With this we declare how we desire to engage each other, and the world at large, as we *Practice Courageous Love*.

UUCR Covenant of Right Relations

We, the members and friends of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Rockville, dedicated to a free and responsible search for truth, meaning, and spiritual growth, agree to this covenant in order to promote a vibrant, healthy congregation. As a member/friend, I covenant

With the Congregation to:

- ❖ Share my personal talents, time, and other resources with UUCR while respecting the commitments I have made outside the church community.
- ❖ Appreciate that our UUCR community makes decisions through democratic processes.
- ❖ Recognize that our church will evolve as our membership changes.

With Other Members/Friends to:

- ❖ Engage in healthy, honest communication--listening well and speaking with respect, understanding, and caring.
- ❖ Ensure that interactions via social media are conducted with equal respect, understanding, and caring.
- ❖ Work respectfully to resolve concerns directly with the parties involved. If an issue remains unresolved, to seek resolution through a minister, the Board of Trustees, or other appropriate UUCR channels.
- ❖ Honor the unique identity of each member and friend.
- ❖ Respect and appreciate the work of all volunteers.
- ❖ Accept and forgive imperfection.
- ❖ Respect the personal boundaries of each person and be mindful of the importance that UUCR be a welcoming and safe place for all.

With the Minister to:

- ❖ Be open to the person, message, and leadership of the minister.
- ❖ Work with the minister in the spirit of shared ministry.
- ❖ Respect the personal time of the minister and his or her family.
- ❖ Be open and honest with the minister both with praise and in disagreement, and share my concerns directly in a respectful manner.
- ❖ Work through the Committee on Ministry if I have unresolved issues with the minister.
- ❖ Remember that the minister is human like the rest of us, and have reasonable expectations.

With the Staff to:

- ❖ Be courteous and respectful.
- ❖ Be thoughtful when requesting services and using staff work space.
- ❖ Work respectfully to resolve concerns directly with the parties involved. If an issue remains unresolved, seek resolution through a minister, the Board of Trustees or other appropriate channels.
- ❖ Respect work hours and the personal time of staff.
- ❖ Show appreciation for work done.

Our Covenant of Right Relations outlines principles and expectations designed to promote the best and most gracious functioning of our beloved community. To resolve conflict at an early stage, our [Conflict Resolution Policy](#) identifies steps to be followed in UUCR when conflicts within the congregation require a more formal structure for resolution. If needed, a matter can go to trained members of the Board-approved Conflict Resolution Team activated by the Committee on Ministry.

What We Believe

Unitarian Universalism is a liberal religion— that is, a faith that keeps an open mind to the religious questions people have struggled with in all times and places.

We are covenanted people: we freely choose to be in community together, practicing *courageous love*. We serve and work to build *Beloved Community* in our spiritual community, while working towards transformative justice in the world and within ourselves. We strive to live our faith in our everyday lives, as diverse and dynamic people.

We believe that religious authority doesn't come from any one book or person or institution, but from within ourselves. We rely on personal experience, conscience, and reason as the final authorities in our faith.

Although our historical roots are in the Jewish and Christian traditions, we also draw from humanist teachings, earth-centered traditions, wisdom from the world's religions, and our own experiences of life and spirit.

As Unitarian Universalists, [our beliefs are diverse and inclusive](#), and we have no shared creed. Within our shared covenant, our *Eight Principles*, we support “the free and responsible search for truth and meaning.”

“*The Principles* are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities.”

Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote:

[1st Principle](#): The inherent worth and dignity of every person;

[2nd Principle](#): Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;

[3rd Principle](#): Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;

[4th Principle](#): A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;

[5th Principle](#): The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;

[6th Principle](#): The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;

[7th Principle](#): Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

[8th Principle](#): Journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse and multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions. [This 8th Principle was adopted by the UUCR membership May 22, 2022]

New expression of Shared Values:

At the General Assembly of the Unitarian Universalist Association in June 2024, UUs voted to replace the UUA's existing Seven Principles and Six Sources language in our bylaws with language describing Unitarian Universalism through [these shared values](#), with Love placed at the center:

- **Interdependence:** We honor the interdependent web of all existence and acknowledge our place in it.
- **Pluralism:** We are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology.
- **Justice:** We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all feel welcome and can thrive.
- **Transformation:** We adapt to the changing world.
- **Generosity:** We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.
- **Equity:** We declare that every person is inherently worthy and has the right to flourish with dignity, love, and compassion.

Our Congregational Covenant:

**Love is the spirit of this congregation,
and service is its law.**

**This is our great covenant: to dwell together in peace,
To seek the truth in love, and to help one another.**

Worship, Music and Arts Programs and Teams

Every worship service is an offering of beauty and passion, a living symbol of life's questions and struggles, and a guide for living our values. Through worship, we connect to both the universal and the singular, the outer and inner realms of life.

Each service weaves together sermon, music, poetry, silence, prayer and meditation, children's stories, and the congregation's joys and sorrows. The result is a Sunday experience of harmony and diversity where we explore many possible paths to wisdom, connection, and changing the world.

Worship Arts Team

The Worship Arts Team supports the minister in planning and creating worship services. A Worship Associate assists in the pulpit most Sundays, and a Worship Steward sets up the sanctuary for service. Members of the team plan and lead several Sunday services during the year, and the team also coordinates with guest speakers to the pulpit.

The Music Program

We are blessed with an abundance of talent at UUCR! Learn more about our vibrant music program: <https://uucr.org/worship/music>

The UUCR Community Choir is open to everyone ages 14 and up (younger singers may be accepted on a case by case basis). You may join the choir at any time. From late August through early June, the choir rehearses once a week on Thursdays from 7:30PM-9:10PM and performs approximately every other week on Sunday mornings. UUCR offers free childcare (ages 5 and up) during choir rehearsals for the children of singers. The choir is led by our Director of Music & Arts. Contact: music@uucr.org

Wildberry Jam is a women's trio coordinated by Julie Graf. Wildberry performs about once a quarter during worship. Contact: wildberry@uucr.org

Bonfire is UUCR's house band and is coordinated by Ody Leonard and Jennifer Ambrose. They welcome new players and singers at any time, including youth who show proficiency with their instrument. Bonfire performs about six times per year during worship and also plays at various special events. Contact: bonfire@uucr.org

Tuba Noodle Casserole is a brass & wind ensemble coordinated by Julie Graf and Michael Holmes. They play periodically throughout the year including getting ready for the holidays. TNC is open to youth & adults. Contact: tubanoodle@uucr.org

The Chamber Ensemble focuses on classical piano, strings & woodwinds and is coordinated by Staff Pianist Justin Furnia. They play once per quarter and are open to new members. Contact: chamberensemble@uucr.org

UUCR also features **external ensembles** that contain UUCR members. We have two members who sing in barbershop quartets: Niambi Powell sings in HALO (an award-winning African American barbershop quartet) and Michael Holmes sings in the Glen Echoes. They are not open to new members, but perform during worship and other events at UUCR one to two times per year.

UUCR Drum Circle - The UUCR Drum Circle is currently being reorganized. If you have ever tapped your foot to a song on the radio you have all the rhythm you need to share in the healing power of communal drumming. No experience is required, and you need not bring a drum (though by all means bring one or any other percussion instrument.) Contact: drumcircle@uucr.org

Sonaria is a treble voice ensemble. Its primary focus is community building and spiritual growth through music. Sonaria meets on the 1st & 3rd Sundays of the month from September through May and occasionally performs in worship services. Faith Formation Programs for Children and Youth

