

- Zero Conditional
 - Functions
 - Used to express laws and rules.
 - If you commit a crime, you go to jail.
 - Used to express things that are always true.
 - If I eat peanuts, I have an allergic reaction.
 - Structure
 - Regular
 - “If/When” Clause + “Main” Clause
 - “If/When” Clause
 - “If/When” + Subject + Present Simple Form + A comma (,)
 - If it rains,
 - “Main” Clause
 - Subject + Present Simple Form
 - We get wet.
 - If it rains, we get wet.
 - Question
 - Follow the same structure for the “If/When” Clause and make the “Main” Clause a question.
 - If it rains, does the ground get wet?
 - If we go to the beach, do we buy ice cream?
 - Negative
 - Make each clause negative when appropriate. The important thing is it makes sense.
 - If you don’t drink water, you die.
 - If I drink coffee before bed, I don’t sleep.
 - Inversion
 - The clauses can be inverted and still carry the same meaning. This is done by switching the “If/When” Clause and the “Main” Clause and getting rid of the comma.
 - If I drink, I don’t drive.
 - I don’t drive if I drink.
