GENERAL REGISTRATION INFORMATION

You should:

1. Remember that Lincoln Southeast is a comprehensive high school with many possible choice patterns. No single pattern of subject choices is best for all students. Your abilities, interests and educational-vocational goals are important factors to consider when determining elective subject choices.
2. Know that all courses and vocational opportunities at Lincoln Southeast are offered without regard to race, ethnicity, national origin, sex or ableness.
3. Review carefully the material contained in this publication and the LPS course description publication. Your counselor will help you if you need more information regarding courses at Southeast.
4. Discuss your classes for next year with parents, teachers and your counselor. Avoid hasty decisions. Your counselor will help you with questions that concern your abilities, achievements, interests and vocational possibilities.
5. Balance your classes over your high school years. Do NOT plan too heavy a load the first years with the idea of a light senior year. Our graduates who become college freshmen often express regret for not taking a heavier load their senior year to better prepare them for the challenge of a college schedule.
6. Select courses that are applicable to the graduation requirements, are consistent with past achievements and are compatible with your education and career plans. You should endeavor to make choices that expand rather than limit future opportunities/options.

The following items may also be helpful:

1. **Normal Class Load** - The minimum class load is six classes (30 hours) per semester; the maximum class load is eight (40 hours). *The typical class load is six or seven classes (30-35 hours).* Because the graduation requirements prescribe a minimum of 245 credit hours, it is important that you register for the correct number of courses each semester. If you are in doubt and have questions about the number of classes you should take, your school counselor can advise you.
2. **Electives** - It is through the wise selection of elective courses that students are able to personalize their educational plan. Elective courses should be perceived as opportunities for: 1) Adding depth/breadth to an intended area of specialization, 2) Expanding existing interests and discovering new ones, and 3) Providing diversity/change of pace that can refresh and invigorate.
3. **College Preparatory Courses** - Students should consider the admissions requirements for the colleges/universities in which they are interested before registering for their high school courses. Your counselor has information about many post high school institutions.
4. **Instrumental Music** - Auditions with an LSE Instrumental Music teacher are a prerequisite for participation in Wind Ensemble and Jazz Band I. Winds and percussion students for orchestra are selected from Wind Ensemble. Music Department staff will arrange auditions for eighth grade students with middle school instrumental music teachers. An audition is not required for Marching Band.
5. **Athletic Program** - Prospective student-athletes who may be potential candidates for an athletic scholarship at a Division I or II NCAA member institution should be aware of the specific "core curriculum" requirements for athletic participation and scholarships. This information is available in the LSE Counseling Center or online at the NCAA Eligibility Center at www.eligibilitycenter.org.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Graduation from Lincoln Public Schools will require the accumulation of 245 credit hours in grades 9-12, subject to the following per [Board Policy 6222](#):

Within the 245 credit expectation for graduation from high school (grades 9-12), certain areas of study totaling 185 credit hours will be required of students. The credits listed are to be earned by taking courses.

A. Course of study statements for graduation requirements can be found in the LPS Online Course Guide.

B. In addition to accumulating the required number of credit hours, students will also be required to demonstrate that they have necessary reading and writing skills. Demonstrations and standards for successful completion of these skill areas will be developed. Demonstrations may be completed in a particular class and/or independent of a class, depending upon how the demonstration is developed. Demonstrations will not grant credit.

C. University-bound students having a verified handicapping condition and receiving special instructional services in secondary school would be expected to meet LSE diploma requirements and university-wide admission requirements. However, their four-year plan might be modified by their Individual Education Plan (IEP), and some course titles may vary.

Students are encouraged to work closely with their counselor to develop a four-year plan that is specific to their individual needs and post-high school goals.

ACADEMIC HONORS

Grade Point Average

In all cases of academic recognition, a student's grade point average (GPA) is of fundamental importance. GPA is the sole criterion in all cases except National Honor Society. Induction into the National Honor Society considers scholarship, character, leadership, and service.

Honor Roll

Honor roll academic recognition will occur at the end of each semester. Four categories of academic achievement will be recognized on honor roll:

- Honor Roll (H): Students with a 3.5 or higher weighted GPA on the previous semester's course work, including at least 25 graded credits (not including S/U).
- Honor Roll with Distinction (H+): Students with weighted GPA of 3.750 to 3.999 on a 4.00 weighted scale.
- Honor Roll with High Distinction (H++): Students with weighted GPA of 4.000 to 4.249 on a 4.00 weighted scale.
- Honor Roll with Highest Distinction (H+++): Students with weighted GPA of 4.250 and above on a 4.00 weighted scale.

