# **ONE-PAGER INSTRUCTIONS**

### **DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE**

One-Pager —a single page response to your reading. The purpose of a one-pager is to own what you are reading. We read differently when we know we are going to be doing something with a text. We learn best when we can create our own patterns. Your one-pager is:

- a single-page response to your reading (a poem, a novel, a chapter, an essay)
- a way to be creative and experimental it connects the verbal and the visual, connects the book's thoughts to your thoughts, connects words and images
- a way to respond imaginatively and honestly it should communicate your understanding of theme

#### Instructions

### Create a One-Pager to communicate your understanding of theme (not just plot) in your book club book.

## **Content:**

- Include thematic statement. See Do's and Don'ts Thematic Statement Handout.
- Include "notable quotations" (a minimum of six) you find most meaningful, significant to the work, and express the thematic idea.

#### Structure:

- Make a rough planning or sketch version first—get the layout right.
- Present an organization that enhances the theme. Be prepared to give a spoken "tour" of your One-Pager.
- Present a logical and compelling structure; demonstrate the relationship amongst ideas/words/images.

Demonstrate a clear perspective through sophisticated tone and style.




