



I just wanted to let everyone know that EYES (the coordinator did a presentation in class a couple of weeks ago) summer camp registration is now open! It is a day camp that runs Monday to Friday from about 9-4ish at the UofR but we do have some outreach camps in smaller centres. Our youngest campers must be just finishing grade one and going into grade two in the fall. Our oldest campers are in high school. For our elementary age camps we have camps that focus on all sorts of science and then we have our codemakers camp which spends more time on learning to code and using robots. We also have an all girls camps (for female identifying or non-binary youth) which is meant to help reduce the gender gap in STEM. This camp also has female scientists and engineers come in to talk about their life in STEM and do fun activities. For our high schoolers, their camp is only in the afternoons for a week but they get to spend time in the science and engineering labs on campus and learn from some of the profs on campus. This camp is meant to show students that are interested in STEM what their options on campus and in the future could be. 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

I love that you start you post by saying that trauma can mean different things to different people. I think that is something that we really need to think about as we discuss trauma informed education. The students in our classroom that have experienced trauma do not fit into a specific box. We cannot discredit what they have gone through or are going through currently simply because they are not acting as we think that should. You go on to say that peoples coping methods are different which is another huge thing for us to consider when thinking about the expression of trauma. I think that schools are acknowledging this subject more now than they did in my schooling experience. The zones of regulation has been adopted by many schools. I think that it has been a great addition to our education system. It teaches students that people express and manage their emotions differently, but regardless of how they do it it is totally normal. I feel that this helps to normalize students using coping strategies which takes the spotlight off of students who may be needing to use these skills as a result of their trauma. While I recognize that this was not its initial intention I imagine that it would have an impact. I also really liked your point about the difference between equality and equity. I had not considered adding that to my post, but I think it is a great addition to the discussion that we are having in our posts.

I liked what you said about the background of the student humanizing them. I think that is incredibly important as you may not really know this student before their IIP hits your desk. It it important to note that they are more than just a person that needs extra supports. Their interests, strengths, and overall demeanor help to identify methods of teaching that are likely to be successful for that student. Is there anything in this section that you wish you would have seen more or less of?

I like that her mother was mentioned as a part of the care routine. Aside from some background of their living situation the family of the student in the IIP that I review was not mentioned. I really appreciate your point about the educators were well-intentioned when working on the IIP, yet they may not have considered how the student may feel about these goals and how it may impact them later on. I can say that in my internship I had planned a lesson that I was so excited about until I discussed the plan with my coop who helped me to see that the way I was presenting it may make some students feel singled out. Thankfully she was able to help me brainstorm even better ways to construct the lesson. In education we all have the best of intention, but sometimes we miss things because we are only seeming them from our perspective. It helps to have others to discuss things with because a diverse point of view in the designing process of lessons and IIP's helps to prevent biases and assumptions from sneaking their way in and ultimately ensures that we are doing right by our students.

I think Amanda was in your group because she also noted that assessment has not reoccurred since they were four. I applauded her and I will applaud you for that because that is most definitely not something that I would have taken note of at first. It will be something I am keeping an eye out for now though so thank you for sharing.

I found it interesting that you noted that the outcomes of the IIP were developed to help her not blurt. I agree that a classroom does not always need to be quite to teach and learn so my instant analysis would probably have been the same. However, when taking into account that the outcomes should benefit the student in later grades as well as outside of school (if it can) and having not gone through the IIP on my own I wonder if perhaps the outcome was chosen in attempt to help aid her social skills in the future as other children, and even adults, may not be used to or comfortable with blurting.

I applaud you for commenting on the lack of reoccurring assessment of the student. This is not something that I think would have jumped out at me at first. I could not agree more, assessments should be repeated especially at times when students are doing some of their most changing and growing. Their interests are going to change which will impact the learning strategies that they find useful. As they grow their strengths are also going to grow and change. That could result in different scores on test leading to different needs that are needing to be met. Would you recommend they continue on with the same assessments or do you feel that as the student has grown there is more they should have been taking note of? (I know it is hard to tell just by looking at the IIP)

I appreciate your comment on the mother's involvement. I do not recall any mention of the family in the IIP that I read with my group. Although, our IIP did have a wonderful list of both short term and long term transition goals which was excellent as our student was going from being homeschooled to attending school for the first time.

I loved your post! Thank you for sharing a personal experience where a system of meaning impacted your relationship with a student. I feel that many of us can relate to having a similar experience. On the first day on my internship another staff member came up to me to "warn" me about a student that they felt was going to be a difficult student. This was challenging because hearing that before I have even met the student myself definitely made me worry about some of the behaviors that I was about to encounter. This student turned out to be a great student, but I had I become dysregulated before getting to know this student after hearing this "warning" I may not have looked at their small misbehaviors as being small.

I agree with what you came up with for how a student or caregiver who has been labelled at-risk or behavior disordered might feel about school. I also think that school can either be a sanctuary because they have people who can help meet their relational needs or a it can be a place of solitude and fear because school feels like another space where their needs are not being met.

You mention that you use several techniques to help you students regulate themselves. How do you go about teaching them mindfulness? I was interested to read that you use singing bowls with them. Is that something that you brought in or was your school already using them?

I loved your post! I think you make some great points. I like that you brought up the idea of choosing you battles. I think that it is a super important way for us to stay regulated. I find that not everything needs to be a singled out conversation with the student. There are times when it is okay to just have one big conversation about a behavior that you have noticed with the entire class. This helps you to stay regulated because it takes less time away from the class and it helps the students stay regulated because they do not feel that they are being attacked for making a mistake.

I like your idea for mindfulness minutes. I attempted some visualization techniques with my students in grade 4 and they found it difficult to keep their thoughts to themselves, but they will one day learn to use that technique in times of need. Did you introduce them to any apps that they could use at home? I, myself, have found that I enjoyed Calm and Headspace. You mention that you cooperating teacher would be honest with their students about how they were feeling. I think that is an excellent idea and must have been so interesting to see in action in your internship. In my post I mention that communication is one of the best regulation skills that we can have, but that it is also one of the hardest for us to learn.

You also mention incorporating hand signals in you class. I found this interesting because I am currently attempting to learn American Sign Language for another class. Were you envisioning utilizing sign language as a part of these signals or were you thinking that the class could invent their own together? If you are interesting in using sign language some apps that I have found useful are ASL Bloom, Marlee Signs, and YouTube.

I did appreciate that you noted that this is not strictly communication with students, but with the other adults in the building, families, and ourselves. In my post I noted that when there is a strong line of communication between schools and families the school only becomes a safer place. I think that this is because it begins to feel less like a place that is completely separate from the lives that students lead outside of school. Students feel free to be themselves, parents feel comfortable sending their children to school, and staff begin to build a stronger ability to rely on others for support. None of this is possible until we reflect on our assumptions and do what we can to be rid of them so that they do not impact or harm our interactions with others.
