Libraries and the Integration of Technology and Language and Skills Development


Many libraries are integrating technology into programs and services.. The San Francisco Public Library, for example, offers Internet training classes in Spanish, Chinese, and Japanese and has linked its own web site to online versions of newspapers and magazines from around the world. The Brooklyn Public Library's web site includes a selected list of links to sites in Chinese, Spanish, Russian, French and German. Adult education and literacy programs in a number of libraries stress computer literacy as a means of promoting print and media literacy and coordinate training with online activities including job searches.

A number of libraries provide opportunities for local teens to develop their own technology-based skills while learning about and serving their communities. In Queens, New York, teenagers are paid to serve as computer mentors for adults in the systems 62 branches. In libraries in Newark, New Jersey; Oakland, California; and Flint, Michigan, teens are learning e-journalism skills, researching issues about their communities and posting them on the web. The Newark and Oakland programs have their own sites, with information and interactive opportunities for other teens. The Flint teens post information about local history and social service agencies on the library's site.



About half way through the book I realized it wasn't about a house made of mangoes at all. That's when I found out it was titled "The House on Mango Street" but I was still confused because there really weren't any mangoes in it. I started to reread the book from the beginning and paid attention this time. It is a story about a young Latino girl growing up on the hard streets of Chicago, Illinois. It reminded me of the hard streets of Blaine, Washington where I grew up - where there weren't any mangoes either. Matter of fact there weren't many streets - and they certainly weren't made of mangoes - more like dirt paths, and not really hard even. Anyway, I too, often felt like an insignificant young Latino woman struggling to overcome my environment but ultimately I transitioned to the man I am today. I really recommend this book. Mangoes are good too.
