Candidate Question #3: What changes would you like to see at this university, and why?

As a student, I've experienced firsthand the financial pressures that come with a college education, and one area that urgently needs attention is textbook affordability. Many students struggle to afford the required materials for their courses, which hinders their ability to succeed academically. I'd like to see USC implement a campus-wide initiative to promote more affordable textbook options, such as expanding the use of open educational resources (OER) and increasing access to rental programs as well as placing every required textbook in a digital library that can be accessed by all students at no additional charge. No student should have to choose between paying for textbooks and other essential needs.

Another key change I'd propose is reevaluating the annual \$269,000 spent on USG stipends. Today, I am pledging that as a senator, I will not take a stiped to show my support for this initiative. While student leaders deserve recognition for their contributions, these funds could be better allocated to programs that directly benefit the student body, such as enhancing mental health resources, improving campus facilities, or supporting food insecurity initiatives. Public service should be driven by a commitment to the community rather than compensation.
