5. Visitor Presentation

o Dr. David English, Senior VP for Academic Programs & Research

i. Hi everyone! I am David English. I spent a couple of years in undergrad as an SGA representative, so I believe in the work you're doing and I hope I can be a resource. My goal is to give some context about how we got here and why we have the system in higher education in NC. And peers. I think it's important to understand who your similarly situated institutions are outside of the system, because at times it can be helpful. We have no administrator in the government, so most of the decisions are happening at the states or the individual university level. We have federal actors, state actors, and then university actors. We have a somewhat unique system of higher education, but not unique exclusively.

Questions & Answers:

ii. Cameron Brown: Could you give some context as to why and how ASG was started?

David English: I don't really know. In 1971, when we became a system, two areas that had strong support were faculty and students. This is a forum for students from these institutions to collaborate and work across the state. What's happening now is leaps and bounds ahead of how it was 25 years ago. You effectively communicate and help students, as well as communicate with policymakers.

Mrs. Kim: ASG started with the NC State and UNC Chapel Hill SGA's meeting, then later they invited every campus and they'd pay 100 dollars to get together regularly. It became organized and became part of the UNCW system at some point in the 90s

iii. Mandy Williams: Was it always intended for the governor to be uninvolved in the process?

David English: In NC we have always been against it, the position of the governor in NC has historically had one of the weakest governor positions in the country. They had some control over it, as they were the ex-officio chair of the consolidated university system when it was 3 universities. In the 1970's, it was pushed to put them all into one entity so the compromise was to say, okay but the governor will not be a part of this system. This was the 1971 reconsideration of the system.

iv. Javier Limón: Could you give any context as to why the student board of trustees has a vote for the student members but the board of governors does not have a vote for that member?

David English: It's a statutory item that the SBP has a vote for BOT but I am not sure why that wasn't added at the same time.

Appalachian State:

- Amarah Din: Student Body President

- App State has been lucky enough to be able to get out into the community and volunteer, and the University has provided hot meals to the community for free.
- All in all, the disaster relief fund has raised 3 million dollars so far. 100 Students have been displaced from off-campus housing, but the Red Cross is providing housing, as is the App State housing department.
- All resident halls are safe to be in, and all academic buildings except the science building are operational, and classes that were previously held in that hall are now being held in the Student Center. All classes are back in session.
- Homecoming has been pushed to November 23rd instead of next week, but home football games are happening through the next month. Boone is hoping for and expecting visitors to keep coming and keep the community vibrant. The unofficial motto is, "Come but don't stay."
- There is still a town-wide curfew from 11pm to 7am every day, and we are not sure when it will be lifted. Walmart is closed and will be for another month.
- Want to thank all the schools who have reached out, whether they're in the system or not, NC State, Clemson University, Virginia Tech, High Point University, and everyone else who checked in. Thank you all for your support, these are scary times and we are blessed to be in the situation we are in but we are mountaineer strong. Any questions, please reach out to me on groupme or email and I'll do my best to get back to you!

NC School of Science and Math, Morganton:

- Dane Humphrey: Student Body President
 - Our University declared we were under condition 2 on September 26th at 4pm and classes were canceled 26th and 27th.
 - Then, a campus-wide power outage occurred, and we lost our water access.
 - By October 2nd, they still had no power and water, and collectively decided that campus would not be opened on the normal day of fall break, with closures extended until October 9th. Classes officially resumed on October 10th, 2024.

UNC Asheville:

- Liv Barefoot SBP
 - UNC Asheville was hit especially hard, and the most impacted places are the river arts district, which is where orientation happens and is a hub for student activity, the loss of

- chimney rock, biltmore village is facing extreme devastation, and some places along the rivers were washed almost completely off the map.
- Many students are currently unemployed and displaced, and across campus and the surrounding community, countless trees and power lines are down. Trees also struck several academic buildings which caused structural damage.
- We have been without water and power for weeks, we just got power back a week ago, and just got water running a week ago though it is still contaminated.
- Students will be unable to move into their dorms for the foreseeable future. Students coming back the 24th and classes back the 28th, but classes will remain virtual for the remainder of the semester.
- We are getting through it day by day, with many students volunteering remotely however they can. The counseling center is offering virtual and group counseling sessions, and SGA hosted an event called weathering the storm together, with a mission of civics, sharing important updates in the post Helene environment, such as new poll locations and how displaced students can use absentee ballots.
- Hope is that as they receive more donations and give out grants to the students who are in a deep time of need. Thank you to the countless institutions who have reached out, with support for housing, counseling, allowing student athletes to practice and use rec centers, we are so grateful to the support we've been given at this time.

WCU:

- Aaron Hoyle-Rivera:
 - To start, we are so grateful for the support.
 - On September 25th, we started to see the effects of the hurricane, and regularly scheduled events were canceled. They suspended classes at our main campus and biltmore campus through Friday, September 27th. The next day we moved into condition level 2.
 - We are grateful to never have lost power, as it is commonly said that it would've changed how we responded to this disaster. On September 28th, we lost our internet connection that was based in Charlotte, and the second link in Asheville. We relied on communication through word of mouth, though through the duration of the storm there was some service for some providers at Walmart. Our Chancellor personally went there and shared vital information with students, meeting them at Walmart and at other places in the community. Our Provost went door to door to check on students in apartment complexes. We then entered condition level 3. All non-mandatory employees were

- mandated to leave campus. On September 29th, a boil water advisory was sent off-campus, but all on campus water was safe to consume due to a separate system.
- Our mandatory staff worked for the best possible outcome, and we found out that our on-campus phone systems were undamaged. We set up call centers, and they were highly utilized, with 1200 students using the phones in one day just during lunch.
- All students could eat on campus, regardless of if they had a meal plan, so that everyone could eat a hot meal.
- We began hosting livestreams with University Leadership and Chancellor, to show that
 we were okay. And that we were very fortunate, because this disaster affected our region
 in different ways, and we luckily had no infrastructure concerns.
- Our course credits and fall commencement are completely untouched. We have received hundreds of requests through our disaster relief fund, but we have had many contributions and even donations from other SGAs across the state.
- Many emotions have been shared, but at WCU the most common one has been the need to help others. Asking, how can the catamounts help where we can? No matter what school you represent during this time, I think we can all say this is something we are very proud of, helping all the schools in western North Carolina. We have a lot to do to get back to normal, but we will do this by collaborating and working together. I am proud to be at WCU and to be a part of this system.
