# The 2023 Black History Festival

- The February Black History Festival is on the website. We are working to finalize the events that will take place during the entire month of February virtually as well as the 2 p.m. matinee, Saturday, February 25, 2023 play, Campaign '72 about Shirley Chisholm's bid for President of the United States. The performance will be held at THEARC Theatre in Southwest DC. We are responsible for selling 325 seats for this performance. Considerable work has been completed on the media toolkit for the Festival. More details will follow. The webteam got the Festival page up on the website within 30 days of the conference, quicker than ever before. The ticket prices are \$75 for the play and limited VIP seating and refreshments at \$150. We have sold 4 tickets for the play.

The Virtual Festival will feature a Marquee Event titled, A Conversation with Secretary Lonnie Bunch. General tickets are \$65. Silver tickets are \$125 and include a general membership that can be used by the donor or gifted, and an ebook copy of the <u>Amanda Gorman</u> title, The Hill We Climb. Gold tickets include the Silver ticket perks and a hard-copy Amanda Gorman book.

Virtual Festival Ticket sales as of 2.6.23 are 32. The budget is based on 300 tickets.

Play Ticket sales as of 2.6.23 are 25. The budget is based on 325 tickets.

As a result of low ticket sales for the play, complimentary tickets were provided to local branches, luncheon and festival volunteers, Festival sponsors and award recipients, and others.

## The 2023 Annual Conference September 20-24 in Jacksonville, FL

The Florida Teaching of Black History scandal has resulted in discussions regarding ASALH's position and ongoing statements. We are mindful of the fact that members must be clear why we must support teaching Black history with well-researched statements and by attending and supporting the conference and our members and educators in Florida. We must look at the potential fiscal risk of those afraid to join ASALH and attend the conference due to the felony charges that can be levied against those who do not adhere to recent actions taken by the state.

Negotiations with Visit Jacksonville will provide a reimbursement from a grant by the Duval County Tourist Development Council in the amount of \$4.00 per room night which should result in between \$4,000 and \$5,000.00 and this must be used to reimburse AV and/or food for a reception.

#### **Hotel Guarantee**

Please note the following.

There were 882 hotel rooms booked for 2022 in two hotels.

The 2023 contract is for 1250 rooms and the minimum not to incur attrition is 1000 rooms. We should strive to attract at least 150 more attendees who stay in the hotel than last year.