UUCR's Faith Formation Program for children and youth engages young people in the lifelong process of forming their beliefs, values, and ways of being in the world. Our classes are planned with the faith development needs of each age-group and the diversity of learning styles in mind. The skilled and dedicated volunteers for UUCR's children and youth are the greatest gift and strength of our program. Knowing that children develop their beliefs and values not only in classes but through all their involvements in the congregation, we create and foster opportunities for the regular participation of our children and youth in the worship, social events, and social action activities of the congregation. Family Faith Formation Team

Social Justice Committees, Groups, and Affiliations

The Social Justice Committee

Social justice is a vital part of the mission of our congregation, leading, supporting, and engaging the congregation on social justice concerns, providing tangible ways to live our Unitarian Universalist principles in the community and the world. The Committee is comprised of several subcommittees or task groups that carry out the work of the committee by financially supporting social justice and human services organizations, working in coalition with other social justice groups, volunteering on projects in support of human services and social justice organizations, and encouraging congregational exploration and action on social justice issues. The Committee coordinates and/or supports efforts across several areas of social justice and human services, some of which are Working Groups of the congregation, and others are human service organizations outside UUCR. Environmental Action Group

The EAG seeks to raise awareness, improve our congregation's natural environment, and encourage sustainability practices for present and future generations by working with members and the congregation to reduce our negative impact on the Earth as individuals and as a collective, and by partnering with environmental organizations to combat the impacts of climate change, protect the Chesapeake Bay, reach 100% clean, renewable energy, and eliminate waste in Montgomery County. Current projects include terracycle and recycling; and electrify everything, which examines church energy systems seeking opportunities to update them. Contact: environmentalactiongroup@uucr.org

Get Out the Vote

UUCR The Vote, working through a partnership with the national UU The Vote and the Center for Common Ground, provides a meaningful way for congregants to promote democratic values and engage in nonpartisan get-out-the-vote efforts. UUCR's Social Justice Committee and the Share the Plate program provides funding to offset the cost of postcards, stamps and other basic supplies. Using voter lists and scripts provided by the Center for Common Ground's Reclaim Our Vote (ROV) campaigns, congregants contact registered voters in target states, informing marginalized people about issues at stake in their state's election and how to obtain more information about voting in their specific counties. Habitat for Humanity

Each summer, UUCR volunteers return to western MD to work with Garrett County Habitat for Humanity (HFH) for one week. Contact: habitatforhumanity@uucr.org

Haiti Medical Mission

UUCR supports Sante Total, a non-profit working in Jacksonville, Haiti. Supported projects have included clinic construction, hospital bill and medication cost coverage, school lunch program, food distribution for seniors, and educational support.

Hunger Relief Task Group

The Hunger Relief Task Group directly addresses hunger and promotes food security in our community, toward the goal of all people having access to sufficient, safe, and healthy food. Task group efforts include food donations for Manna Food Center, support of and volunteering at Gaithersburg Soup Kitchen, taking intake calls and delivering emergency food to neighbors in need through Rockville Help, Inc., and annual Thanksgiving baskets for Community Reach of Montgomery County's Holiday Giving Program and New Neighbor Interfaith Alliance. The Group also has a relationship with The UpCounty Hub, an expanding non-profit food resource collection and distribution organization addressing food insecurity throughout northern Montgomery County and provides meals for the Interfaith Works Women's Center. Immigration Action Group

The Immigration Action Group educates our faith community on issues affecting immigrants in Montgomery County and throughout the nation and collaborates with other faith-based and community organizations to engage in both service and policy actions on behalf of immigrants. It has collected clothing and shoes for immigrants arriving in Washington, D.C., supported Afghan families arriving in our area, and advocated for just and humane laws and policies for immigrants. The Group works with New Neighbors Interfaith Alliance by tutoring youth, moving furniture, bringing groceries, and driving to medical appointments. It joins with partner advocacy organizations like Evacuate Our Allies (EOA) coalition and Church World Service to advocate for unaccompanied migrant children and other immigrant protections and works with UU Legislative Ministry of Maryland to urge the Maryland General Assembly to pass laws to protect immigrants. LGBTQ+ Task Force

The LGBTQ+ Task Force is a sub-committee of the Social Justice Committee whose focus is on the issues surrounding the LGBTQ community both within our congregation and our community at large. Contact: lgbtq@uucr.org

Rainbow Youth Alliance

The Rainbow Youth Alliance provides a unique and much-needed service to the LGBTQIA high school population of Montgomery County. Trained adult facilitators provide a safe and affirming space for all youth to connect, ask questions, and explore with others. Contact: ryacoordinator@gmail.com

Medicaid Waiver Program

The Waiver program is designed to help vulnerable people age in place in their homes rather than going to a nursing home.

