A free Airtable account allows for unlimited bases and a maximum of **1200 records** per base. We have exceeded this limit in two of the bases which are vital to Operations.
 - The lowest level paid account (i.e., Plus account) allows for an unlimited number of bases (like the free plan) and up to **5000 records** per base, which will provide sufficient record capacity for the immediate future. Now that fundraising has improved, ProgCode can afford the annual fee of \$120.00 (\$10/month for 12 months).
 - Discussion:
 - ProgCode's workspace uses 1300+ records for one table (Members) on the base and 1500+ records for a second table (Registration Forms) so not sure whether 5k records would be sufficient.
 - Factors to consider:
 - ProgBot - can we delete old records when ProgBot launches?

It would be helpful to know what record-keeping is required, how often we need to report, and how our tax return should be prepared, so we can assess whether we can do it ourselves. Want our first returns to be done correctly so that we don't raise eyebrows about our activity or our c4 status. Most of our revenue comes from small-dollar donations. We should be able to download a .csv from Patreon and from Crowdpac and then upload that data into the accounting program to report donations.

- Pamela: Let's ask Lisa whether she can meet with the community and discuss her ideas about what we should do. We can solicit other volunteers from the community through #ask-the-team and #team-announcements.
 - Stephen: Agreed. We can use that information to create a pilot initiative for later discussion and a community vote.

- [Issue #248](#) - Vote for consent to implement the standard change to purchase a renewable Pro Plan Zoom account for access by ProgCode staff for the benefit of and use by the ProgCode community.
 - Considerations:
 - ProgCode uses Zoom as its preferred videoconferencing tech
 - It is a necessity for meetings, onboarding sessions, the Virtual Conference, and, most recently, the first ProgCode podcast.

- ProgCode has relied on the use of individuals' personal paid Zoom accounts, which has worked well but leaves the community exposed to the possibility of lack of access.
- This proposed solution would require a minor annual expenditure (currently \$149.90) for a Zoom Pro Plan, which could be accessed by ProgCode staff and used to host all video conferencing needs.
- Discussion:
 - Stephen: Will go over philosophy behind buying a pro Zoom account. We are a virtual community, and most of our meetings use zoom because of ease of use and great video and audio performance. Since the beginning relying on paid accounts of members. In the past other members allowed the community to use their paid accounts. We are averaging \$80 in recurring donations as well as a grant from MoveOn. A Pro Plan allows us to have up to 100 people on one zoom call for an unlimited amount of time. A free account only allows 2 people. It is important to have a zoom account for lengthy meeting. When subscribe, can pay monthly or \$149 annually. Can always terminate if we want. Use it for virtual conference and all of our meetings. Proposal is to purchase an account, give access to the staff. Move everything from current account to Prog Code account. Meetings get new identifiers. Then everything is exclusively prog code and staff will be able to access account as needed. Recently opened up a pilot initiative on how to start a zoom meeting. Went through an expenditure analysis. It is aligned with our four point analysis. Would be funded by small dollar donations. Plan at this point is, after discussion we take a vote, consent to implement, then we'd notify community, post video of meeting so others can vote. Wait until thursday night or friday morning. If no strong objections, proceed to purchase account. I would continue to make account available to the staff to be able to host concurrent meetings.

One thing about the pricing. Could have gone with the business account. Would have been too expensive. In the future it may make more sense to buy more individual pro accounts.

- Sema: No Objections
- Adiron: No objections.
- Stephen: If there are any objections let us know before Friday and we can table this for next monday.

- Pamela (09.18.2018): No objection, just an additional consideration regarding this item in the **Plan** to implement:

“Reassign all recurring ProgCode meetings and schedule all future ProgCode meetings to the ProgCode Zoom account, to the extent necessary or convenient to Staff.”

 - Jake Varghese has been a ProgCode Super-Volunteer this year. Some of Jake’s many contributions include
 - working diligently since December 2017 with Susanna and Robert to develop ProgBot
 - editing the 13 hour Virtual Conference recording into 13 individual videos, for each presentation

- participating in weekly Podcast planning sessions and editing podcast videos.
- Last week, Jake expressed an interest in doing outreach and PR on behalf of ProgCode and the podcast. Accordingly, Pamela has created the above GitHub issue proposing that Jake be onboarded as a ProgCode volunteer staff member and receive a progcode.org email address which will enable him to do “official” ProgCode outreach and PR work.
 - Discussion:
 - Pamela: Discussed this with Jake as an alternative to his drafting e-mails for another staffer to send or using a non-ProgCode e-mail for outreach. Minor increase in ProgCode budget of \$5/month. Because it is a budgetary change, must follow the 4-prong test. Meets all 4 criteria, as set forth in Issue #247. Plan is community discussion tonight at this meeting and then consent to implement. Then notify community of the vote and then wait 72-hour waiting period. If passed, would create a jake@progcode.org e-mail address. Would also create an outreach template.
 - Stephen: Want to reiterate what Pamela said about Jake’s amazing contributions this year. Doesn’t think we’d have been able to finish the Democratizing Democracy Virtual Conference. Very grateful.
 - Jake: Google Apps has a non-profit version which gives NP’s 100 addresses.
 - Stephen: Yeah, it’s strictly limited to c3s and we don’t qualify as a c4.

 - Pamela: Created #242, which was brought up for vote. OSDI asked Pamela to be OSDI's VP of Liaisons, which was Jacob Legrone's previous position. 4 days ago, Pamela updated the Issue. Vote for nominated officers was deemed final on 08.31.2018.

- Issue 245 Advertising ProgCode Staff Positions on the ProgCode website.
 - Proposed by John Evans
 - Staff proposed adjourning discussion and vote to a meeting where John and Adiron can attend.
- Issue 241 UPDATE (Discussion only, no vote): Discuss Pros & Cons of Joining Civil Publishing Platform.
 - Discussion:
 - Pamela: Created to discuss joining CIVIL. Came about when David Moore suggested during the podcast interview that ProgCode join CIVIL as one of the founding orgs. He mentioned that developers could create "smart contracts" using Ethereum and receive a portion of the funds in return for their work. We voted to continue research and discussion about what it would mean to become a member of the CIVIL community. It's a cryptocurrency buy-in which gives a number of tokens, depending upon the exchange rate at the time. A recent Medium article (in the Issue) now explains the buy-in, which is astronomical. They are launching their token sale next month. Minimum \$1000 for the level (Contributor level) David mentioned for ProgCode to start a newsroom. They are building in a conflicts-resolution system which allows you to challenge bad-actors. Then it goes up to a higher level for Benefactors. Interested in hearing feedback.
 - Stephen: At the time of the Medium post which Stephen linked to the bottom of this issue, Civil was still in the process of determining how to implement a conflicts resolution process using votes/challenges/appeals, etc. Nothing in the article shows whether newsrooms which are voted out will get back their contribution. After seeing the contribution buy-in levels, to be spending that much money to

participate in something else which really isn't open source (it's really closed source and proprietary). Not saying I wouldn't support it we need to get more information on it. If we're interested I'd like to see a conference where we discuss with a representative of civil.

- Jake: I look at this as unnecessary. Patreon is simpler and easier to understand. If we are thinking about doing this for our own funding, I'd rather stick to Patreon for now.
 - Stephen: Jake raised the point, using cryptocurrency means that someone is making money off of each transaction because they are converting their cryptocurrency. Ethereum would have a relationship with the people who run Civil.
 - Pamela: They are still open source I'm not sure why you think it's proprietary.
 - Stephen: it's pay to access, exclusive.
 - Pamela: If we put a note on the Issue that there was concerned at a meeting that this is not mission-aligned and leave open the issue for anyone else to investigate, then others can proceed if they want to.
 - Stephen: Is there a window that David is allowing for ProgCode?
 - Pamela: He was just letting us know that there was an opportunity to buy-in. The sale begins on 09.18.2018. The only thing about this that appealed to me is that ProgCode developers who are building things such as Progbot could receive some compensation for the work they're doing if other CIVIL participants find value in it. The details we've learned subsequently says that it's completely out of alignment with ProgCode's values and mission.
 - Sema: Does Civil have a verification process to keep corporate influence out, similar to what ProgCode does?
 - Pamela: David Moore explained that there is a process to challenge someone who is coming in who is not mission-aligned. To participate in that, you have to stake at least \$1000. The others could stake higher amounts and have a louder voice.
 - Sema: That was my concern, too. Seemed like a good idea at the beginning, but now a bit shady.
 - Pamela: Newsrooms on CIVIL, like Sludge, are doing good work. I will update the Issue and then indicate that it's tabled and why. If someone feels passionately about it, they can pick it up.

 - Stephen: Sustainability Plan was started in 2017, re-upped in 2018 when we:
 - Applied for NMV Grant; and
 - Kicked off the Patreon & Crowdpac prior to March 2018 Democratizing Democracy virtual conference
 - We haven't got a fundraising plan for promoting those fundraising efforts.
 - Adiron: Fundraising via grants for C4 is much more difficult than grants for C3.
 - Are there other things we can do on top of the podcast that are like grants
 - Pamela: Sustainability Plan was written in 2017 by somebody, not sure who, but it was not a collaborative effort. At the end of 2017 we went back to it as a reference when filling out the New Media Ventures grant application. Joe, Pamela, & Stephen were the only donors to Patreon at that time, we had \$18 in subscriptions

that first week to show NMV. NMV was concerned why, if ProgCode operates as a c3, it filed as a c4. We revisited the Sustainability Plan again when planning and promoting the virtual conference. We received about \$600 in donations ahead of the virtual conference as a direct result of vc promotions. Most money ProgCode has raised to day and it shows that we can fundraise for an event. This week the news cycle reported that Georgia recently proposed closing 75% of the polls in Randolph County. It's been an hot issue on Twitter. We posted 3 Twitter posts for donations to ProgCode related to Carpool Action and the poll closings.

