## **ABOUT RYAN CAYABYAB**



Regarded as one of the pillars and icons of Original Pilipino Music (OPM) Ryan Cayabyab is lovingly called "Mr. C' or "Maestro" by the Filipinos.

- In 2018, Ryan Cayabyab was proclaimed National Artist of the Philippines in Music for his contribution to OPM
- In September 2019, the Ramon Magsaysay Award was presented to Cayabyab – the only Filipino among the honorees – recognizing him for "showing us all that music can indeed instill pride and joy, and unify people across the many barriers that divide them."
- In 1978. Cayabyab's composition "Kay Ganda Ng Ating Musika" won 1<sup>st</sup> Prize in the first Metro Pop Music Festival (Manila). In the same year, "Kay Ganda

- Ng Ating Musika" competed in the international Seoul Song Festival. "Kay Ganda Ng Ating Musika" won the Grand Prix.
- His works range from commissioned full-length ballets, theatre musicals, choral pieces, a Mass set to the unaccompanied chorus, and orchestral pieces, to commercial recordings of popular music, film scores and television specials.
- He is one of the judges in the only season of Philippine idol in 2006
- He became the Executive Director of Philippine Pop Music festival, also known as Philpop, in 2012. The PhilPop MusicFest Foundation Inc. is the organization behind the <u>Philippine Popular Music Festival</u>. This songwriting competition for amateurs and professionals puts the spotlight on songwriters and encourages Filipinos to preserve their unique musical identity.
- As music director, conductor and accompanist, Cayabyab has performed in the United States with leading Philippine music figures, at venues including <u>Avery Fisher Hall</u> in the <u>Lincoln Center</u> in New York City; <u>Carnegie</u> <u>Hall</u> (both the Main and Recital halls) in New York; the <u>Kennedy Center</u> and the <u>Washington Convention Center</u> in Washington, D.C.; the Shrine in Los Angeles; the <u>Orpheum</u> in Vancouver; and <u>Circus Maximus</u> of <u>Caesars</u> <u>Palace</u> on the <u>Las Vegas Strip</u>.
- He has performed as music director in <u>command performances</u> for King <u>Hasan II</u> in <u>Rabat</u>, <u>Morocco</u>, <u>King Juan Carlos</u> and <u>Queen Sophia</u> of Spain in <u>Manila</u>, <u>King Fahd</u> of <u>Saudi Arabia</u> in <u>Tangiers</u>, <u>Queen Beatrix</u> at the <u>Noordeinde Palace</u> in the <u>Netherlands</u>, and U.S. President <u>Bill</u> <u>Clinton</u> in <u>Boston</u>, Massachusetts.
- "Ryan Ryan Musikahan" the television show, has won a total of fourteen awards as Best Television Musical Show and fRor Cayabyab, the Best Show Host in various television award-giving bodies. Likewise, as an artist, producer, arranger, and composer, he has won a total of eighteen awards from the recording industry for various commercial recordings. He has produced albums of the popular Filipino teen group <a href="Smokey Mountain">Smokey Mountain</a>, Broadway and West End's diva, <a href="Lea Salonga">Lea Salonga</a>, and Spain's internationally acclaimed singer <a href="Julio Iglesias">Julio Iglesias</a>.
- Among his many works, his theatre musicals <u>El filibusterismo</u> (1993) and <u>Noli Me Tángere</u> (1995) have won acclaim and have been performed extensively in the cities of Japan in 1994 and 1996. They received a special <u>NHK</u> broadcast in November 1996, and in <u>Kuala Lumpur</u> in the same year. Another musicale, Magnificat, has had nearly 200 performances.

- His other popular musicals include Katy (words by Jose Javier Reyes), Alikabok, Ilustrado and the classic pop-ballet Rama Hari (words by 2006 National Artist for Literature Bienvenido Lumbera). Katy would become Caybyab's most famous musical in the 1980s
- Cayabyab composed "Mabuhay", the opening song of <u>Miss Universe</u>
  1994 pageant, held in Manila, Philippines
- In 2005, Cayabyab composed the official soundtrack for the <u>23rd edition</u> of the <u>Southeast Asian Games</u> in Manila. In 2019, Cayabyab composed the theme song for the <u>30th edition of the Southeast Asian Games</u>, "We Win as One"; with lyrics by playwright Floy Quintos, and sung by <u>Lea Salonga</u>.
