

Former county coroner, Arthur C. Miller, dies

Arthur C. Miller, 74, retired Oshkosh businessman and former Winnebago County coroner, died Saturday evening at his home.

He was born Feb. 13, 1907, in Oshkosh, the son of Paul and Elizabeth Miller. He married Faye Brummett, March 10, 1946.

Mr. Miller, amember of St. John's Evangelical Lu-

theran Church, had served as alderman in the Second Ward and was Winnebago County coroner from 1962 to 1970. He had been ill since 1970.

He was owner and operator of Miller Cab, Ambulance and Wrecker Service prior to World War II. He served in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in Europe and was discharged in 1945. He then continued to operate Miller Ambulance Service as well as an answering service until he sold both businesses in 1960.

Mr. Miller was founder, a charter member and twice commander of the John and Richard Erban

Post No. 7 of the AmVets, World War II veterans. He was a member of American Legion Cook-Fuller Post No. 70 and the Veterans of Foreign Wars and was president of the Patriotic Council. He belonged to the Oshkosh Masonic Lodge No. 27, the Scottish Rite Valley of Green Bay, Tripoli Shrine of Milwaukee, Winnebagoland Shrine Club, Zia Grotto and the White Shrine of Jerusalem Bethel No. 2.

Surviving are his widow; two daughters, Mrs. James (Debbie) Mathe, Oshkosh, and Mrs. William (Judy) Wolcott, Menasha; one son, Paul, Oshkosh; nine grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.