- Pamela: cross-posting. If we do a podcast and post notice on Twitter, Facebook, Medium, etc., we can do it with a single post and paste it on each. Agree with SS about doing podcasts and seek donations. Might re-do the Patreon page. Most start with \$5/month donations. At that time, we had no content. Now we do. As to per project fundraising, we tried to do that for CarpoolAction, but no one ran with it. Have received some inquiries by mail about donating to CarpoolAction. There is a section on the site donations@carpoolvote.com. When someone writes there, Sasjka forwards it to us, we respond, and the donor gets back to us. If we change that to our Patreon, it would save time and allow us to promote the project on the CarpoolVote site. We could target a project and get around that hurdle we're facing regarding c4s.
- Adiron: Could we have a per project fundraising strategy and a general fundraising strategy for ProgCode? Maybe get funds to hire a programmer to hire a developer to work on projects.
- Pamela: It's a good way to distribute to the projects. One for podcasts, one for other projects, etc.. But would be good to have a uniform approach to them. When we decide to write the introduction to the podcast, we could that as a template across projects.
- Adiron: So, like a "style guide" for fundraising. This could be a way for non-programmers (activists) to plug in.
- Pamela: No one is assigned to fundraising. For NMV, we set up the application form and made it available for all to give input. Recently put Ann Lewis's Survival Guide and works of other ProgCode members on the ProgCode Medium account. We can share the posts in Slack, though ActionNetwork, Twitter, Facebook, etc.. Getting some small donations from doing that. But we're not consistent enough. Would be great if we can get people to put in a bit of time each day.

Announcements

- The MoveOn grant money has been received!
 - It has been deposited in the ProgCode credit union account.
 - Stephen: MoveOn generously offered ProgCode a grant. The community voted to accept it, Pamela executed the Grant Agreement on behalf of ProgCode and we received a \$10k grant last week and it has been deposited into the ProgCode credit union savings account. How it gets spent will be a decision of the community. It's to be used to "support

the general purpose of the organization”. We are grateful to MoveOn and everyone there for supporting us.

Tools and Documentation

- Slack - Pamela and Stephen met with Duncan Carvey of Slack on 08-09-18 to discuss rates for a paid Slack account, following Slack’s Deepti Rohatgi accepting ProgCode into the non-profit program.
 - 200 average users per month will cost \$4500 for the year.
 - That represent an 85% discount under the non-profit plan.
 - Only actual benefit will be access to archived Slack messages.
 - Discussion
 - Stephen: The community has been talking about Slack alternatives and asking about accessing archived messages. One alternative was asking Slack to consider giving ProgCode the non-profit discount (85%). ProgCode applied w/Tech Soup and was declined because Slack only gives the np discount to c(3) orgs. Malous called in some favors and got Stephen and Pamela a meeting with Deepti at Slack and a subsequent meeting with Duncan Carvey who handles education & non-profits. Upgrading to a Standard Paid Slack would be a greater cost than
 - Pamela: Even if upgraded to standard paid Slack, would only get our archived messages. Pro Plan would provide controls that are contrary to ProgCode’s transparency policies. So, not much of a benefit to going on a paid plan.

Operations

- Issue 243: Pamela would like to notify the community about a paid job opportunity she is pursuing with with Magnify Progress.
 - MP seeks someone to post content across their social media pages
 - Pamela needs a part-time job
 - Pamela seeks a community vote for consent to continue exploring the possibility of accepting the job if there are no objections by the community.
 - Discussion:
 - Pamela: Malous indicated that Magnify Progress worked with a tech incubator, was approved for a grant, and formed a for-profit to accept the grant. Might offer a job to me to work on the MP project. Uncertain at the present time whether it would happen or for how much. Don’t usually require anyone to seek approval from the community before accepting work, but I am a co-director and want to know whether the community has any concern about my taking a position with

MP. Our goal is to remove the influence of money in politics, and I want to ask whether anyone has a concern about my taking a position. Problem is that MP needs someone to post social media and I need a job. Will it appear to the community that I am favoring MP? Rapi did this once before when he was offered a position with Civic Hall, because he wanted to make sure that his position in leadership didn't suggest actual or perceived bias for MP. Seeking consent

Strategic Partnerships

- Issue 242: A request was made by the OSDI Executive Board on 7/29 that Pamela join OSDI's governance board as a voting member. The request was discussed at the 7/30 Ops meeting but no vote was requested and no decision made. On 8/9, Stephen and Pamela received another email asking that whoever is made the governance board member would ideally take the leadership position of "VP of Liaisons". These positions were previously held by Rapi Castillo and Jacob Legrone, respectively.
 - Seeking with community vote for consent to implement the community's decision and respond to OSDI by accepting or declining the offer with **the caveat that Pamela or whomever is the ProgCode governance board member/VP of Liaisons will abstain from any partisan or electoral votes.**
 - Josh: We allow customer affiliations, customers raising their hand in support of the board. We haven't had any candidates yet but one of OSDI's affiliated customers is Washington Democrats. Why do you ask?
 - Stephen: ProgCode is a non-partisan organization not participating in electoral work, partisan work or lobbying activities.
 - Josh: Main function of governance board is to vote on motions. Main day to day decisions are made by executive board. Jacob was the VP of Liaisons between ProgCode and OSDI. Answering questions about who is the point of contact, you may want to show up at the next meeting or check out GitHub, etc. Every other week governance board meeting where VP of Liaisons may have a question or to on the agenda. OSDI does have hopes the DNC will join us at some point.
 - Stephen: I noticed under Section 11 "Participation Taxonomy Constitution" under 11.2.1 includes democratic political campaigns, bipartisan political organizations whose primary business is political outreach, etc. Sounds like it's indirectly related to electoral politics.
 - Josh: Do you want to share your screen so we can look together? Stephen: Sure. Can you see that okay? Stephen points to Section 11

- Josh: This is really talking about what kinds of customers OSDI would serve. I.e., we would not work with Nation Builder. This is outside the scheme of political fundraising, we don't get involved in campaigns, we don't help with races. There are members of OSDI who may do that.
- Stephen: Are you providing services to campaigns?
- Josh: No, the members of OSDI are doing that.
- Stephen: So that would be indirect coordination.
- Josh: ProgCode exists to help progressives, right? You're there because you want to help them by building software. Are you doing indirect coordination as well?
- Stephen: If we build software which can be used by a campaign (not particular to an electoral campaign or party) if we do it in conjunction with a campaign it would be indirect coordination.
- Josh: Hustle or MoveOn might build software for or might join a campaign but what happens in OSDI is the technical specification creation. We don't do any organizing, cooperating w/campaign or build software, we just build a document for progressives in general.
- Stephen: Got it, that's good. Really removes a layer of concern.
- Pamela: One of the problems is that the community never knew that there was any governance or leadership role that ProgCode played. Tonight we'll discuss this issue. How would we handle a vote where I'm unsure about a grey area, how does the community want it handled? Would I come back to the community and ask how the community wants it handled?
- Adiron: Boils down to making the best decision you can at the time. If you run into a problem, then perhaps you could come up with a process for dealing with it the next time.
- Sema: No issues. I was concerned about what happens when one person steps down from the position and how they're replaced, but Josh answered that already.
- Pamela: When Rapi stepped down, we didn't know he was on the board of OSDI. If I leave, does ProgCode come to OSDI and ask to replace me?
- Josh: You weren't paying attention that Rapi was on the board. If you leave ProgCode, you would let OSDI know. If you're going to another org that would qualify, we could consider letting you remain on the Governance Board for the new org. ProgCode as governance member could put up a new person to take over your position.
- Motion for consent to continue developing an internal ProgCode process for determining a) who is the OSDI representative and b) when does the OSDI representative consult with the

community on votes and c) how does the OSDI representative consult with the community on votes?

Strategic / Digital Communications

- Issue 241: Potential member and community benefits and any implications of joining the CIVIL cooperative community, initially as publishers of The Progressive Coder blog (moving away from Medium) but also as an addition to Patreon allowing small dollar subscriptions and micro-tips to creators of written, video or
- podcast content and even open source tech in the future.
 - Seeking community vote on consent to continue exploring the expectations, limitations, benefits and implications.
 - Discussion:
 - Pamela: This came out of my interview with David Moore about the CIVIL platform. It's a protocol or set of ethical rules set out in their Constitution. Also a network of websites. On that network are open source news rooms. It uses Blockchain (Kim Dryden shared a video about it). They use it to verify that every change to a publication is seen by the public so that they know what changes were made. During the 2016 campaign, there were favorable Sanders articles which later were changed to unfavorable. The articles were shared without people know that they were changed. Each newsroom can charge a subscription rate for access to their platform. David said that they want to add open source coders doing what ProgCode is doing. CIVIL also is a co-operative where each member has a vote on who can join. CIVIL got a grant which helped with the original cash outlay the initial news platforms would have had to pay. In September, there will be an issuance of tokens, and ProgCode can buy into the organization. After they launch the sale of CVL tokens, there will be a second fleet of members, which should include open source coders. Then there will be a second issuance of tokens which is how everyone else will participate. How does ProgCode and its members benefit. ProgCode would have an account where our publications would be published. We sell subscriptions. But a member could receive "microchips" from subscribers to continue publishing content which subscribers like. If someone wanted ProgCode to create tech for them to use, Ethereum allows for "smart contracts" for that exchange. Would pay for it in cryptocurrency (Ethereum).
What we don't know:

- What is the initial amount of tokens required to be purchased to participate in the Second Fleet of newsroom publishers?
- What are the Pros and Cons of moving away from Medium and using Civil in addition to Patreon to raise small dollar contributions?
- Adiron: Civil is lesser known; people have a fear of the unknown. No statistics on that. If they're playing in blockchain of some kind I'm not sure of the ins and outs of that. Might make things a little more confusing because the unfamiliarity of the tech might be intimidating.
- Stephen: I like the idea of getting in on the ground floor and that we're being offered that opportunity, even if ProgCode had to put up some money I think it's something worth considering to be able to get involved in something like this. A little skeptical that any cryptocurrency has had issues. Not easy to buy into it by design, part of the safety aspect. Whether and how ProgCode and the community can benefit from it.
- Sema: I've come into contact w/a few people using cryptocurrency. It always takes a little capital to come in and make an initial investment. Someone creates a public key, and a private key. I've looked at it as a way to destabilize the petro dollar which is a good thing. That's totally up to y'all and what y'all decide and whether ProgCode can afford to invest.
- Stephen: This is consent to continue? Pamela yes, and a notice to the community that the opportunity is out there.

