About the Symposium

Started in 2010, the Symposium is organized by the Finger Lakes Faculty Development Network (FLFDN) as a part of Ithaca College's Annual Educational Technology Day. The sessions will present innovative uses of both established and new technologies for teaching and learning. In addition, we seek submissions that focus on best practices in the use of technologies and pedagogies, as well as scholarship that assesses the impact of technology on student learning. Anyone may submit a proposal for a symposium session. Guidelines, and a link to the proposal submission form, follow.

About Educational Technology Day

Educational Technology Day celebrates its 30th year as a regional event at Ithaca College attracting over 1,200 people annually from the upstate New York region. Primarily oriented to technology in higher education, the free event is a showcase for national and local hardware and software vendors demonstrating their latest technology with an emphasis on its use by faculty, staff, and students. Submitting a Proposal

Sessions may feature innovative uses of technologies, applications to teaching and learning, researching and assessing the impact of technology on student success, as well as challenges or problems you are trying to solve. We encourage presentations that include students as collaborators and elevate the student voice.

Presentation topics may include, but are not limited to:

- Active learning classrooms
- OER/open access/open scholarship
- Globally networked learning environments
- Personalized learning
- Adaptive learning
- Technology and student research
- Digital identity (ex-Domain of One's Own)
- Digital Humanities
- Artificial Intelligence in the Classroom
- Innovative Centers for Learning
- o Accessibility/Universal Design for Learning

Teaching and Learning with Technology Symposium sessions are offered as one of the concurrent tracks during the Ed Tech Day event. Sessions may be facilitated by vendors, featured speakers, or experts in various fields of technology. Ed Tech Day concurrent sessions are 50-minutes long with 10-minutes between sessions, beginning at the top of the hour. Teaching & Learning with Technology Symposium sessions run 20-25 minutes and align within the Ed Tech Day schedule.

Prior to submission, as you write your proposal, please consider:

- Sessions are 20-25 minutes in length, including Q&A
- A concise title that inspires attendees
- Descriptive abstract of no more than 200 words
- Learning objectives of your session (up to 3)
- Description of the technologies and/or pedagogies applied
- Description of how you will engage your audience
- Collaborators should include names of all presenters

Additional Information

- Proposals will be reviewed by a committee of the Finger Lakes Faculty Development Network, and presenters will be notified by February 21.
- All presenters must register for the Ed Tech Day event at Ithaca College. This is a free event.
- The conference room will have a projector, microphone and speakers, wireless capability, and a connection for a laptop, and a desktop with dual monitors. We suggest bringing a backup of your presentation.

• The conference room seats about 50 people. The audience will be faculty, staff, and students from institutions across the region. Presenters should bring handouts for the audience as appropriate, printing will not be available on site.
