Course Outline

Students will gain a broad understanding of the legal system in England and Wales and how being part of the EU influences this, for example, Human Rights. You will develop an understanding of contract and criminal law, applying this knowledge and legal techniques to argue cases. You will develop a wider understanding of the legal system through visits to courts and outside speakers.