- OSDI Governance Board
 - Pamela: On 7.29.2018, OSDI emailed me an invite to join the OSDI Governance Board in place of Rapi for purposes of voting on items submitted for consent within the OSDI

extended community. Apparently Rapi held this position at some point when ProgCode and OSDI partnered and it remained open when Rapi stepped down from ProgCode leadership in September 2017.

- I had been included in an unofficial capacity in some email discussions under the OSDI Diversity & Inclusion group for a few months. OSDI's D&I group will vote in 2 weeks on the future role of one of OSDI's founding members. The vote springs from subject-matter which falls under OSDI's D&I discussions. I pointed out following the last D&I call that if they were counting on me to vote in the next meeting, I was not sure whether anyone at ProgCode was asked to become a voting member since Rapi's departure. I believe my inquiry about why I was being included in a governance board vote is what prompted OSDI to check their records and ask me to participate in Governance Board decisions in time for the upcoming meeting & vote.
- Discussion:
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Evangelism

- Pamela seeks a vote for consent to implement allowing her to moderate the Progressive Tech Caucus with two other tech organizations which also submitted a caucus proposal. (GitHub Issue 239). Other moderators are:
 - Ana Jamboric & Noah Levinson of Social Roots
 - Dan Ryan of Ragtag
 - Discussion
 - Pamela: Already knew about Shaka's panel. Netroots asked whether we want to host a caucus. We submitted a proposal. Ours was one of 4 related to tech. Ours related to reducing the effect of money in politics through the use of OSS. Netroots merged us with Ragtag and Social Roots, under the category of progressive tech. Want to share best practices on organizing communities for tech. We did community vote to approve participating in the panel, so wanted to seek consent for this caucus, too. Dan Ryan of Ragtag worked with Obama Campaign and Ragtag works with Dem orgs.
 - Stephen: Don't see a conflict for appearing with Ragtag or other partisan groups in a function. We're still promoting OSS.
 - Joe: Agrees.
 - Adiron: Agree. Don't know how you could have a panel on political tech that doesn't have a partisan aspect to it.

- Sema: Would be a good opportunity to push progressive tech on other groups.
- Stephen seeks a vote for consent to implement payment for the balance of the Netroots Nation 2018 evangelism costs.
 - Pamela was invited to speak on the Open Source Tech FTW panel moderated by Shaka Lee. The conference is 8/1-8/4. The community already approved and paid Pamela's \$140 speaker fee. **(Thank you ProgCode community!)**
 - Pamela launched a GoFundMe to crowdsource \$1000 in travel expenses (\$566.10 airfare + \$449 hotel = \$1015.10).
 - As of 07-29-18 \$870 has been raised, leaving uncovered travel expense of \$145. Pamela has already purchased round trip plane tickets totalling \$566.10 after tax. Donors are still giving to the GoFundMe account.
 - Credit union balance as of 7.29.2018 is \$375.07
 - Stephen: Pamela launched a GFM to cover NN18 travel expenses. The community voted to pay her \$140 speaker fee and paid it at the beginning of the month. Credit union balance is \$375.07 as of 7-29-2018. Wants to take a vote on covering whatever's not covered by the GFM. Currently the GFM has raised \$870. If no more donations are raised the amount to left to contribute would be \$130.
 - Pamela: Appreciate this vote, but wary of spending \$130, even with our current balance. Family members will cover whatever I cannot.
 - Joe: Concern that we should be mindful of the current expenses of ProgCode. Support the idea of covering the remaining expenses. We'll get a great benefit from your attendance.
 - Sema: My belief is you're going to promote ProgCode. We have to invest a bit of money to get something back. Agree with this expense.
 - Adiron: Agree. If you're going on behalf of ProgCode, we should cover the cost of you to attend. You're our representative.
 - Pamela: Okay with voting yes, if with the understanding that I won't take it if I don't need it.
 - Stephen: re: the Moveon grant, that will be our big cushion. I feel if you have any unanticipated expenses we may want to consider reimbursement of extra expenses. This is an expensive event.

General Network Strategy

- Idea for an 'Introspection Week' (or a better name)
 - ProgCode is in kind of a strange position. We are a global institution, with lots of highly educated and skilled people involved, that is getting things done but it feels like there's a lot of unrealised potential.
 - It's important to recognise that ProgCode is *a new kind of thing*. It's an experiment, a vital experiment, but an experiment nonetheless. There are analogues of what ProgCode is, like a political party, or a trade guild etc, but none of them capture the essence of it, because this hasn't been done before.
 - If we're treating ProgCode as new, then the community needs to talk to itself, and given that it's a global community, that needs to be on a fairly long timescale. So 'Introspection Week' is a bit of misnomer, because I see it as that start of a conversation rather than the entirety of one.

- How to get more Operations Team members?
 - I've been trying to recruit people to the operations team but I'm not sure it's working. I think that this is part of ProgCode's unrealised potential, that the staff members only have 24 hours per day and they need some of that to sleep. I think with maybe 3 'apprentice' operations team members the daily operations would get easier and new things become possible *hint hint introspection week*
 - With the site being redesigned, there's the opportunity to put a "Help Wanted" sign in the window, which can be linked to and shared across various social media sites. If a quarter of the active progcode users shared it, I think there's a big reach there. And I think we're smart enough to realise that having more operations staff is in our interests.
 - Alternately, maybe some of the operations tasks can be shared amongst non "staff members". I guess that's the idea behind ProgBot, to automate a lot of that stuff to make it easier to hand back to the community.

Meeting Notes

General Network Strategy

- Idea for an ‘Introspection Week’ (or a better name)
 - ProgCode is in kind of a strange position. We are a global institution, with lots of highly educated and skilled people involved, that is getting things done but it feels like there’s a lot of unrealised potential.
 - Coders For Sanders was (mostly) nat’l, with one clear goal.
 - ProgCode has a broader focus, and is global
 - It’s important to recognise that ProgCode is *a new kind of thing*. It’s an experiment, a vital experiment, but an experiment nonetheless. There are analogues of what ProgCode is, like a political party, or a trade guild etc, but none of them capture the essence of it, because this hasn’t been done before.
 - If we’re treating ProgCode as new, then the community needs to talk to itself, and given that it’s a global community, that needs to be on a fairly long timescale. So ‘Introspection Week’ is a bit of misnomer, because I see it as that start of a conversation rather than the entirety of one.
 - New people join, haven’t participated in the same formative experiences and conversations get renewed all the time. Hard to do voluntary solution on a short-term scale.
 - I’m imagining introspection week is trailed for a month prior to starting, then when it’s up and running, everyone in ProgCode is given a chance to submit their vision, concerns, questions, hopes, dreams, fears etc. I don’t exactly know how that process would go, maybe a series of large conference calls, perhaps some people break into small groups to produce a suggestion paper, maybe the operations team sends a message to everyone individually, I don’t know. My inclination is “ALL OF THE ABOVE”, as in, the method you use to present your idea is up to you as much as your idea is. If someone wants to make an 8-bit game to represent their idea, I don’t want to get in their way.

- If I.W. will be in October, we start announcing it in September.
- One aspect of Introspection Week could be, do you want to move away from slack? Today I was introduced to a service called We Collective that sounds like it meets our needs.
 - In that conversation, you would recurring questions, i.e.,:
 - the Slack question
 - (c)(3)/(c)(4) question
- Only constraint would be at least one month from now and one week in length.
 - Two weeks after Introspection Week, answers/feedback might be still rolling in
- Stephen: Smiled when I saw your notes in the agenda b/c it's something that has been coming up a lot. It's an election year and we're re-addressing some of the questions we addressed late 2016/early 2017 (Stephen explained the difference between a 501(c)(3) and 501(c)(4) to John who isn't familiar with those U.S. IRS non-profit designations). At the time that decision was made there was a somewhat short window because we needed to file for entity status. Also, only had about 300 members making the decision. Now have 1400+.
- It's time for us to sit back and take our time to discuss what people want ProgCode to be and maybe discuss how they can make that happen.
- John: There's a video about the Cynefin Decision-Making Framework: <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=N7oz366X0-8>
 - Fundamentally ProgCode is more of a complex situation than a complicated one.
 - Yes it would be better if more people felt more empowered to participate in operations, but I can't say really why.
 - In a complex situation you have to do a series of small experiments. This is why Inspection Week is, in my mind, one of those experiments. There's a deterministic aspect to it. Complex system actors w/in a system can change the rules themselves (like ProgCode).
- Pamela: Understand introspection week. After that, assume we would continue it periodically.
- John: Didn't consider that, but it's a good idea. Might consider a trigger, such as half of the current most active members weren't around when the last introspection week took place, do another.
- Pamela: If had a document which gives the high-level things in ProgCode, new members would know what the community is doing currently. This is a great idea because 400 people made the decision. Didn't have a process for recording permanently how the decisions were made. Allowing them to have a part in the decision about what we're

doing makes them stakeholders, rather than just members. They are stakeholders, but we haven't functioned that way.