Mitten Tree

As part of our holiday celebrations in December, we collect mittens and scarves to be donated to Interfaith Works for distribution.

Poor People's Campaign

UUCR attends meetings of the Poor People's Campaign and collaborates with them on issues specific to Marylanders such as fair wages, renters' rights, and voter registration.

Rockville Bicycle Hub

The Rockville Bicycle Hub has been helping adults and children obtain bicycles for almost ten years. This fall, RBH was able to assist Afghan families obtain bicycles so the adults could go to work and the children could experience the freedom of transportation.

Share the Plate Program

A portion (ordinarily 50%) of UUCR's Sunday "plate collection" goes to support community organizations serving vulnerable populations. The Committee manages this Program, in consultation with the Ministers, to reflect congregational priorities and commitments. Organizations that benefitted from Share the Plate in FY23 included: Mary's Center, Gaithersburg Soup Kitchen, Rockville HELP, Montgomery County Coalition for the Homeless, Housing Unlimited, Interfaith Works, Beacon House, Community Reach of Montgomery and its Kaseman Clinic, Manna Food Center, and Sante Total. Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of Maryland

The Unitarian Universalist Legislative Ministry of Maryland (UULM-MD) is a statewide advocacy network of Unitarian Universalists working to educate, mobilize, and coordinate UUs on specific issues before the Maryland General Assembly. Working in coalition with established state and national organizations, we as UUs model a reverence for the interdependent web of all existence which fosters justice, health, and equity in society. Legislative priorities have included criminal justice reform, climate change, immigration, and health care. UUCR Social Justice Emergency Fund

The fund was established to allow UUCR to respond to emergencies in our local community. We have been able to provide financial assistance to the residents who were displaced when a condominium in Gaithersburg exploded and gave financial assistance to the UUA disaster relief fund when they helped a UU church in Florida that had been severely damaged by Hurricane Ian.

Aesthetics Committee

consult with committee and staff on matters of color and design as requested.

Buildings Committee

The mission of this committee is to help maintain the congregation's facilities in a condition that allows UUCR members and friends, as well as other end-users, to perform the wide variety of activities that take place here. The committee organizes volunteers such as Tool Time Group/Power Tool Gang to perform occasional routine maintenance and repairs. The committee also advises the Church administrator on the selection of contractors as needed for other repairs and about service contracts for building systems such as HVAC, elevator, and fire alarm systems. Landscape & Grounds Committee

This committee advises the church administrator in selection and evaluation of contractors who provide regular annual maintenance of the church grounds as part of the annual budget cycle. The committee also helps manage additional grounds needs such as necessary removal and pruning of trees and bushes, and organizes volunteers to assist in grounds maintenance activities such as weeding and planting annuals.

The committee also leads in developing plans for the overall improvement of the church landscape, and (subject to conditions and approvals set forth in the Site Beautification Policy) may expend funds from the Site Beautification Operating Fund, which is replenished annually through invested earnings of the restricted Site Beautification Fund, only if market conditions permit. Spiritual & Caring Opportunities

Pastoral Care Team

The purpose of UUCR's Pastoral Care program is to support the ministers in reaching out to congregants with special needs. Pastoral Care Team members minister to those who are undergoing health problems, dealing with grief or other life changes, or experiencing isolation because of age or disability. Assistance can take many forms: transportation to doctor appointments, providing meals, sending cards, visiting in hospitals or at home, and helping with memorial receptions. Pastoral care team members provide a spiritual

Peer Depression Support Group

Living with depression isn't easy, and can cloud your thinking, judgment, and worldview. It can make you feel weary, and like you're working twice as hard as you need to - just to make it through the day. Peer support groups are designed to offer acceptance, understanding, and validation for congregants living with depression.