Academic Letters & Pins

Students in grades 9-12 are eligible for a Lincoln Southeast Academic Letter when they have earned a 4.0 GPA or above on a weighted grade point scale for 2 consecutive semesters in 25 credit hours of graded course work each semester. Students who earn a 4.0 GPA or above on a weighted grade point scale in two additional consecutive semesters will earn an Academic Pin. Note: courses taken pass/fail do not apply towards an Academic Letter or Pins. A student will not earn an Academic Letter or Pin if a grade of "F" or "U" is received in any class.

4.0+ Award

Students must maintain a cumulative weighted GPA of 4.0 or higher for the semester.

National Honor Society

National Honor Society standards require that students qualify on the basis of scholarship, character, service, and leadership. The NHS requirements include:

- Scholarship (cumulative weighted GPA of 3.6 or above; maintained throughout NHS membership)
- Service (5 hours of volunteer service and service or community work once member is established)
- Leadership/Participation (minimum of three clubs, athletics or activities during high school; resume)
- Character (one-page typed essay)
- Additional requirements (NHS application, membership dues (\$10), mandatory membership meetings, participation in Induction Ceremony)

Membership is determined by the LSE Faculty Council after receipt and review of a completed application by the eligible student.

Academic Honors (continued)

Academic Wall of Honor

In order to qualify for the Wall of Honor, a graduating senior must have earned a 4.0 or higher weighted GPA each semester based on 25+ graded credit hours each semester, all 8 semesters of their high school tenure (grades 9-12) at Lincoln Southeast High School. (Special circumstances will be reviewed by the Faculty Council.) Note: Mid-term graduates are not eligible. Students earning this award will be featured with an individual picture and name plaque in a framed display in the Commons.

Graduation Honors

Effective for the class of 2021, the Laude Latin model will be used to recognize academic excellence at the conclusion of a student's high school career. Students will work to compete against the criterion for academic honors – rather than other students. Graduation honors will be determined following the second to last quarter of high school, and the student is required to graduate by the end of the next quarter. The following three levels of academic honors will be used:

- Summa Cum Laude – “with highest distinction”: Students with cumulative GPA of 4.250 and above on a 4.00 weighted scale.
- Magna Cum Laude – “with great distinction”: Students with cumulative GPA of 4.000 to 4.249 on a 4.00 weighted scale.
- Cum Laude – “with distinction”: Students with cumulative GPA of 3.750 to 3.999 on a 4.00 weighted scale.

COURSES WITH WEIGHTED GRADES

A limited number of classes in the Lincoln Public Schools curriculum provide for weighted grades. In these courses, only a grade of “C” and above is weighted.

Lincoln Public Schools work with Apex Learning to provide online instruction for our students. Apex Learning puts rigorous, standard based curriculum within reach for students-from those struggling to those capable of acceleration-to prepare them for the next course and the next stage in their education, work and life. Apex offers original credit, credit recovery, and skill remediation. The classes are designed to allow students to work at their own pace to complete high school graduation requirements on the computer. Even though this is an online program, students are required to attend & work in the lab during their assigned class time throughout the semester. Students MUST complete all lessons, quizzes, and tests in order to get credit for eLearning. Each eLearning class is designed to match the Lincoln Public Schools learning standards and meet graduation requirements in a number of areas. ELearning courses include some in the areas of Career and Technical Education (CTE), English, Fine/Applied Arts, Health, Human Behavior, Information Technology, Math, Science, and Social Studies.. Each class covers the same material learned in the traditional classroom. The only difference is the students teach themselves. 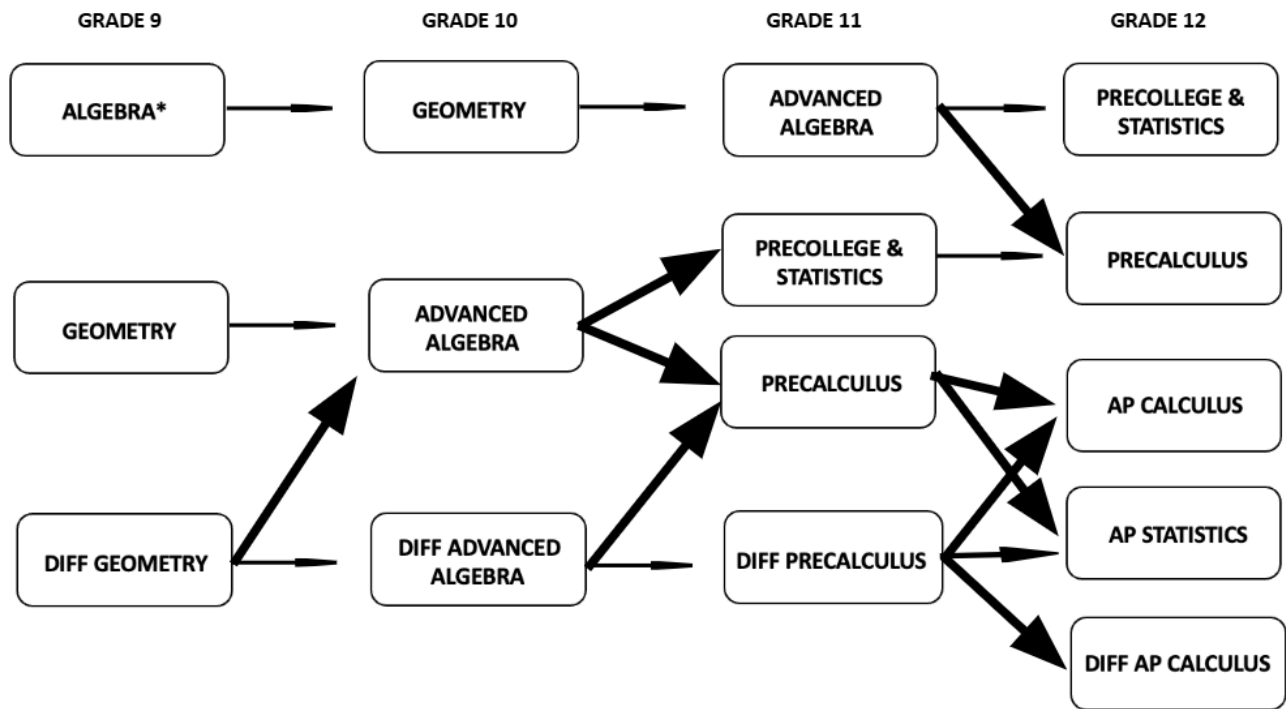