- John: Also consider how to get more Operations Team members. There are some who identify with being on the Ops Team. From my perspective as a Team Leader, I would like to see a bigger Ops team, because it means I would get more volunteers on my project. Would be more enjoyable than having a larger community. Nothing to say we couldn't do both, but don't know which is easiest.
- Pamela: There were times we had 10 staff members. People chose what tasks they wanted to lead. That person would reach out to others to see what they could contribute. Tech team, outreach, evangelism, etc.. People's lives changed and they had less time to put in ProgCode. We haven't been able to replace them. We are spread too thin and don't do as good a job as should be done. As a result, we don't have as active a project list as we did.
- John: People will drop off, and new members will replace them. ProgCode has helped with Wobbly. ProgCode provides programmers. As people join Wobbly, I can send them back to ProgCode, as I did with Justin and Katy.
- Pamela: Maybe we should ask, "What do you want ProgCode to be?" or "What is your vision of the future for ProgCode?"
- John: Next steps:
 - Help wanted page on ProgCode website, and John will share on social media and in his discussions with other groups.
 - "ProgCode Could Be": I could write it up a bit more. Happy to be part of the team that runs it, but can't do it alone. Need a list of people who are willing to help. It could be a good starter activity for new members.

Operations

- Rescheduling the 07-23-18 Community Operations Meeting

- John Evans (@King Mob) has requested that the **Monday 07.23.18** Community Ops meeting be held at **5pm ET | 10pm BT**, rather than the regular time of **8pm ET | 1am BT**, so that he can attend and make some suggestions from the UK.
- Discussion: Should we move the ops meeting for 7/23/18 to 5pm ET rather than 8pm ET?
- Stephen: ProgCode community set the Ops meetings at 8pm ET to accommodate people on US East and West coasts
- Although the 72-hour participation period allows for members on other continents to vote and comment, there is a gap for people interested in being part of active discussion.
- Sema and Adiron have no objection, though Adiron expressed concern about making this permanent without a more formal action.
- Stephen: Suggested at least once a month holding an active meeting that accommodates our international members. May want to set up a pilot initiative to implement a change to allow for one community ops meeting per month that will accommodate UK and EU.
- ProgCode Tax Return for 2017/2018.
 - Less than \$50K in total revenue for the accounting period
 - Form 990N
- Stephen: Any concerns? We are now tax exempt. Form 990, if revenue is < 50,000 no need to provide details on what was made. Allowed to file form 990N. Will keep a record of it as corporate document. Any questions concerns comment now or in next 72 hours. If it isn't filed 3 years in a row, tax exempt status can be lost.
- **Pamela (July 18th, after the July 16th meeting):** I definitely agree ProgCode should file a 2017/2018 non-profit corp tax return. But I would vote that we file a [990-EZ](#) instead of a 990N for the following reasons:
 - ProgCode's mission is a tacit acknowledgement that money in government causes corruption. It's good praxis to stay true to ProgCode's mission and the core value of transparency by filing a 990-EZ for a few reasons:
 - It's good practice and it will keep us cognizant of the need to keep good records in the coming year.
 - US laws set forth minimum standards for transparency, disclosure and legal compliance. We acknowledge our government is broken. In the past, the community has expressed a desire to lead for change by example and to exceed bare minimum expectation of laws which have the potential to breed abuse in a broken system
 - 501(c)4 orgs in particular are under intense scrutiny (especially by ProgCode's target population of progressive activists) because of their unique potential as a vehicle for bad actors to hide big dark money contributions. ProgCode has been an unofficial entity for a couple of years. We're on the radar of establishment groups, right and left, who might see us as threatening the status quo. Providing clear

itemization of income and expenditures would keep us ahead of potential accusations that ProgCode is tainted by partisan associations and dark money contributions.

■ If people and organizations see that ProgCode operates on a shoestring budget, they may be inspired:

- to start their own progressive organization
- to join us to and learn our processes as a roadmap
- to suggest future small dollar revenue streams or give monthly to grow and sustain the ProgCode community

■ ProgCode's income and expenses to date are so minor that it shouldn't be that complicated to prepare a 990-EZ

General Network Strategy

- Emily Claire & Joe McLaughlin suggested posting a monthly community ask for donations to Patreon or Crowdpc.
- Pamela: Emily joined and brought a lot of new ideas. Wants to increase engagement, particularly with student groups. Well-connected to under-represented communities. Hoped to attend, but isn't available.
- Emily suggested requesting \$1 from each member per year to go toward paying for Slack or a Slack Replacement
- Emily asked if the community has ever considered using Discord instead of Slack
- John Evans said his dev team loves using Discord, that it's free and that the biggest difference he's noticed between it and Slack is you can't thread up comments.

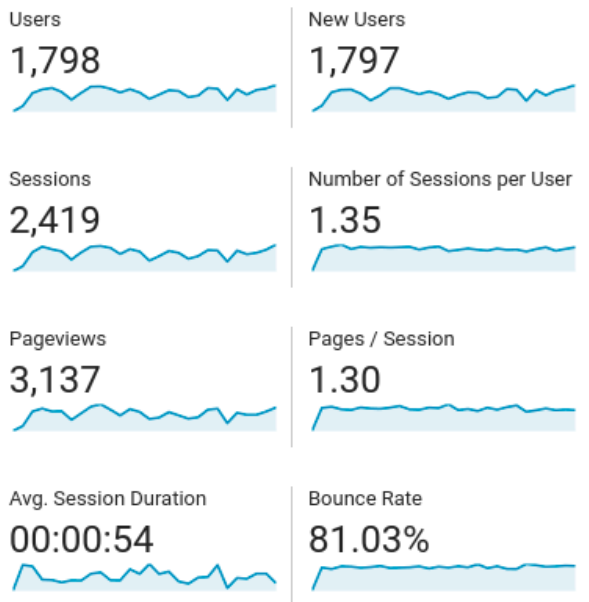
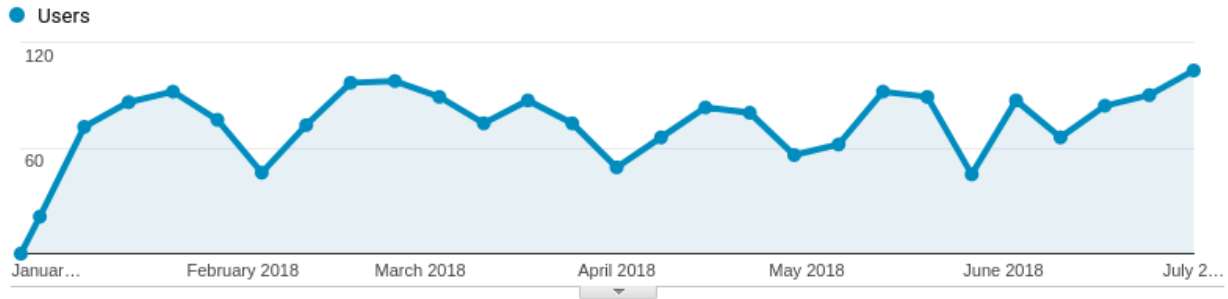

