The introduction should engage the reader by creating interest in the character. Just like TPEQEA, start with a broad topic and gradually become more specific. This will allow you to smoothly transition into your thesis, which will highlight the main topic and purpose of this analysis. Your analysis should clearly identify 3 distinct traits about your character. Avoid generalizations happy, young, male, etc. Consider implementing some of the vocabulary we covered throughout this unit. These traits should demonstrate critical thinking. To support your conclusions, each paragraph should include examples of textual evidence. Your conclusion should reinforce your ideas stated in your thesis. Remember to use in-text citations for act and scene. Additionally, I am your audience so avoid summarizing the play. If you want to write this without TPEQEA for body paragraphs that is acceptable. This should be 2-3 pages.
