

Quarter Horse X Auxois

The auxois have smallish heads, broad foreheads, and small alert ears. They have short thickset necks with flattish withers, along with a straight back and long sloping croup. The tail is low set and the legs are slender.

The Quarter Horse has a small, short, refined head with a straight profile, and a strong, well-muscled body, featuring a broad chest and powerful, rounded hindquarters. Quarter Horses come in nearly all colors including chestnut, bay, black, brown, buckskin, palomino, gray, dun, red dun, grullo, red roan, blue roan, bay roan, perlino, cremello, and white.

In this cross, the horse keeps the heaviness of the Auxois in the neck and some in the body along with the sloping croup. The quarter horse contributes to the leaner legs and grulla color, as well as the less bulky body. The feathering comes from the auxois.