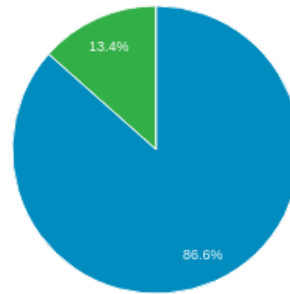
Overview

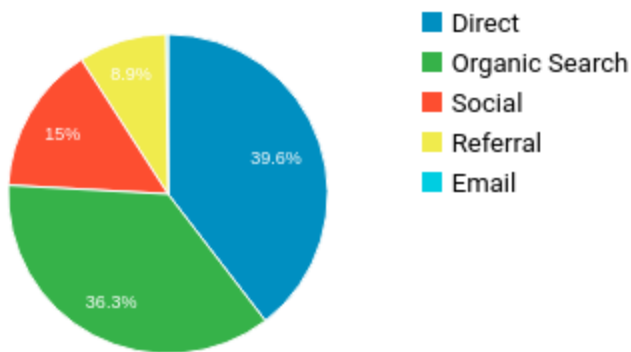

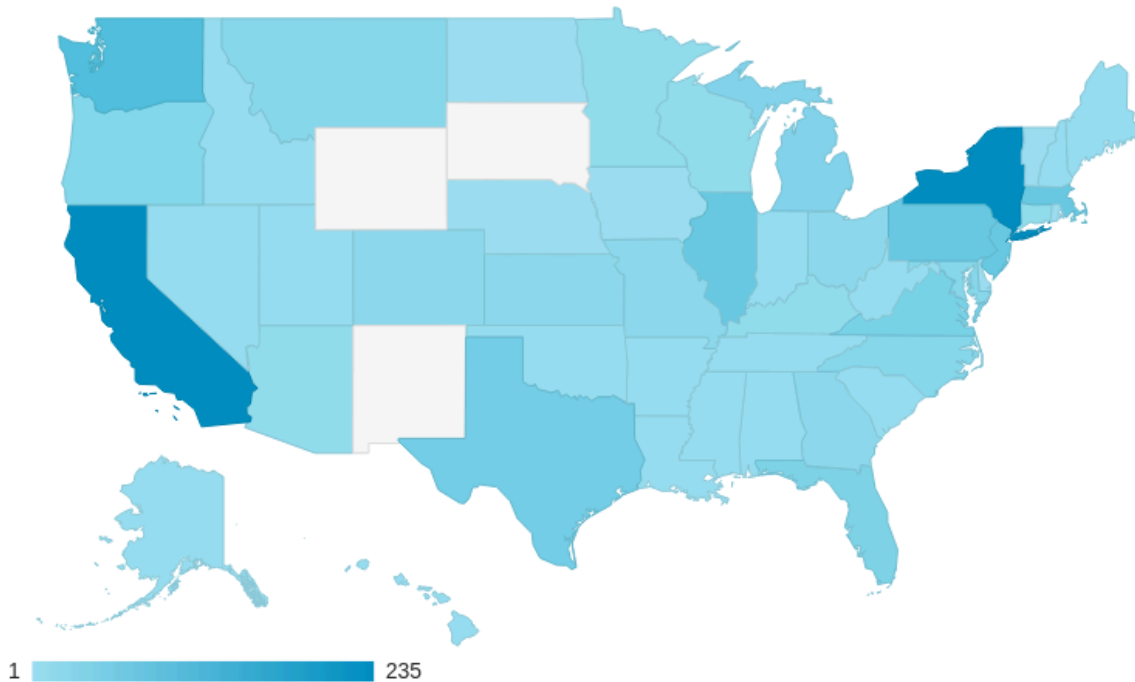

 - Joe: General thought has been let’s just jump into it and record one. Keep it internal to ProgCode and figure out how to go.
 - There are a ton of really interesting, amazing people working on interesting things.
 - Keep it short and focused initially, don’t over-engineer it. If your hardware was purchased in the past X years they should be able to not make people’s ears bleed. As we progress we can upgrade tech as needed.
- Don’t need to necessarily spend months planning it.

- Adiron: In terms of initial podcast, maybe a good idea to interview the ops team on the basis of “if you want institutional knowledge about the organization and the people who have been here from the beginning.”
- Joe: Very reasonable. Also something where we can build with purpose as part of the onboarding process, explaining ProgCode in 15-20 minute segment re: culture, values, high level things like we mentioned above re: Welcome emails/Welcome DMs we don’t need to go crazy.
- Adiron: Would we want to record this in a hangout format which would then be transferred to YouTube and then stripped to Audio format only for the podcast.
- Joe: Yeah, I think that’s the gist. Initially we wouldn’t need to spend a lot of time doing video and
- Pamela: In a group for Progress Memetics, another group who create memes/videos/podcasts, branching out and serious about the work they are doing. Collective doing websites/blogs/coding for various progressive efforts. Most have very basic technology, use editing software to combine various formats (e.g., panel, interviews). Could start with Zoom conference, allow people who don’t want to be on camera, pull out just the sound. Video gets more traction on social media, especially if you’re interviewing popular people. We have a variety of sound engineers on Prog Code who could help edit. Where we’re headed with just starting by covering history of ProgCode, culture, values, legal limitations. Could do internally with something rough, could refine it as people provide new ideas, get other experts involved.
- Adiron: Don’t want to go outside the scope, don’t want to limit, but does it make sense to say any members are welcome to start a podcast and we’d be willing to help. That way we could start our own podcast while contributing to others. Could see how Institute of Memetics is an environment to come up with productive ideas. We could open it to have ProgCode’s podcast while others can start their own podcast.
- Joe: I think that’s a great idea and in line w/everything ProgCode endeavours to be. At the core, is learning what equipment and software and angles and lighting. Real basic stuff that takes a long time to figure out. Basic format: here’s a document. Here’s a podcast. Just walk people through it and you get something w/a lot of value. Always been very into the behind the scenes stuff. Our podcast could be about grassroots organizing, deep dive into how to make a podcast. Make it easier for other ppl to consume and find useful.
- Pamela: Like the idea of open learning, allowing people to see us make mistakes, laugh about it, learn. Very in line with how we do things, we’re very open, take feedback and criticism to fine tune how we do things. Like the idea of letting people see behind the scenes. Like Adiron’s suggestion to ask the community if they would like to do a podcast, could include format or setup. With 1,400 members, could create a large amount of content. A number of community members with rich backgrounds with technology and how they began developing (e.g., Miracle Messages for homeless). Could inspire ideas in others, either collaborative or to do the same thing. Could do a team announcement saying we’re

recording. If people want to talk about what they're working on (e.g., John Evans about waterfall/agile, philosopher who thinks outside the box> Malous, working on map of child detention centers)

- Adiron: One advantage of have multiple podcasts is that podcasts and podcast-like online content is that you can create enough of a network interviewing one-another you can build exposure and familiarize people with one another niche
- Joe: I've noticed that as well w/a number of podcasts, youtube series where they appear in one or another. Also offers the benefit of having their brand or application which has a large following of their own. Can help grow the network and community. We can work with the community and find out what to call it and benefit from a shared name while still having independence. The collaborative opportunities are really big. Ton of different sort of content from training to news to activism, you name it.
 - Adiron: Programming tutorials
- Joe: Yeah! Having cyclonic environment of all this different energy, ppl talking about different type of work that they've been doing for many years encourages a lot of people to get involved.
- Adiron: Good idea. We wouldn't have to try to hard to keep things separate. It says in the name, we're the progcode "Network". We're a network.
- Pamela: Love the idea of not being formulaic. One week could feature someone in the network, could be working on something outside of ProgCode but pertinent to the mission. Following weeks could be about programming, migrant, voting irregularities, etc.). Varied and exciting content would keep people interested. Keeps people on their toes, learning about new things.
- Adiron: Also something we could connect to our Patreon account
- Pamela: Like taping some of the episodes for the same purpose, especially if it is a tutorial. Good way to say thank you for people who are patrons. People on Patreon now currently giving but not receiving. Would be great to have content to give back as well as to give back. Also to people who may or may not be in the Slack.
- Talk about next steps? Do we want to schedule time to interview operations team? Panel? 1:1?
- Adiron: Yes. Good questions. Help to think what we'd like to coder in first ProgCode meeting. If we want to use as intro to ProgCode in general as well as the goals for the podcast
- Pamela: Yes. History also important. Should couple history with where we are now. History fascinating/exciting, but very focused on electoral campaign. If we talk about where we are now vs. the history it is misleading. For example, right now website saying something about electoral campaigns but we can't discuss that. Would be great to discuss this, also useful as something that explains our history and legal standing.
- Democratizing Democracy: An Open Source Podcast. Start w/podcast and focus on that is important initially but eventually we'll have additional assets. Encouraging other groups who are doing something similar if that's a route we go down.

- Pamela: Good idea. Like the name. Another thing: If we have one show/segment that becomes popular, no reason we couldn't break it off with the person make the schedule/agenda for the podcast.
- Joe: Important to encourage the community to produce content that they're working on. We can help them promote it and give them instantaneous reward for the work that they're doing.
- Pamela: Love the aspect of being able to give something back (e.g., Malous from Democratizing Democracy, was linked in with dozens of progressive organizations who are sending her actions for the app, connected with multiple people, went to conferences/events). Just a 30 minute broadcast can have an enormous investment for people.
- Adiron: Will have a lot of benefit, if only to humanize us to general public. When activist hears ProgCode, people don't realize that even though people are welcome people don't appreciate how people. Will make it more accessible
- Pamela: Love the name but it's slightly limiting because people think we're all coders. Many not coders, have important skills. Could possibly grow operations team. Could talk about it for hours. Good to firm up plan for next steps. Don't need to set the date now, could work on it in Slack in the podcast channel. Could pitch to community as member benefit. Not just something we're looking at as source of revenue, could have immediate benefit to community to amplify work they're doing. Could also be used for recruiting/beta testing, looking for non-tech volunteers for news stories to do research. So many ways to provide immediate actual benefit. If we pitch it that way in team announcements could have a lot more interest. Could reach out to people interested in working on the podcast. Could start making list of session topics. Could ask people if they're willing to do it and when
- Adiron: Starting list and planning the first podcast would be good for people to discuss
- Pamela: Slack documents editable by anyone in the channel. Could create running list/start categories
- Joe: All excellent ideas. What if Thurs/Friday we say "hey let's have a working session" and figure out whatever tech we have to figure out to do this. We can call it a podcast, doesn't have to be released. Here's the first alpha, first version. We'll record a new beta in a week or two when we can. Something where we can just get started right away. Here's what we're doing. Use screen share in Zoom to show the documents. Just getting started and doing something is a good way to help ppl understand how to get involved. Challenge w/a lot of things starting at a real high level is getting ppl to understand where they can pitch.
- Adiron: Iterate
- Pamela: Agreed. Have decent next step strategy.
- Joe: What if we say between 1-4pm ET Thursday, July 5th.
- Adiron: that should work for me
- Pamela: that works for me
- Joe: **Let's say 90 minutes 1-2:30pm ET on Thurs., July 5th**

Strategic Partnerships

- Pamela spoke with Alex and Sylvain of the [Happy Dev Coop](#) in France. They learned about ProgCode through the Open Coop invitation and email thread. Happy Dev is a 300 member for-profit tech coop organized on a sociocratic model. Each organization which is a part of the coop (they call them cells) contributes 5% of its income to Happy Dev each year.
 - They understand our “revenue” is just \$60/mo recurring donations at this point, but are still interested in knowing whether ProgCode would like to become a cell organization under the Happy Dev coop, contributing to the organization through
 - a pool of product users/beta testers and bug locators, and
 - dev assistance.

