National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)	 Grades 4 and 8 for reading and mathematics (only if the school is selected to participate) 	NAEP assessment results help produce the Nation's Report Card. NAEP is a survey given each year to a sample of schools selected to participate. Districts that receive Title-I funds agree to have schools participate.	Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA)	Students typically spend 1.5-2 hours to complete the NAEP, depending on grade and test format.
