

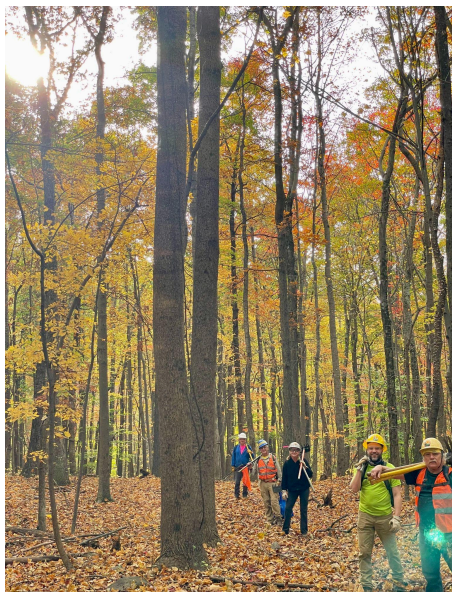

The Cadillac Crew puts Blackburn to bed for the season

In particular, the annual October Crew weekend at Blackburn Trail Center has a special way of making the mountains feel like home, like you belong there. It made me grateful for the simple things we enjoy together.

Saturday morning I was grateful for the bright sunrise, the autumn chill in the morning air, warm tea, and our big potluck breakfast eaten on the screen porch overlooking the piedmont from our perch just below the ridge. After breakfast, the Crew split up, about half heading out to the AT near Raven Rocks for trail work, and the rest staying at the Trail Center for routine upkeep.

Out on the trail, the Crew, led by Dan Feer and Robert Fina, de-rocked and stabilized 50 yards of the AT between Raven Rocks and Snickers Gap. They moved the trail back to its original alignment and re-contoured the tread so it had a slow-water shedding contour. Throughout the day, crew members dug through tough Virginia clay to create a durable, pleasurable section of trail. The Crew will be back in February to pick up where they left off, and make the popular section even better for all users.

The Blackburn Trail Center cabin maintenance crew led by Kirsten Elowsky and John Kittridge prepared the property for winter renters on the crew's last visit of the year. Dave Welker and Amanda Alleyne tackled the rebuilding of an insulated box to protect basement pipes from frost, then turned their attention to helping the firewood team leader, Jonathan Robertson. He picked up a few more supporters on Sunday in Karen Brown, Martha and Eddie Beckton, Kirsten and Dan Feer, nearly filling the woodshed and staged more rounds for next time.

JT Tucker continued winterizing by checking heaters and heat tapes in the main building and carriage house. Tysha Robinson, Ellen Feer, Eddie Becton, Christy Barber, and JT deep cleaned the house and the solar shower was drained. Jonathan also repaired one of the front lawn picnic tables. Tysha and Eddie cleaned and painted the interiors of the two privies.

Curtis Strong and Neil Hopper inspected the driveway down to the 2 chimneys parking lot, removing large rocks and cleaning leaves and debris from culverts. They also built a lateral to channel water off the driveway. Steve Barber, JT, Ian Page and Ellen installed two ceiling fans on the porch, which will make summer eating and relaxing much more comfortable. Jonathan and John installed post caps on the recently rebuilt front steps; the steps will be painted in the Spring. At the end of the weekend, Kirsten, Jonathan, and John did a final inspection and cleaning and took away the trash – Leave No Trace.