 - dev assistance.
- Pamela: Alex & Sylvain created a chat app which they would like to have ProgCode members test. They have a cell within the Co-op. They suggested that ProgCode become a member cell within the co-op. ProgCode members could assist with some of the co-op tech. Pro-OSS org. PJ explained our 501(c)(4) status. They were in Silicon Valley last week and were concerned about hierarchy and extreme capitalism design. They were excited that we work on a sociocratic-type model and that we are non-profit. Unconcerned about our current low-funding. Wanted to know whether we could organize as an LLC co-op. PJ told them that we would discuss the offer. She invited them to join ProgCode. Co-op bylaws are set up as an LLC. Each has one share and there are no dividends. No one member has a controlling interest. Purpose is to organize as a team to provide each member what it needs.
- Joe: Where are they all located?
- Pamela: Don't know whether they're all in France. Told them that ProgCode always has been a world-wide org, even as Coders For Sanders. The only mention of Happy Dev online is in France, but don't know whether that is the only location.
- Joe: Do you know how they operate within the different cells?
- Pamela: Said that most of the cells operate out of Slack, with RocketChat as a backup. They like RocketChat because it can be downloaded to a single server. Each cell designates one or two members to participate in the org.
- Joe: So they follow the sociocratic model.
- Pamela: Definitely an LLC. Purpose is to create a dev environment where each earns a living off of the tech they create. Don't believe they have a social good purpose or are a political org. Sounded like most if not all of the tools are to facilitate the good of the co-op and other co-ops. They are part of the Cloud Commons. Have a broader vision than just the Happy Dev ecosystem. Definitely lean OSS, but unsure whether they're all OSS. The jobs board they're creating is OSS. Intent is for the jobs board to be used by the cells. A smaller cell might have greater need from the more successful cells. Important for all of them to help each other achieve their goals. Didn't get into whether they are looking for volunteers. They are willing to hire contractors.
- Joe: ProgCode members might be able to earn more money in the free market, but perhaps we can find a way to pay them for work done for the co-op.
- Pamela: They liked the idea of the #pitch-zone for ideas to be shared in the community and then come to fruition through collaboration. If they join and create a Happy Dev channel, we can

discuss whether the alignment is right, whether our legal situation will work in the org, and whether the community is interested. Could be a good way for some of our members to earn some cash.

Meeting Notes

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 - Tech Teams - Coders for Sanders was a volunteer tech team. During discussion of entity forms there was a lot of concern about ProgCode 501(c)4 inability to get involved in electoral campaigns without creating a PAC. Of course, ProgCode members are still free to be involved in electoral

campaigns outside of ProgCode. ProgCode would serve as an educational organization for people who would work on all types of campaigns.

- Stephen previously spoke w/Nina Turner at a meeting in Detroit and mentioned ProgCode could be a tech team to provide tech plus backup assistance. Last week Stephen talked w/Nina again when she was a guest speaker at a DSA dinner. Nina asked him a bit more about helping campaigns with websites. Stephen explained ProgCode shares the same limitations in that regard as OR given that our org is also a 501(c)(4).

- Stephen has since been thinking about it. How do we identify people in the community to help train other people and implement tools for use with campaigns (electoral and issues based). Incidental benefit would not interfere with ProgCode's mission/tax & entity status.

- Reached out to Schuyler Duveen & Joe McLaughlin

- Joe: Question re avoiding campaign coordination. With regard to the other group, does it look like ProgCode becomes a funnel for the other project working w/electoral campaigns. Can we legally be involved in both? Do we need to stay completely separate? If the topic of electoral campaigns comes up during a ProgCode 501(c)(4) meeting do we have to stop the conversation, move over to the other entity, etc.?

- Stephen: We would track people who are interested in doing electoral work OUTSIDE of ProgCode Slack. We would be simply be referring people to an outside entity. We already post job listings which are related to electoral or partisan politics. There's no IRS requirement that everyone refrain from electoral partisan politics in or outside ProgCode but just while they are in ProgCode. ProgCode is focused on building tech. We have our rules in place re non-partisan, non-electoral work. As long as we are true to that we should be fine but it will require a measure of scrutiny.

- Joe: Any ideas how this other community would work?

- Stephen: We wouldn't need to create another community. We'd just be developing a list of technicians who are skilled with a certain kind of tech to refer to other campaigns.

- i.e., If the Green Party wanted to use Carpool Vote for outreach, as long as the technicians are doing work outside of the ProgCode community then we are complying with laws and internal votes

- Also a possibility if we wanted to create a separate community. If ProgCode wanted to create a formal separate community, choices would be a PAC or 527 or a for-profit. PAC would probably be the easiest. We don't have to do it but if the community felt it should be a separate organization we could do that. Directors of ProgCode could sit on the Board of the PAC as long as the ProgCode Directors didn't have a controlling vote in the outcome of any decision related to the PAC. ProgCode wouldn't be taking directives from electoral campaigns and bringing them back into the 501(c)4 community to suggest ideas.

- Joe: Really important b/c we know over the next months campaign interest is going to be high. I would assume a mechanism through ProgBot where any group could register to input.

- Stephen: If a campaign wanted to seek techs here, they could essentially post an ad.
- Pamela: Does that mean the ads are for paid technicians or volunteers?
- Stephen: That's another question to explore. Maybe set up a series of protocols. Where there's a screening process. If it's a funded campaign they can post if it's going to be a paid position.
- Pamela: Seems like it would be a double standard to allow an Electoral Campaign to ask for volunteers from within the community when we have not been allowing tech teams doing electoral work to recruit volunteer assistance.
- Stephen: Electoral Campaigns are non-profits and allowed to use volunteers. If a NP is paying certain people and looking for volunteers they the Dept of Labor could step in and require those people are being paid. Generally someone who is aligned with a cause is allowed to volunteer their time.
- Pamela: I understand that but I'm concerned about creation of double standard re partisan and electoral campaign work which has been prohibited by the community through consensus vote and subsequent statements that ProgCode would not engage in partisan electoral campaign work which have been carried over and incorporated into ProgCode's legal filings.
- Stephen: We have to look at each project case by case. I don't think there's anything defacto wrong w/posting an opportunity. If a campaign came to us and asked for contact information of volunteers would be another story.
- Pamela: There's a difference between volunteer opportunities where ProgCode actively recruits volunteers, promotes project efforts in Slack and outside of Slack vs. job board posts. Re paid job posts, ProgCode does not engage in any activity.
- Stephen: We would need to set up a Protocol: if campaign wants something we won't do a search of member skills. Would only facilitate the use of the tech, development and implementation of it.
- Joe: Agree w/Pamela's assessment that's generally the way we've handled campaign/partisan work in the past. It's good to know we have some more flexibility. I look at ProgBot as a front end where people can opt in to receiving notifications through Slack or email or a variety of different ways where we are also posting jobs opportunities to a jobs board on the front end. But also see it as a good place we can send people to another place. Even though we can "legally" engage in lobbying, partisanship & electoral activities, the community voted not to do it and we've been bound by those restrictions and legal requirements. Could even see this as being a mass community tool (we already have processes for registration, onboarding, engagement opportunities). Maybe we could take a look at a data agreement. We also talked about who we would want to accept donations from previously in the legal channel. We could dig that document up and use that again as well.
- Stephen: Gets back to the same thing: is it mission-aligned. If not we are duty bound to say no.

- Joe: Some people's personal values will be aligned on some issues and not aligned on other issues.
- Stephen: My main focus is being able to identify teams of people specific to a certain type of tech. We have members who joined who wanted to be active b/c they were in "soul killing jobs" and they wanted to be able to use their skills for good.
- Joe: Funny thing is your original point makes absolute sense. With that point you unpacked a lot of really important conversation we need to be very explicit and outline in the guidelines.
- Stephen: RIAB gets back to the community discussions about what we were going to do as a community. Were you going to have tutorials, instructions, means of implementation, etc.
- Pamela: One of the reasons it was determined that ProgCode teams engaged in electoral activity prior to becoming a 501(c)(4) had to leave the community was because of concerns with the possibility of campaign coordination via DM or private channels. In fact the concern was so great that a decision was made by the community to restrict the creation of private channels to ProgCode staff to prevent direct or indirect campaign coordination in spaces which could not be moderated.
- Pamela: My second point of concern is practically, ProgCode staff are not able to facilitate any new program right now due to overwhelming workload. RIAB is a concept only--project is so big we haven't been able to get it off the ground. We still can't update our website or community guidelines with 501(c)(4) notice and disclaimer. Would hate to make a promise to OR that we can help out but then we fall on our face and reputation suffers because we don't have the manpower or organizing ability to create a new process.
- Joe: OR is probably wondering how did Coders for Sanders happen the first time and how can we connect back up with them?
- Stephen: No commitment was made to Nina apart from it's something that *could* be done if the stars were aligned. More of let's see how everything lands to see if RIAB can be a template providing the means for partisan electoral campaigns to plug in to members of ProgCode for volunteer tech assistance on particular campaigns. If so, can we do it in a manner that we comply with community decisions and remain in IRS compliance. If it seems like it's going to be too much work that's fine. If there's no objection to doing some legwork and looking around.
- Pamela: I would love for ProgCode to be able to be the source of tech support for progressive grassroots campaigns. That was our origin story. That's a point of pride. But I think if that happens it should be very separate from activities that take place in ProgCode's 501(c)(4) Slack.
- Joe: I like the idea of keeping work within the ProgCode 501(c)(4) Slack pure and creating a completely separate entity but only if we have the bandwidth and personnel to operate that entity efficiently. Back to OR's CTO, has there been any communication with him since the discussion with Nina?
- Stephen: No conversations with OR CTO.

