- 1. What reason does Kristine Linde give Krogstad for earlier forsaking him?
- 2. Name the character who says, "to work for yourself— there's no joy in that." How does this relate to the motif of gender roles?
- 3. Which character says, "anyone who's sold herself for somebody else once isn't going to do it again." Why is this line significant?
- 4. Who does not want to come home from the party? Why not?
- 5. Whom does Torvald accuse of drinking heavily? Why does he make this accusation?
- 6. In Act III, how do Nora and Torvald learn that Dr. Rank is finally dying?
- 7. What is Nora planning to do on the night of the party, after dancing the tarantella?
- 8. How does Torvald first react to the news when he opens the letter from Krogstad? What causes him to change his mind?
- 9. Who slams the door? Why is this a significant ending to the play?

As you read act three, identify examples of the following motifs: feminism, gender roles, love and marriage, lies and deceit, and reputation