The UUCR group is a peer to peer support group, and is open to all UUCR congregants living with depression who wish to explore this resource. The group is not to be used as a replacement for mental health treatment, but as a support and resource for those who struggle with this condition. The group meets via zoom, twice a month in confidential meetings. Members are asked to make a commitment to attend meetings for 3 months. During open sessions, the commitment can be renewed. Three times a year (November, March and July), the group will open up to new members who are welcome to attend up to two meetings before deciding if the group is a good fit for them. We currently meet via zoom on Saturday mornings at 9:00 am. The meetings are co-facilitated by Lisa Reed and Marlene Deal. Contact: peersupport@uucr.org

Women's Open Spiritual Connection Group

The WOSCG is open to all women interested in exploring spirituality together while gaining creative insights and connection with each other. UUCR Small Group Ministries (SGM) sessions offer members opportunities for deep listening and to develop meaningful relationships while exploring personal beliefs. These groups are the heart of connection for some members of our congregation. Once or twice a month, groups of 8-10 people gather in covenant to delve deeper to explore faith practices in a safe, respectful environment. Between SGM sessions, Soul Matters invites ideas for faith experiences based on individual interest and preference. The southeast corner of our property has long been used for the placement of the ashes of our loved ones. In 1998, the congregation formally designated this area as a Memorial Garden. The Memorial Garden is a meditation grove with winding wooded pathways with benches for quiet reflection. UUCR also has established a Memory Board that enables

members and friends who choose to do so to install a bronze nameplate with the name and the years of birth and death of loved ones as an ongoing memorial who have been part of the UUCR community. The Memory Board is located on the wall of Building 4 directly facing the sanctuary. *The Memorial Committee*, working closely with the Minister, serves as the day-to-day point-of-contact with the general congregation for information on UUCR's memorial practices. A Brief Look at the Governance of UUCR

Introduction and The Board

UUCR uses a “Strategic Board” model of representative leadership, with major or critical decision-making reserved for the voting congregation. The major areas of responsibility of our *General Trustees* and *Officers of the Congregation* (both generally referred to as “The Board of Trustees”) are: congregational mission-vision discernment; fiduciary responsibility and oversight; policy development; assessment; and strategic planning. The day-to-day management of UUCR is undertaken by qualified staff.

Highlights are summarized below.

UUCR Board Meetings

The Board holds *Regular Meetings* once a month, which are open to the congregation. *Regular Meetings* are posted in the UUCR Calendar of Events. The Board may also hold *Special Meetings*, with not less than two-day notice to the congregation. *Closed Executive Sessions* may be held to discuss sensitive matters, such as personnel issues and contracts.

The Election of the General Trustees and the Officers of the Congregation

The *General Trustees* and the *Officers of the Congregation* are elected by the congregation at the May *Congregational Meeting*. The Senior Minister and the immediate Past President also serve as ex-officio, non-voting members of the Board.

Three *General Trustees* serve staggered three-year terms and may be re-elected for one consecutive term.

The *Officers of the Congregation* are: The *President*, who serves for one year following the year of their election as *Vice President*; the *Secretary* and the *Treasurer*, elected for three-year terms.

(Assistant Treasurers, who are not members of the Board, are also elected for three-year terms.)

Nominations for the Board of Trustees

A seven-member *Nominating Committee* (reporting to the congregation) works throughout the year to gather a slate of Board nominees, which must be reported to the congregation at least 30 days prior to the May *Congregational Meeting*. Six members of the *Nominating Committee* are elected by the congregation and serve in staggered three-year terms, and one member is elected by the Board and serves a one-year term. In

addition to nominations presented by the Committee, nominations may also come directly from the congregation: any three members may sign a nominating petition, addressed to the Secretary of the Board. Ballots must not indicate whether a candidate was nominated by the *Nominating Committee* or came from the congregation.