- Pamela: I spoke with OR's CTO about a year ago to offer community assistance for non-electoral actions (i.e., Petitions, legislative efforts, issues-based advocacy campaigns). I would like to take the discussion to the community to revisit the question of working on behalf of grassroots electoral campaigns. Possibly set up a Zoom conference with community members & organizers who have input about potential organizational models and processes. If there's interest, potentially those members at the Zoom conf would be interested in organizing that effort.
- Stephen: The first community vote was re the decision to become a 501(c)(4); second community vote was the decision not to engage in lobbying, partisanship or electoral campaigns. A separate org would have to be self-financed and organized separately.
- Joe: If this is something to explore with Nina, this is something where we would want to act quickly. Definitely worth it. I want to offer my support there.

- Update on MoveOn sustainability grant

- At the end of 2017 MoveOn CTO Ann Lewis submitted ProgCode's name as a potential 2018 MoveOn.org grant recipient. There was no formal/public applications process to go through, but Pamela spoke with Rahna Epting on the phone. Rahna requested a copy of ProgCode's one-pager to provide to the grant board. Pamela mailed the one-pager toward the end of January and Rahna notified Pamela by telephone that ProgCode is one of the organizations MoveOn has decided to provide a "2018 Core Sustainability Grant". We are not sure when grant funds should be expected or how much the grant will be.
- Stephen prepared a May 14, 2018, email letter to Rahna Epting per her request enclosing ProgCode corporate details, identification numbers and a W-9. An automated email response was then received notifying ProgCode that Rahna is out of town until 5/21.

They were exciting & useful but got dropped when Rapi got busy traveling/evangelizing and the Ops team focus shifted to organizational/procedural/structural questions as we prepared to file corporate docs and start scaling. @joemcl_osdi DM'd Pamela last week asking if we could start the App Partner Roundtable back up again.

- Good way to consolidate project status updates/recruiting/new member engagement and give teams the opportunity to touch base with staff; possibly cut down on the need for vol staff to attend every project planning & update call.
- Meetings would ideally be recorded and shared with \$5/mo patrons as a "sneak peek" then posted a few weeks later on the ProgCode YouTube channel and promoted via social media as well.

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 - Discussion
- Pamela: ProgCode is at the top of the list of organizations that they want to attend, if they can get a sponsor to pay for travel and lodging. They have been working on the CommonsCloud since 2014, so it is becoming closer to being a reality. Will update the community once we know.

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- Discussion
 - Pamela: Found that we can have only two people edit the Gitbook at a time, but it's a good way to keep the documents. We would have to copy/paste what is in Preston's copy (much more up-to-date than the other documents we have), and then we can delete or modify what we need and add the 501(c)(4) information.
 - Joe B.: Overall, I think the biggest and most important thing is that it will be easier for people to go through. Still need something that people can get through in 3 to 5 minutes to learn about ProgCode. The Gitbook could be an important part of the onboarding process.
 - Pamela: Might be good to have an abstract of the contents and put it at the beginning.
 - Joe B.: We could do videos about it as part of the podcasts. Would be a good source of digestible content.
 - Pamela: Could share it on YouTube and Patreon.

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 - Discussion:

- Pamela: We did this over a year ago, giving 10-15 minutes to app leaders to explain their projects. Helped people know what projects were available for volunteers. We could record the discussions and consider sharing them on Patreon for a donors of a certain level.
- Joe M.: I was more active in ProgCode a year ago. ProgCode has grown and is an important resource. I always tried to participate in the Roundtables because I learned a lot about the apps and found things in which to be involved. Maybe make it available not only to Patreon donors but also to the public. Would love to talk about Carlos's Mr-Clean project. Could dovetail with another project I found online, LittleSis.org. It's good for drawing connections between the oligarchs and corporate titans. Has an integration with opensecrets.org. Very powerful thing. Propose that Carlos put up his project in a Roundtable meeting. Ziggy who just joined the group could talk about littleSis.org. They are looking to build their community. They are non-partisan. <https://littlesis.org/> Spoke is another useful app that should be on the list, as is CCRM. Have ideas for other projects for the Roundtable. I would help to publicize it. There are other folks who are not part of ProgCode who would be interested in participating in the Roundtable and would possibly join ProgCode.
- Pamela: Don't know why we wouldn't want to bring it back. It would be up to the team lead as to whether or not they would want to present. We had one time that three telephony apps were on the list, and they found that there was space for collaboration.
- Joe M.: We used to do them weekly. We could pic a date and time and see the level of interest. Then try it again in two weeks and see whether it takes off.
- Joe B.: It's a good community activity. Very excited and I would support it.
- Pamela: Do we need to vote on this?
- Stephen: It's not requiring a commitment of resources, and there is no "change" involved, so a vote really isn't necessary.
- Joe M.: Could ask the team leads whether they would be willing to present their projects and then schedule them for successive dates. Perhaps we could try to get Carlos's project on the schedule for either this Thursday or the next. Could contact Ziggy about littleSis.org. Could also ping Sky & Shaka about presenting Spoke. We could start at 9pm ET.
- Andrea: Will this be open to the public or to a limited public? I sit at several tables with progressive organizations. There would be interest in some of these projects, if people knew that they were out there.

- Pamela: That could result in onboardings that take too long. We usually have 15 or so member in the cohort channels for each month.
- John Evans @King Mob is a student of cooperative procedures & processes. In a 4-30-2018 1:1 video call he made some great observations:
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- Consider a shadow apprentice program to encourage non-coders to find a way to contribute as an operations staff member
 - Pamela: Had great conversation with John Evans (@KingMob). Has great ideas he’s implemented with other orgs he works with that could benefit ProgCode. Some of our publications which mention ProgCode. Not getting many “left” thinkers, but more mainstream thinkers. Discussed how to bring in more people to challenge the status quo. He would like to bring in more people who are not knowledgeable in tech, but would like to be. One of his non-coder friends said that the registration form feels like a job application. John suggested calling it an “information form”. He felt as though new member onboarding is valuable and most important outreach. It lowered barriers for him by becoming familiar with our values and culture. Should change the registration form which doesn’t mention onboarding until the form is submitted. Thought it would be good to mention it in the form.
 - In the beginning, we allowed people to opt out of the onboardings. On November 8, 2016, that changed. We voted then to make onboarding calls mandatory, if someone wanted to join. We did that for a while and it worked well because it taught them the culture of ProgCode. It was a low-level commitment. We got busy and got away from it, and we went back to allowing onboardings to be optional. John suggested that we put that front-and-center and get back to requiring it.
 - John also suggested that we ask how people feel that they can contribute to ProgCode. It can be open-ended without pigeonholing them.
 - He also suggested that the website explain what Slack is. A friend of his registered and was unfamiliar with Slack. He suggested two forms - one for coders and one for non-coders. Non-coders might be frustrated if they don’t know how to get involved. Have a shadow-apprentice program for people who are having a difficult time getting involved. They could shadow a staff-member to see what they do.
 - Erica: Many of these things are what I thought the newsletter could address. It’s nice to hear another perspective about the subject. It’s more feedback that there are things we do well, and things where we need development. Do not like the idea of two “join” buttons. A bifurcated form is good, where, depending on the answer of coder or non-coder, you go in a different direction on the form. There should be a common, mutual feeling.
 - Pamela: Currently, Airtable Registration form would not allow us to bifurcate. We might be able to do bifurcated registration forms via ProgBot.

- Erica: Classic “lessons learned” format: Keep-Stop-Start

- **Stephen's Biggest Start:** I didn't think some of the topics were going to work but they were beautifully aligned with our mission.

 - **Stephen's Biggest Keep:** We've opened a space for attendees in the webinar to stand up and present ideas. I thought Friedman would be the high point. But the high point for Stephen was Carlos Granados' impromptu presentation of his project idea.

 - Erica: Some Speakers might have benefitted from moderation instead of lecture style. Could you have done panels, moderators, different formats to break up the structure?
 - Friedman could have been on every hour talking for a few minutes about healthcare in America. "What does this look like when someone walks away?"
 - Some speakers may have resulted from less time.

- **Stephen's Biggest Start:** With more advance planning, we can better anticipate the needs of our presenters. Even with the short timeline, we managed to deliver an honest picture of ProgCode and the way our community works.
- **Joe's Biggest Keep:** This was a real legitimizer for ProgCode. Indirect successes. Applications kicked off during the conference. Key contact metric for people making connections. Raising \$100k.
- **Joe's Biggest Start:** Building on the formula and the momentum is best. Value is in seeing the benefits of connecting people.
 - Minimal call to action sending people to Patreon is ideal
 - Timestamps for CTA
- Erica: What were your metrics for success?
- Pamela: Wanted to fit in everyone who wanted to participate. So much last minute arranging that I would want to have submission deadlines. But we did so much by the seat of our pants that we were fortunate to have the sessions we had.
- Joe: Would have liked to have done more promo, but there wasn't enough time because of all of the work that had to be squeezed into the time we had.
- Erica: You're going to get asked by ppl you approach to sponsor these, "what am I going to get in return". This would have been an absolute case study in flexibility of Zoom. The reason you want to clearly define your metrics (under promise/over deliver) so when you go to sponsors, they know what they can expect. Being clear about what you have gotten from it would make an easier case for their ROI via hard metrics achieved. Battling for eyeballs and visibility as we get into a more crowded political space. Critical mass is not as important as future packaging. How is ProgCode benefitting and benefitting supporters each time you present?
- Erica: In addition to different types of ppl attending, one thing that emerged for me is from the critique I've heard "in the wild": technologists don't know how to fix politics. One of the reasons why Friedman/So's presentation was so amazing. There are people who don't know how to do this stuff. Campaign finance moves fast. Healthcare reform moves fast. Low overhead to have monthly ProgCode talks w/area experts in membership. Set up a night in May "We're going to to PCN talks on healthcare in America going into 2018 primaries, this is a good night or that." Friedman's became a discussion of the problem rather than the project. Avg person doesn't have to invest in this to become a part of this. "ProgCode is known for its fireside chats".