Successful completion of Advanced Algebra is the minimum entrance requirement for most colleges. Some colleges (including UNL) require the completion of a year beyond Advanced Algebra in order to enter without a deficiency. Most two-year and technical schools require completion of Advanced Algebra to enter without a deficiency.

Science Course Sequences at Lincoln Southeast High School

Lincoln Public Schools offers a variety of both core and elective courses in science. These courses serve to fulfill graduation requirements, engage students in curiosities about the natural world, and prepare students for careers and college. There are three common pathways: On grade-level, Honors (increased rigor), and Accelerated Honors (highest rigor). However, just because an honors course is chosen for one course, does not mean one must stay in the honors pathway. It is recognized that different disciplines in science are of more interest to some students, but not all students. This means that if a student starts in Differentiated Physical Science, they have the option of taking Differentiated Biology or On-track Biology, and vice versa.

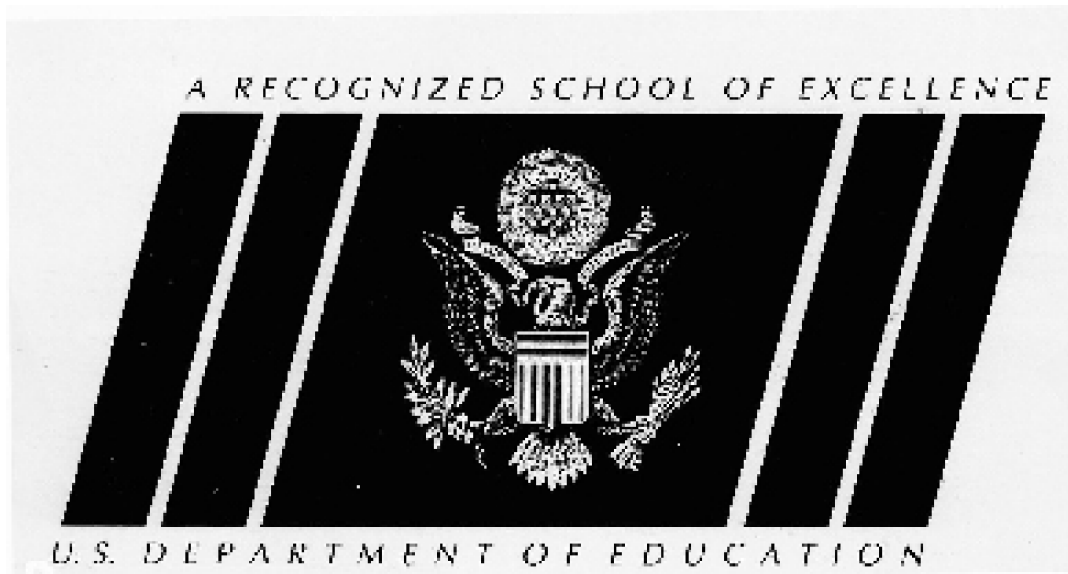