Communications with the congregation

All meetings and decisions of the board (apart from sensitive information, such as personnel matters) are regularly summarized and communicated to the congregation and staff by announcements, electronic publications, the bulletin board, and within *Congregational Meetings* and “Town-Hall” meetings. Congregational Meetings and Town-Hall Meetings

At least one annual *Congregational Meeting* for the election of Board Members and other business must be held in May. Traditionally, another *Congregational Meeting* is held in January. Informative meetings, such as “Town Hall” meetings, are held throughout the year by call of the Board. Other *Congregational Meetings* may be called by one-eighth (1/8) of the voting congregation. To conduct the business of the congregation, *Congregational Meetings* require a quorum of one-eighth (1/8) of the members entitled to vote and require a 10-day prior written notice to UUCR congregants.

Committees Reporting to the Board or Minister

The Leadership Development Team

The Leadership Development Team provides leaders and potential leaders with resources, training, and support, including mentors, in order to equip them to fulfill their roles with effectiveness and meaning. The team supports congregational leaders in meeting UUCR goals and objectives. Contact: leadershipdevelopment@uucr.org

The Connections Team

The Connections Team identifies and shares UUCR's most essential service needs, and engages the congregation to fill those needs. The team provides access to the data and resources needed, and coordinates the annual Service Recognitions.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee, which includes the Treasurer and Assistant Treasurers, oversees the financial affairs of the congregation. It oversees and helps coordinate the annual canvass budget, maintains fiscal year spreadsheets used to track canvass and Board budgets, provides financial analyses for Board use and decision making, reviews monthly Treasurer Reports and operating income and expenses, provides revenue/expense projections, provides financial reporting, drafts and updates financial policies for board approval, supports church leaders/committee chairs as they execute their portions of the

budget, maintains electronic copies of official financial records, and performs financial reviews of church books. Contact: financechair@uucr.org

Investment Committee

The Investment Committee is responsible for reviewing and recommending investment vehicles for all long-term and mid-term financial assets of the congregation.

Personnel Committee

The Personnel Committee provides support to the Ministers and the Board for the administration of church employees.

Rental Team

The Rental Team develops and oversees our rental program that provides essential income to support UUCR's operations. The rental program must be consistent with the Board's goals, UUCR's mission and overall space availability. The Rental committee serves as the primary point of contact with the nursery schools on matters related to negotiating cooperative agreement lease renewals and interpreting lease provisions. The Church Administrator is responsible for day-to-day rental activities and negotiates and signs short-term rental agreements consistent with Board policy. Congregational Data Team

This team helps to gather, analyze, and visualize the important information and "stats" of our community (e.g., participation, funding, demographics, etc.) These efforts are intended to help the board and the congregation better understand our trends and needs. With this information, informed decisions about how and what we are doing may be made to focus our efforts. [This team is in formation.]

Committee on Ministry (Chartered)

The Committee on Ministry (COM) works with our ministers and members of the congregation to care for and strengthen the overall ministry of the congregation. The Committee on Ministry examines, evaluates, and supports ministry within the Congregation, including the Minister, professional staff, and lay leadership, and advises the Board on issues related to ministry. The Canvass (the Annual Pledge Drive)

The Canvass, held every year in February and March, is the most important fundraising event of the year at UUCR. All members and friends are canvassed and asked to make an annual financial pledge to support the operations of UUCR. The canvass is responsible for almost 80% of UUCR funding. The canvass also provides special opportunities to refresh mindfulness about what UUCR does for congregants, families, and our community, and increases awareness of the congregation's income, costs and obligations. The results of the canvass are the primary basis for annual financial planning and related decision making by the Board of Trustees.