 - Erica: You walk the walk. You put in the time. You’re true to mission. But also need some realigning of how to build the culture and org you want and make sure it’s sustainable Every speaker creating a leadership quote that you can put on your website. Fundraising and self-promo is the nastiest part of the whole thing. But it’s imperative to keep in your mind: How is this helping ProgCode. Because of X we get Y.
 - Stephen: Survey speakers, what did you like about the event, what would you suggest, who would you recommend, a quote we could add to the DD site. From there consider next step of on ProgCode site listing our Network Partners and our logos. Asking network partners to put our logo on a spot on their website.

- Pamela: NMV Application Update
 - Pamela: Received consent to proceed on Issue 230 for grant application and budget. Researched BLS information for job descriptions which match what we do and will do in the community. SS has specialized knowledge needed in the community, but that is the only difference between the two full-time positions. Salaries for the part-time tech positions are the same. All salaries are higher than we want for the budget. Don't want salaries to take up all funding. Won't get the funding until later in the year. Earliest we would have money to pay salaries is 05-01-18. So we prorated salaries. We reduced evangelism expenditures, but evangelism is important to the community. Not a priority to fund it at that level, but will fund conferences. Allowed two nights for flight, housing, and food. Reduced budget significantly. Not final. This is just a proposal.
 - Joe: Looks good. Does the Slack portion take into consideration the non-profit discount? What about strategic retreat?
 - Pamela: Not yet. Can't ask for it until have IRS decision on our tax-exempt application. Also, don't have figures for staff medical. Factors include state of purchasing benefits. Montana healthcare.gov best plan is \$500 per month with a low deductible. Better to have broker look for one for us.
 - Strategic retreat - for staff, could be a small cost. Would have to research the source of the current number. Could use it as incentive for volunteer contributors who put in serious time for the community.
 - Joe: Should reduce it from \$13500 to \$3500. Are we budgeting this for a two-year runway?
 - Pamela: Didn't go that deep in the analysis. More interesting in satisfying the NMV application requirement of a budget. Our current actual revenue stream is \$46/month. NMV has good resources on its website we should review, if we get to the next level of the application process. They will help us find revenue.
 - Application asks our intended amount. We said we're trying to generate \$1M for three years operating expenses.
 - Can change those amounts as needs and resources change. Our sources don't provide particulars about how much it costs to generate a podcast or to provide other services.
 - Adiron: Important thing we need help with is fundraising and setting up revenue streams. Don't know whether we should consider hiring someone to do that. Should set up our infrastructure so that we can start using it.
 - Pamela: Good points. Only thing we've budgeted is podcast service (Spreaker) and Action Sprout. Assuming we got \$250K, we'd have \$100K for contracting others to do it. Also have some in

the community who have knowledge. If we have two part-time staff to help out, it would free up SS and PJ to put more time into fundraising, attending conferences to increase revenue, etc.. More staff will reduce the load on current volunteers. But we'll still need to consult with experts and people who do fundraising. We could do calls for proposals for hiring.

- Joe: Budget is excellent as is. Could add a position for someone who can set up HOW we do fundraising, set up the process, and then we can do the execution of the process. We could set aside some compensation for particular tasks we need done, such as the website, so that we can incentivize them to put in the time.
- Pamela: Great idea. Gives back to those who are putting into the community. Many have been doing for the community and not expecting anything in return, while everyone benefits from what they do.
- Joe: It's good to be able to demonstrate what you give back to the community.
- Pamela: It's a timing function. We're focused on raising funds for the time being. ProgCode has been giving back to the progressive movement. I would love to be able to provide funds to community members who do work that we would have to pay contractors to do.
- There is a second page to the budget which is meaningless at the present time. Large financial asks and I don't know that we could accomplish these. A wishlist of small items would be better.
- Don't have to give NMV the budget. Just need a number. That's why we did the budget.
- Adrion: Would it make sense to format parts of the budget for process and development, so that we could break down the aspects of each?
- Joe: Best idea.
- Stephen: Perhaps provide detail on subsequent pages for each of the categories.
- Pamela: We haven't done research into how to implement these things, and that detail would be helpful.

Pamela: Attended the webinar, which provided additional information not available on the NMV site. PJ & SS working on it. Going fine until got to the question of how we'll spend the money and who will do the work for the org. We had vague discussions about who will be employed in the past, when donors were offering large sums. Don't have a breakdown of the tasks, budget items, job descriptions, etc.. Created Issue #230 to address the pending application. Also, we have to reach out to MoveOn for a grant. Need to determine the most urgent tasks, job assignments, benefits & salaries, budget breakdown to reflect it, determine highest priority expenditures, and bring it all before the community before the application is due. Funding Framework document was created for 2016/2017, and some of the entries are not relevant today.

- Created a Proposed Budget Breakdown for 2018, by copying the same document for 2017.

Have to have a conversation about the direction to take.

- Joe: From the application, how thorough does it have to be, and is this the format to use?
- Pamela: Format is a webform. People had difficulty doing it on a webform, so NMV prepared a GoogleDoc form of the application as a worksheet. Application doesn't begin until page 2. The form

provides direction for what to emphasize. Easy because most of what it requests is what we do. A pitch deck is not essential for a non-profit, but it is required for a for-profit. It's only an option.

- Because of time, should review the application outside of this meeting. Make comments. Already within the character limit.

- Salaries, number of jobs, fees for marketing and promotion, cost of podcasts and YouTube videos.

- When Stephen/Pamela discussed informally, discussing salaries in the range of \$50-70k. For the purposes of putting together an application, couple things:

- NMV will not want to see bulk of money going to salaries; should go to functionality

- Since we are a start-up and there is not money going to a staff, there is a concern that they are turning over money to an organization, there is no incentive for staff to remain. Should include salaries noting that this is not the only source of revenue, though could be a principal piece.

- Stephen suggestion: Starting salaries of \$35k-45k with benefits with a delay to implementing (possibly 6 months or more)

- Joe: It all makes sense.

- Adiron: How would it work if you distribute time between salaried tasks and volunteer tasks? That would avoid eating up the grant.

- Reason is they are already doing work without being paid; are not threatening to leave (Stephen committed to work indefinitely). Important to demonstrate we plan to compensate from longevity. Grant isn't for a year, it's to ramp us up so that we are around and serving this missing for a period of time.

- In the process of getting quotes for healthcare benefits, which is required if an employee working >30 hours/week, which Pamela/Stephen do. When they become salaried, if >30 they will require benefits

- Advisable route is to specify period of time when they won't be taking salaries. If salaries not enough to meet minimum wage, would suggest not taking salaries

- Pamela: Concerned that amount of salary would sink us before we get started. Instead, could pro-rate so we don't take until April and reduce to \$40k

- Stephen: Suggestion would be pro-rated salary for number of months

- Pamela: Need to determine what is required for a full-time employee, what is required for part-time

- Stephen: What time could Adiron devote even if it's part-time. Doesn't expect he/Pamela will have much money unless there is a significant ramp up

- Pamela: If Pamela/Stephen get paid, won't have a significant impact on community. Need part-time PM that would be the best investment. Not what she wants because worked non-stop, but for community support they need tech support. Revenue streams discussed all reliant on tech support. Can beg for volunteer assistance as we've done, but hit-or-miss/scattered/not where people are able to devote time. If we hire somebody even as a temporary contract (Virtual Conference website, social media consistent). Another revenue stream is podcast, now is a very good time judging by the spike in podcasts but don't have the skills to put it together/volunteers put together. Could do call for proposals for people who want to host.
- Stephen: Could contract people to do particular tasks. Also wouldn't have to worry about benefits. Community was supportive when Rapi approached about Civic Hall deal, would expect the same respect for people's time even
- Stephen: Include in breakdown that salaries are X and will commence after a certain percentage of the budget is covered.
- Pamela: Only way we'd be able to fit into the application
- Consent to Implement submitting grant application before 2/2/2018

- Ops team met with Kat Broomfield, CEO of Arts & Business Collaboratives (NYC) and scheduled a follow up on January 18th. [Video](#) and recap of meeting. Kat wrote:

Hi Stephen, Pamela, and Adiron:

Thanks so much for the meeting today! I learned a lot about what you're trying to do, and I think we are in complete alignment mission-wise.

Just to recap, some of your pain points are the following:

- *Funding with strings attached: you have been approached by several potential funders who have asked for things counter to your mission in exchange for funding.*
- *Lack of expertise in different areas of fundraising: You have several opportunities coming up (several due February 1), but little expertise in fundraising best practices. In addition, you have engaged with over 1,300 people (funders, activists, coders, etc) via your Slack community, but you are unsure how to monetize this resource. There is currently no one who has expertise in corporate, foundation, or event giving.*
- *Fundraising complicated by 501 c 4 status: 501 c 4 donations are not tax-deductible, and the status excludes ProgCode from traditional foundation funders.*
- *Membership model ideas with limited knowledge of execution: There is desire to offer an AARP-type of membership with services (podcast, publication, etc) given in exchange for annual dues. However, executing this over the next 5 years and sustaining it is a challenge.*
- *An approach to evaluation has not been developed: There is desire to couch findings, processes, and development in proven social science-based strategies, but there is no comprehensive plan for execution.*
